SUBJECT:	Rogers Cell Tower Proposal – Update for Information

Rogers (the proponent) is proposing the construction of a 63-metre tall self-support cell tower on Provincial Crown land on Hornby Island. From June 2022 to January 2023, they carried out pre-consultation with relevant agencies and public consultation to adhere to the Federal department of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada's *Radiocommunication and Broadcasting Antenna Systems Client Protocol Circular CPC 2-0-03 (CPC).* 

The *CPC* lays out the minimum public consultation process for antenna installations as a default process while anticipating that local land-use authorities, such as Islands Trust, may augment the process by developing their own protocol with consultation requirements that go beyond the minimum default process. The LTC adopted such a protocol in September 2022, the *Hornby Model Strategy for Antenna Systems* (see Attachment 2).

Due to the timing of adoption of the *Model Strategy* when Rogers' application process was already underway, the consultation guidelines contained in the *Strategy* were not applied to Rogers' initial pre-consultation and public consultation activities. At the January 20, 2023 regular business meeting, the Hornby Island Local Trust Committee (LTC) directed staff to work with Rogers to prepare a report including an analysis on consultation that Rogers had completed to date and comparison with the *Model Strategy*.

To initiate this analysis, staff asked Rogers to prepare a summary of public consultation and correspondence to date. Staff recently received this summary and are now sharing it with the LTC for information only.

- A summary of Rogers' land use proposal (Pages 1-4)
- A high level summary of Rogers' consultation process and results to date (Pages 5-6)
- Appendix A: a copy of the provincial Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites
- Appendix B: a copy of pre-consultation emails between Rogers and Islands Trust staff
- Appendix C: pre-consultation email messages with Rogers and BC Government staff
- Appendix D: a copy of Rogers' mail-out consultation package
- Appendix E: copies of the various newspaper notices that Rogers issued
- Appendix F: a copy of the slides from the digital public meeting that Rogers hosted
- Appendix G: redacted public comments

Staff are analysing this summary and comparing it with the *Model Strategy*. A staff report summarizing this information will be prepared for discussion at a future LTC meeting.

Rogers' Provincial Crown land application process is still underway and additional public consultation and First Nation consultation is required as part of that process, in order to adhere to the province's *Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites*.

Upon completion of the procedures outlined in the Provincial *Policy*, Rogers will summarize the results of all consultation and request a motion or letter of land use concurrence via the relevant land use authority in order to satisfy MFLNRO and ISED requirements. Through the province's referral process, the Islands Trust will receive a referral and be asked to formally respond.

## NEXT STEPS

No formal responses or land use decisions are being requested at this time. The LTC may receive this information, evaluate the materials, make comments, or raise concerns that it wishes the proponent to address at this stage in the process, prior to additional consultation.

#### Public Consultation Summary for Rogers' Proposed Communication Site on Hornby Island

SitePath Consulting Ltd. ("SitePath") is representing Rogers Communications Inc. ("Rogers") in consulting the Hornby Island community regarding a proposed telecommunications installation on Provincial Crown land.

#### Objective

- In order to provide dependable wireless service for residents and businesses on Hornby Island Rogers Communications is proposing to build a 63.0-meter tall self-support tower on Provincial Crown land on the west side of Central Road.
- The proposed facility will deliver reliable voice and data services throughout Hornby Island--a community that currently lacks reliable wireless connectivity in most areas.
- The proposed facility will support economic development, remote working capabilities as well as improve public safety given that greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders including 911 are now placed via cell phones.
- Rogers extensively pre-consulted key stakeholders including relevant First Nations, emergency responders and the MFLNRO to identify a responsible location for the proposed infrastructure that aligns with the Hornby Island Land Use Bylaw and Islands Trust protocols.

#### **Description of Proposed Site**

- Rogers is proposing the construction of a 63.0 meter tall self-support tower structure on Provincial Crown land on the west side of Central Road.
- The approximate coordinates of the tower are as follows: 49.535055, -124.672134.
- If constructed, all of the equipment necessary to operate this facility will reside within a fenced compound located at the base of the tower.
- The subject property was selected for the following reasons:
  - Pre-consultation: Rogers pre-consulted key stakeholders including relevant First Nations, emergency responders, the MFLNRO (BC Government) and Islands Trust staff to identify a responsible location for the proposed infrastructure that aligns with the Hornby Island Land Use Bylaw and Islands Trust protocols.
  - Land Use: According to the Hornby Island Land Use Bylaw, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations as evidenced by the existing radiocommunication facilities on directly adjacent properties at the local radio station and fire hall. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation). Adjacent land uses include the Hornby Island Fire Rescue property, the CHFR Hornby Community Radio Society property including an existing radiocommunication facility, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot, the Hornby Island Road Maintenance Yard, Joe King Ball Park and other mixed commercial and public service uses. #### Figure 1 - Land Use Context




