
Why?

Project Overview: Three Key Themes




Increasing the diversity of housing options, especially secure and affordable rental housing, is a central theme to this project.







Each expert or local knowledge holder spoke to a different theme and told their own story



Elicit initial feedback about ways to engage with the community as the project moves forward in 2020



In-person at the event, and through email after the event ended

Successes

Number of Attendees: 70-80 People

Excellent promotion and advertising, effectively getting the word out in the community.

Accessibility and Gertie Bus Use

At least 6 attendees used Gertie for transportation. A community member streamed the event through social media, making it accessible to many more people than those physically in attendance.

Variety of Presenters and Views

Heard from: People with lived experience with housing instability and/or homelessness, First Nation community member, housing and social planners, sustainable housing expert, environmental conservationist, and a local employer.

Audio Pieces: Voices of the Community


The most effective part of the evening was hearing directly from people with lived experience with housing instability in the Gabriola community.





- Missed opportunity to speak about water issues


Managing Expectations