#### ADJACENT LAND USES

- · Hornby Island Fire Rescue property

- Society including an existing radiocommunication facility

- Supporting Infrastructure: The subject location is directly adjacent to existing access and power, thereby minimizing the need for Rogers to clear trees for the construction of a road and power line.
  - Access: Rogers does not require a new road in order to access the proposed facility. Specifically, the site will be accessed from Central Road (public road) and via an upgrade to an existing approximately 120-meter long road that connects the proposed tower site to Central Road. The existing road will require brushing and minor grading. Rogers will not block the existing trail network in the area.
  - Power: A 110 m long power line running from an existing power pole on the south side of Central Road will be required. The power line will start at an existing BC Hydro distribution pole and will run for approximately 32 meters south to the existing road and continue southwest toward the tower site in an underground PVC conduit.
- Aesthetics: The proposed tower is setback into a large vacant lot and mature tree screening will minimize the visibility of the lower portion of the tower from most vantage points.
- **Network Architecture Needs:** The proposed facility will tie into Rogers' existing network and and will deliver reliable connectivity to the majority of households on Hornby Island.
- Co-location Viability: Rogers has expressed a willingness to co-operate with co-location requests in accordance with Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada protocols and has specifically advised TELUS regarding this proposed facility at the suggestion of numerous local stakeholders including the Islands Trust. In response to receiving preliminary co-location inquiries, Rogers has also expressed to a number of local emergency service providers that it would be willing to explore hosting emergency communications equipment on the tower structure.

Site Plan (for discussion purposes only)




### **Existing Structures**

- Rogers confirms that there no existing antenna support structures of a suitable height or location that it can co-locate on in the Hornby Island community.
- The proposed facility will enable opportunities for tower sharing or co-location applications by third party service providers.

### Visibility

- The proposed tower location will be visible within the community; however, Rogers is proposing a self-support lattice tower structure of the minimum height required to see over the adjacent trees and deliver reliable service to the majority of Hornby Island.
- Rogers is proposing to site the tower in a location that is respectfully setback from adjacent uses. There are no immediately adjacent residential uses at the time of this proposal.
- Mature trees on the subject property will offer some screening from various vantage points.

### **Consultation Process & Summary**

#### BC Government Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites, the ISED Default Consultation Process and the Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems

Rogers began pre-consulting the Islands Trust Planning Department staff regarding this proposal on June 10th, 2022. At that time, the Islands Trust Planning Manager (who has since departed the organization) correctly advised Rogers that the Hornby Island Local Trust Committee (LTC) had not formally adopted the Islands Trust *Model Strategy for Antenna Systems*. It was therefore determined that the ISED Default Consultation Process would be applicable to Rogers' proposal; however, in addition to the baseline federal consultation requirements it was recommended that Rogers also host a digital public meeting as way to welcome broader community engagement. Rogers agreed that it would adhere to the ISED Default Process and add a public meeting component as well as seek ways to voluntarily align with the *Model Strategy for Antenna Systems* given that the model strategy is largely aligned with the ISED protocols in terms of consultation requirements.

Another critical consideration is that Rogers' proposed facility is on Provincial Crown land and given that the BC Government is the applicable land use authority for this proposal Rogers is required to adhere to the province's tower siting policy known as the *Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites*. More information on the province's policy can be found in **Appendix A**.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, Rogers has completed the following steps in order to meet and exceed the requirements stipulated in the above referenced protocols.

- Pre-consultation with Key Stakeholders June-July, 2022
  - Islands Trust Planning Department Staff: Prior to finalizing any proposed tower siting option, Rogers pre-consulted Islands Trust Planning Department staff. The initial preconsultation correspondence commenced on June 10, 2022 and by June 14, 2022 Islands Trust confirmed that the ISED Default Consultation Process would be applicable as the LTC had not yet adopted any additional consultation procedures. Please refer to Appendix B.
  - BC Government (MFLNRO Staff): Rogers engaged in detailed discussions with MFLNRO staff to explore several tower siting options including on Crown Grant lands at the Hornby Island Fire Hall property and several adjacent crown land options. Upon a thorough review, MFLNRO staff advised Rogers that the current proposed location appeared to be the most supportable as there were no concerns, overlapping tenure applications or any other foreseeable issues. Please refer to Appendix C.
  - Fire Department and Comox Valley Regional District (CVRD) Staff: Rogers also engaged in detailed discussions with CVRD and Hornby Island Fire Department staff to explore whether it may be viable to site a tower at the local fire hall. Although this option was explored in earnest, it was determined by MFLNRO staff that Rogers would not be authorized to secure the necessary land rights to use space within the Crown Grant property.
- Crown Land Application August, 2022

Rogers submitted its application via Front Counter BC on August 17<sup>th</sup>, 2022. Concurrently, Rogers sent referrals to approximately twelve (12) First Nations as identified via the BC Government First Nation Consultation Areas Database. Rogers' application is still under review and the notification, consultation and referral process outlined in the above referenced *Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites* will be adhered to in due course once Rogers is prompted to do so by MFLNRO staff.

#### • Public Consultation and Notification

Rogers has completed the following consultation and notification processes:

- Mail-out Notification On November 14<sup>th</sup>, 2022 notification packages welcoming public input until January 13, 2023 (greater than the required 30 day comment period) were sent to all property owners/occupants within a radius of three times the proposed tower height. The package included an invitation to a digital public meeting. The address list for the mail-out was reviewed by MFLNRO staff, Islands Trust staff and ISED. Please refer to Appendix D for a copy of the mail-out package.
- Newspaper Notification Rogers posted public notices in four (4) publications including:

   a) The Islands Grapevine on November 24<sup>th</sup> and December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022; b) The Comox
   Valley Record on November 23<sup>rd</sup> and November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022; c) the December issue of The First Edition; and d) the November 30<sup>th</sup> edition of the Hornby Tribune. Please refer to

   Appendix E for copies of the newspaper notices.
- Public information meeting On December 8<sup>th</sup>, 2022, Rogers hosted a digital public information meeting via Microsoft Teams as a courtesy in order to provide a broader opportunity for public engagement. The meeting was well attended by approximately thirty-one (31) community members who logged in. Please refer to Appendix F for a copy of the slides that were shared at the digital public meeting.

In addition to completing the above processes, as outlined above, Rogers will upon request from MFLNRO staff subsequently complete the duplicative notification procedures as set forth in the province's tower siting policy known as the *Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites*. This will entail a duplicative or additional newspaper notification and another round of direct referrals to the relevant First Nations and other stakeholders by MFLNRO staff. Upon completion of the procedures outlined in the province's *Land Use Operational Policy for Communication Sites*, Rogers will summarize the results of the consultation and request a motion or letter of land use concurrence via the relevant land use authority in order to satisfy MFLNRO and ISED requirements. Through the province's consultation process, the Islands Trust will receive a referral and Rogers respectfully requests support from the Island's Trust.

#### **Public Comments**

During the initial public comment period as stipulated in the above referenced ISED Default Consultation Process and Islands Trust *Model Strategy for Antenna Systems*, Rogers directly received comments from a total of one hundred and twenty-one (121) community members. Of the comments received:

- thirty-five (35) or 28.93% indicated support for the proposal;
- forty (40) or 33.06% did not state support or opposition and rather asked for information such as login details for the digital public meeting;
- and forty-six (46) or 38.02% stated concerns or opposition to the proposal.
- In sum, the majority of commenters (61.99%) either indicated support or were seeking information about the proposal and did not state a position, whereas a minority of commenters (38.02%) indicated concerns or non-support.

The primary reasons for support included public safety and a need to support emergency response services as well as a desire for improved connectivity throughout the community. Primary reasons for non-support include perceived health impacts or a desire to debate Health Canada's Safety Code 6 (this subject is outside the scope of this consultation as per ISED protocols), aesthetic concerns, a view that there should be no such facility anywhere on Hornby Island, environmental preservation considerations, the siting of the facility and whether it may impact alternative uses such as a housing project on the subject property, concerns about the consultation process amongst other concerns. In the spirit of full transparency, copies of all correspondence received and responses provided with personal contact information redacted is included in the **Appendix G** of this document.

APPLICATION:	Applies to Crown land used for communication use as defined herein, including but not limited to radio, television, microwave, and satellite facilities and related works. Applies on Crown land located in provincial forest except for communication sites used for operational purposes by the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development.
ISSUANCE:	Assistant Deputy Minister, Rural Development, Lands and Innovation
IMPLEMENTATION:	Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development
REFERENCES:	Land Act (Ch. 245, R.S.B.C., 1996) Business Corporations Act (Ch. 57 R.S.B.C, 2002)

# 1. POLICY APPLICATION

This policy applies to the disposition of Crown land for communication site purposes including, but not limited to all types of radio, television, microwave, satellite, and cellular transmission and/or receiving stations.

This policy does not apply to communications sites within Provincial Forest that are used solely for forest operational purposes, and therefore authorized under forest legislation.

This policy does not apply to uses ancillary to the communication site, such as roads and utility lines, that are authorized in accordance with other Crown land use policies.

# 2. PRINCIPLES AND GOALS

For information on Crown land allocation principles see Crown Land Allocation Principles.

## **Strategic Principles**

- To encourage efficient administration of Crown land used for communication purposes.
- To ensure diligent use of Crown land.
- To secure a fair return to the Crown for the use of Crown land for communication purposes.
- To minimize the potential negative impacts of communication use on other legitimate users and the natural environment.
- To coordinate Crown land administration with the requirements of other provincial and federal agencies with responsibility for communication licensing and/or administration.

## **Sharing of Tenured Communication Sites**

Sharing of communication sites is encouraged. A communication site tenure holder may permit a secondary user to occupy a Crown land site pursuant this policy. For the purposes of this policy secondary user means any party, other than the tenure holder, who occupies a Crown land site for communication use purposes including corporate affiliates and third parties.

## Site Designation under Section 17 of the Land Act

Mountain tops having strategic value for communication purposes will normally be designated for communication use pursuant to Section 17 of the *Land Act*.

# 4. APPLICANT ELIGIBILITY

Federal and provincial government agencies requiring Crown land for communication site purposes may also apply under this policy.

# 5.1 Licence of Occupation

A licence of occupation is the standard form of tenure for communication sites. The maximum term of a licence of occupation is 30 years.

# 5.2 Lease

The maximum term for a lease is 30 years.

Non-mountain top sites in populated areas may be disposed of by lease or sold in fee simple, provided they are within a municipality and border on privately owned land. A lease is offered where a site meets the above criteria but does not meet requirements for subdivision under the *Land Title Act*.

# 5.3 Statutory Right of Way

A statutory right of way may be offered for mountain top sites at the request of a client where there are (will be) significant improvements on the land and where a document registerable in the Land Title Office is required for financing/security purposes.

At the request of a client, the Authorizing Agency may agree to convert an existing licence to a statutory right of way provided that every party on the mountain top (subtenants of the applicant and all adjacent tenure holders) agrees to the conversion. It is the responsibility of the applicant to provide written evidence of such support to the Authorizing Agency.

The maximum term of a statutory right of way for communication sites is 30 years.

# 5.4 Sale

Non-mountain top sites in populated areas may be sold in fee simple, provided they are within a municipality and border on privately owned land.

# 5.5 Withdrawals and Land Act Transfers

**Withdrawals:** A withdrawal from disposition pursuant to Section 16 of the *Land Act* is the standard means to reserve land for provincial and federal government users that require Crown land for communication purposes. The Authorizing Agency must be advised prior to the occupation of a section 16 withdrawal site by another government user. In this policy "government users" means agencies or departments of a provincial or federal government but does not include Crown Corporations or local governments. Non-government users are not allowed to occupy sites authorized by a section 16 withdrawal.

**Land Act Transfers:** Where a non-government user is unable to find an alternate site, the Authorizing Agency may, with the consent of the agency holding the withdrawal for communication purposes, agree to the use of the site by a non-government user. In such instances the section 16 withdrawal will be cancelled and a transfer processed pursuant to Section 106 (provincial ministries) or Section 31 (federal ministries) of the *Land Act*. Where this occurs the agency receiving the transfer of administration assumes the responsibilities for management of the site, including the issuance of tenures and collection of rents specified in this policy from secondary users.

Alternatively the agency holding the withdrawal may relinquish the withdrawal and become a subtenant in a site which would be tenured to the non-government user.

The Authorizing Agency must be notified prior to the occupation of a transfer site by a secondary user.

# 7.1 Applications

## 7.1.1 Application Package and Communication Site Inventory

## **Communication Site Inventory**

The communication site inventory is a critical component of the application package as it is the basis for calculating annual rental payments for the site.

Where the Authorizing Agency has been unable to obtain inventory information from a client, staff may use the best available information to establish an appropriate rent for the site under this policy. This may be based on site inspection, Industry Canada Information or file information as appropriate.

The inventory for a communication site will consist of the full names of all users on the site and the purpose of the use (e.g. remote monitoring of equipment, emergency dispatch, cellular telephone service, internet services) for each user. The completed Communication Site Inventory form must be signed and dated by the tenure holder.

A site plan in plan view locating the civil infrastructure (building, towers, guy wires, power lines, roads) on the site will also be required for all new sites. A survey plan or reference sketch prepared by a B.C. Land Surveyor may be required.

Verification material (e.g. radio licences, sub-tenure agreements) to support the information contained in the inventory will not be collected as part of the regular inventory process. However, legal tenure documents reserve the right for the province to audit sites to confirm the inventory and to obtain such information if necessary. In this policy sub-tenure agreement means an agreement between the tenure holder and a secondary user to use and occupy a communications site for purposes specified in the tenure document.

## Site Size

The area of a communication site tenure should reflect the needs of the applicant as well as the principles of efficient and diligent use of Crown land. In high use areas, clients should be encouraged to use self-supporting rather than guyed towers.

## **Survey Monuments**

A communications site must not interfere with existing trigonometric control stations, Order in Council reserves surrounding them, and survey rays to such stations. The Surveyor General Division of the Land Title and Survey Authority should be contacted if there is a concern in this regard.

## 7.1.2 Referrals

A completed communication site questionnaire and site plan should accompany referrals for new sites.

Changes in "communication users" or changes to existing sites that will result in significant alteration of the physical structures on the site may be referred as deemed appropriate by the Authorizing Agency.

## 7.1.3 Designation of Sites for Communication Purposes

Mountain tops having strategic value for communication purposes (existing and new communication sites) will normally be designated for communication site use pursuant to S. 16 or S.17 of the *Land Act.* An area of suitable size to accommodate future communication sites should be contained within the area designated under S. 16 or S.17.

Such a designation will enable streamlining of the tenuring process for new sites as well as the consent process for existing sites where changes to civil infrastructure are occurring. All referrals/ consultation will occur at the designation stage (i.e. new applications within the designation area will not require subsequent referral).

## 7.1.4 Interim Consents

Where a S. 17 designation is not in place, the Authorizing Agency may consent to the placement of additional civil infrastructure on an existing communication site on an interim basis pending completion of referrals, advertising or other approvals as may be required.

This option should be considered in low risk situations where it is unlikely that the location of additional facilities will result in a negative decision.

The facilities should be of temporary nature (i.e. not fixed to the ground) and the client must understand that if final consent is not granted, the facilities must be removed as soon as is reasonably possible, at the cost of the client.

# 8. TENURE ADMINISTRATION

For standard tenure administration information see the <u>Tenure Administration Procedure</u>.

For information on insurance and financial securities, see the <u>Insurance and Financial Securities</u> <u>Procedure</u>.

Additional and special requirements for communications site allocations are:

# 8.1 Assignment and Sub-Tenuring

## 8.1.1 Sub-tenuring Procedures

A tenure holder who wishes to share a communication site with another user (corporate affiliate or third party) may do so without the Authorizing Agency's consent, provided that the changes proposed do not affect the civil infrastructure on the site. Where the civil infrastructure is not affected, the tenure holder must **notify** the Authorizing Agency of the sub-tenure and any changes in use on the site a minimum of 120 days prior to the next anniversary date of the tenure. Notification shall be in the form of a signed and dated Communications Site Inventory form (and tower profile if an antenna is added to the site).

If the proposed changes affect the civil infrastructure, **prior consent** of the Authorizing Agency will be required to authorize the changes. In such instances, payment of *Land Act* fees (as per the <u>*Crown*</u> <u>*Land Fees Regulation*</u>) will also be required.

Under the terms of the tenure agreement, the tenure holder is responsible for the site (including subtenant activities, liability and contamination) and for paying rent for the site, including that attributable to subtenant(s) communication uses.

The province reserves the right to obtain site use information (e.g. radio license information, copies of sub-tenure agreements) from a tenure holder where deemed necessary by regional staff to resolve a dispute or clarify the current use of a site.

## 8.1.2 Overlapping Tenures

In special circumstances a tenure may be issued over an existing communication site tenure (e.g. strategic sites; guy-wires crossing into another tenure). For an overlapping tenure to be considered the two users must each have their own facilities, and consent of both parties must be obtained. If sharing of facilities is occurring, then a sub-tenure situation exists and separate tenures are not available.

# 8.2 Monitoring and Enforcement

The tenure holder is responsible for keeping the Authorizing Agency apprised of changes in use in accordance with requirements set out in the land tenure document. Where inventory information provided by a tenure holder for the site does not coincide with actual site use, provisions of Section 59 of the *Land Act* may be applied.

## 8.2.1 Updating the Communications Site Inventory

A change in use which affects the civil infrastructure requires the prior consent of the province. The site plan will have to be updated to reflect such changes. <u>Crown Land Fees Regulation</u> fees will be payable.

A change which does not affect the civil infrastructure (i.e. any change to the use on a site which can be recorded on the inventory form or tower profile only) does not require consent. However provincial staff must be **notified** of such changes 120 days prior to the next anniversary date (billing date) of the tenure.

Notification will be in the form of an up-to-date communication site inventory form (and tower profile if required), signed and dated by the client.

The onus is on the tenure holder to maintain the inventory in up-to-date status. The Authorizing Agency will not request annual confirmations of inventory information.

## 8.2.2 Site Inspections

At the discretion of the Authorizing Agency, inspections of sites may be undertaken to verify inventory information. These audits will normally be conducted by Authorizing Agency staff, and may involve participation of a communications engineer or other advisors familiar with communications equipment and use. Trespass action may be taken where a site inspection does not correlate with inventory information.

The Authorizing Agency may request a tenure holder to provide transportation, at no cost to the province, to enable inspections of remote sites. Such site inspections will be coordinated with routine maintenance trips to the site by the tenure holder.

Hi David:

I hope this email finds you well. Further to my voicemail message from today, I am a land use consultant representing Rogers Communications regarding a proposed communication site at the Hornby Island Volunteer Fire Department property. I have attached some additional information in the attached PDF including an aerial photo identifying the approximate proposed location and some photos from our site visit during which we met the fire chief, Mr. Doug Chinnery.

In addition to pre-consulting the fire department staff, we have also discussed this idea with the Comox Valley Regional District (CVRD) GM of Community Services, Doug DeMarzo since the CVRD holds the Crown Grant for the fire hall (please refer to the last page of the attached PDF for more information on the Crown Grant). Mr. DeMarzo advised that while he and the fire hall are okay to consider the idea of hosting the tower at the fire hall property, it would be prudent for us to first pre-consult the Islands Trust as the land use authority.

Based on the foregoing, I am writing to welcome your input on this proposal. We understand that this proposal will be subject to public consultation and we would appreciate your guidance regarding any tower siting policies or protocols that we may need to adhere to.

Finally, I wanted to express our rationale for this proposal. In summary, I was previously involved on a TELUS proposal on Hornby Island that did not go very smoothly as the tower location was not well received by the community. This time around, I am hoping to be thoughtful in finding a community supported location for a tower so that service can be delivered to the area in an acceptable manner. We are hopeful that the fire hall may be a suitable location for numerous reasons including:

- It is respectfully setback from adjacent neighbours and residences;
- mature trees on site will partially block the lower portion of the tower and improve aesthetics;

- power and access are already available on the subject property, mitigating the need for Rogers to clear more land to build a road and power line to service the tower -- a more ecologically sensitive approach;
- The fire hall (and perhaps the directly adjacent radio station) could consider hosting their antennas on the tower in support of emergency response services and local media content, if desired;
- The CVRD and through them the local volunteer fire hall will receive greatly needed revenue from leasing out the space for the tower to Rogers. This is often preferred vs. having the tower on privately owned property where one single property owner will receive the benefits.

If possible, we would sincerely appreciate your input at your earliest convenience as to whether this proposal may be acceptable from a land use perspective in terms of Rogers going through a public consultation process for this location.

In light of your most recent feedback, we are exploring some alternative tower siting options on adjacent lands. Before we get ahead of ourselves, we are wondering if we could welcome your input on the below possible options.

<u>Option 1 (49.535333, -124.671722)</u>: There appears to be no encumbrances on the land at this location and this appears to be the easiest location (no encumbrances and access will be entirely held by proponent). However, as you point out there is a walking path there, so public commenting may be a consideration. \_

- · Located on walking path in the trees, across the street from the firehall
- · Close to main road for power and access
- · Unsure of possible restrictions building near walking path
- Highest elevation of all options (good for coverage)

Option 2 (49.537194, -124.671722): There appears to be a Sec. 16 Withdrawal from Disposition (Land Files 0098244 & 1401445) for sand & gravel held by MOTI at this location and access may need to be considered as access is over the

private lands unless new access established. This type of conflict can be resolved in most cases, but the process can be timely and not a guarantee.

- Located at the back of a construction yard currently being used by road works.
- Existing access through yard to site location
- · Power would have to go through trees from central rd, or follow site access road

<u>Option 3 (49.535824, -124.669297)</u>: There appears to be a Sec. 16 Withdrawal from Disposition (Land File1401445) for sand & gravel held by MOTI at this location and access may need to be considered as access is over the private lands.

- · Located in the corner of the firehall lot, in the trees
- Simple access through firehall
- Power either from BC Hydro poles or firehall building (feasibility to be confirmed with electrical engineer)
- We would need confirmation from the Crown as to whether this would be okay or not as we'd need to cross the fire hall crown grant lot to access this site.

Hello Brian,

I was not recommending Rodgers purchase the land at fair market value but rather the fire department. This would allow them to do what they wish with the lands.

It is probably easier to apply a licence over other Crown land as apposed to amending the SCG.

The province does not have administrative capacity over the lands identified by SCGs, we simply ensure the intent is upheld in the public interest, so we would not be able to impose rents or administer a tenure/subtenure any of these lands.

I agree, the ancillary uses that run with the firehall are allowed and I don't think the province or public would perceive these items to be a stretch from the intention of the SCG. If the firehall was to erect a tower for the *sole purpose* of their needs, this too would most likely be perceived as firehall use.

If the proposal was part of the larger connectivity project, we would possibly explore options. I only brought it up to ensure the decision maker considered all relevant info before providing direction.

Although slightly different form airports, the same rational applies and we must be very carful about precedent – this is not a unique situation and parallels can be perceived. As noted above, paying a licencing fee to the province is not possible so this would not change our perspective.

You mention very good points that may go along way to support the need; however, we must ensure consistency and fairness when making decisions – it was decided when issuing the SCG that the land will be granted for Firehall purposes only. Another decision would need to be made to allow for additional uses such as this proposal.

Thanks for your input, Jesse, and for your time over the phone on Friday.

I have a few questions and comments for your consideration.

- What would the process be to amend the Crown Grant, if we were to explore this? We do not buy land and rather would typically seek a licence (or sublicence) agreement on crown land. We understand and always anticipated a fulsome consultation and application process for this tower, including consultation (as is required for every tower), and usually we have to go through the crown consultation and referral process in any event. I have attached a copy of the *Crown Land Use Operational Policy: Communication Sites* that we typically follow for such proposals on crown land. This process usually takes a fair bit of time -- over 1 year on average apparently -- and so maybe it is a similar timeframe to amend a Crown Grant. What are your thoughts?

- What if we were pay the typical crown licence fees to the province - for instance, the same fees we would pay on any adjacent crown land just outside the fire hall area? ### 10.1 Rent

### 10.1.1 Licences, Leases and Statutory Rights-of-Way

Rent for Crown land used for communication purposes is based on the zone and user category rent table shown below. Refer to the zone maps **COMMUNICATION SITES – PRICING ZONE MAPS** for the zone locations.

This would be an objective set of fees payable to the Crown no different than any other crown land communication site. Perhaps no fees go to the CVRD or fire hall if that's a concerning precedent that you wish to avoid. Could that be an option?

- Has it been fully considered that providing communication services is an ancillary and integral use of running any fire hall and that all the existing ancillary uses of a fire hall were not directly considered in your crown grant document? For instance, most fire halls including this one have their own communications equipment including towers and antennas on site. Most fire halls also have other utility services -- telephone (landline), electrical, water, sewage, parking lots, etc. -- and none of those uses would likely be deemed outside the scope of the Crown Grant because it would not be feasible to run a modern fire hall without such utility services and ancillary uses. Specifically, one could make a case that being able to host and complete emergency communications over a wireless network is a similar utility service relative to those already on site (e.g. landlines) given that 80% of calls to emergency responders such as 911, fire halls, ambulance services etc. are now placed via cell phones. My suggestion here is that Rogers service offerings are akin to a utility type service that both fire hall staff and community members rely on to operate the stated fire hall use in the crown grant. It is my suggestion that although these specific utility type uses are not specified in the crown grant that they are ancillary to the authorized use otherwise the fire hall use would not be feasible to carry out properly. If Hornby Island residents cannot place cell phone calls for help, the fire hall use may not be operating at its maximum capacity.

- If the fire hall were to install a tower and Rogers were to propose to co-locate on the facility, as preferred by ISED (federal government agency), would that be considered potentially appropriate via the Crown Grant? Is that an avenue to potentially explore?

- During our call, you noted that there may be an avenue to explore re: folding this proposal into the Connectivity Project (provincial program) and that this may be helpful if it were to qualify. Is that still an option? Sam (cc'd) is looking into this but would you be able to comment on how this would work?

- Finally, I understand that during our phone call some concerns were stated re: setting a precedent about crown grant holders being able to sublease space for profit and our proposal may be interpreted as such a potential precedent. You mentioned the case of airports on crown grants wherein some airport operators have wanted to set up commercial retail units or sublicence space at such crown grant ariports for profit. I understand this concern though I think a utility structure like a cell tower is not really a direct comparable to leasing out a commercial retail unit at an airport. Our use may be more comparable to utilities like phone lines. This is more about service delivery. If we were to remove the profit element (though we were hoping to help out the fire hall) and instead pay crown licence fees as noted above, would this change the perspective?

At the end of the day, as you know, we are simply looking for the most sound land use rationale to deliver the proposed infrastructure on Hornby Island. We are looking for a community appropriate proposal. It struck us that the fire hall is perhaps the most rational location for such a facility as there is an opportunity to co-locate and benefit a local volunteer organization. If this approach is not feasible, I think the outcome may be to propose a tower on directly adjacent crown lands which is effectively a similar or the same outcome in terms of land use but it removes our ability to cooperate with a local fire hall which we thought was a creative and logical concept.

I wonder if you would have any comments on the above questions or if this is a "final" decision and we need to move onto other adjacent lands. I would welcome your input.

Hi Jesse:

The intent is a new proposed tower (subject to full public consultation) and it would be joint use for fire hall communications equipment and Rogers' equipment co-located on the remainder of the tower. This will enhance emergency communication services and also mitigate a redundant purpose built structure in the area. We are not aware of a more suitable location for a tower in the community as the subject property is a fire hall and directly adjacent is a radio station and crown land. I think such a facility could be considered integral to the operations of the fire hall and also ancillary equipment to the existing facilities. There is likely other ancillary equipment at any fire hall and as you know most or many fire halls have antennas and communications equipment on them (similar to RCMP detachments, etc.).

The fire chief has been supportive of this concept because I believe they need the emergency communications services and infrastructure and also the tower lease revenue would be appreciated as they are a volunteer organization. If there is an issue of the Crown needing or requiring a licence fee for the communication site then that can of course be discussed as well as those are well established fees. We are not looking for a "free ride" and rather would like to find a successful location from a land use and community planning perspective. The Crown could perhaps update the Crown Grant and include some of the typical fees for communication sites as usually stipulated via the communication site inventory that we normally provide via our crown licences of occupation for communication sites. I'm not sure if that is part of the concern.

If this is particular proposal is not successful, then our next course of action, I think, would be to propose a crown licence of occupation for a communication site and power line on directly adjacent crown lands which would hypothetically (if approved) result in the same or a similar outcome but then the fire hall would not necessarily be a partner or beneficiary.

We are mindful of how challenging it can be to service a community like Hornby and sharing a facility with the fire hall appears to be a collaborative approach that we are hopeful will provide broader community benefits.

I think we are open to creative solutions here. I've copied the Government Relations Team at Rogers and ISED in case they have any thoughts as well.

The fire hall has communications equipment (antennas) on site, I think. What if the tower were to contain communications equipment for the fire hall and we were merely to co-locate on the structure, as encouraged by Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada? Would that make any difference?

Also, it might be considered that 80% of calls to emergency responders, including fire halls, are now placed via cell phones. I wonder if based on the foregoing having communication services may be considered entirely relevant to providing comprehensive fire hall services, via the Crown Grant.

Another thought -- I imagine the fire hall has other telecom services, utility services (e.g. BC Hydro) etc. that are not directly contemplated in the Crown Grant but that are critical for the operation of a fire hall. Having cell<sub>1</sub>

phone service may also be considered critical.

What do you think of this rationale? ISED is copied as well in case they wish to comment. Ultimately, we are trying to find a creative solution here.



I hope this email finds you well. Further to my voicemail message from today, I am a land use consultant representing Rogers Communications regarding a proposed communication site at the Hornby Island Volunteer Fire Department property. I have attached some additional information in the attached PDF including an aerial photo identifying the approximate proposed location and some photos from our site visit during which we met the fire chief, Mr. Doug Chinnery.

In addition to pre-consulting the fire department staff, we have also discussed this idea with the Comox Valley Regional District (CVRD) GM of Community Services, Doug DeMarzo since the CVRD holds the Crown Grant for the fire hall (please refer to the last page of the attached PDF for more information on the Crown Grant). Mr. DeMarzo advised that while he and the fire hall are okay to consider the idea of hosting the tower at the fire hall property, it would be prudent for us to first pre-consult the Islands Trust as the land use authority.

Based on the foregoing, I am writing to welcome your input on this proposal. We understand that this proposal will be subject to public consultation and we would appreciate your guidance regarding any

tower siting policies or protocols that we may need to adhere to.

Finally, I wanted to express our rationale for this proposal. In summary, I was previously involved on a TELUS proposal on Hornby Island that did not go very smoothly as the tower location was not well received by the community. This time around, I am hoping to be thoughtful in finding a community supported location for a tower so that service can be delivered to the area in an acceptable manner. We are hopeful that the fire hall may be a suitable location for numerous reasons including:

- It is respectfully setback from adjacent neighbours and residences;
- mature trees on site will partially block the lower portion of the tower and improve aesthetics;
- power and access are already available on the subject property, mitigating the need for Rogers to clear more land to build a road and power line to service the tower -- a more ecologically sensitive approach;
- The fire hall (and perhaps the directly adjacent radio station) could consider hosting their antennas
  on the tower in support of emergency response services and local media content, if desired;
- The CVRD and through them the local volunteer fire hall will receive greatly needed revenue from leasing out the space for the tower to Rogers. This is often preferred vs. having the tower on privately owned property where one single property owner will receive the benefits.

If possible, we would sincerely appreciate your input at your earliest convenience as to whether this proposal may be acceptable from a land use perspective in terms of Rogers going through a public consultation process for this location.

Wireless technology offers many benefits to Canadians. Millions of individuals rely on wireless communications to enhance their personal security and safety, enjoy more frequent contact with family, friends and business associates, and to make more productive use of their personal and professional time. Additionally, cellular coverage improves public safety, with more than 80 percent of all calls to 9-11 now placed through wireless devices.

### **ROGERS PROPOSAL**

In order to provide dependable wireless service for residents and businesses on Hornby Island Rogers Communications is proposing to build a 63.0-meter tall self-support tower on Provincial Crown land on the west side of Central Road on a property that is zoned PU-Public Use. Adjacent land uses include the Hornby Island Fire Rescue property, the CHFR Hornby Community Radio Society property including an existing radiocommunication facility, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot, the Hornby Island Road Maintenance Yard, Joe King Ball Park and other mixed commercial and public service uses. If the subject tower is constructed, Rogers is willing to explore hosting emergency communications equipment from the volunteer fire department in support of public safety thereby enabling co-location and potentially mitigating the future need for another purpose built tower structure in the area. All of the equipment necessary to operate this facility will be housed within a fenced area located at the base of the tower. This location was selected as a result of the compatible land uses in the vicinity as well as the fact that the subject property is centrally located within the area needing Rogers' service improvements.

### PUBLIC CONSULTATION

#### Authority

Although Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED) has exclusive jurisdiction over the placement of wireless telecommunications facilities, it requires the carriers to consult with the local land use authority and the general public regarding new installations. The public consultation process is intended to provide an opportunity to have property owner questions addressed while respecting federal jurisdiction over the installation and operations of telecommunications systems.

#### **ISED's Default Public Consultation**

ISED has jurisdiction over telecommunications facilities and has set out public and land use authority consultation requirements in the ISED circular, CPC-2-0-03 (CPC) for telecommunication carriers. The CPC requires Rogers to consult with the local land use authority and the general public. Rogers is also required to provide notification packages to property owners within a radius of three times the proposed tower height, measured from the tower base or the outside perimeter of the supporting structure. The required notification radius in this instance is 189.0 meters. Your property falls within this notification radius, and accordingly, Rogers is consulting with you on this tower. This process will provide you with an opportunity to engage in reasonable, relevant, and timely communication regarding this proposal. This notification will also be submitted to the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (MFLNRO), the Islands Trust and ISED as part of our application for land use concurrence.

The public will also be invited to comment on the proposed site in response to a public notice that will be placed in two consecutive issues of *The Islands Grapevine* on November 24<sup>th</sup> and December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022 as well as two consecutive issues of the *Comox Valley Record* on November 23<sup>rd</sup> and November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022. The public will then have 30 days to submit comments and questions to myself on behalf of Rogers.

I will acknowledge receipt of comments and questions received within 14 days and address all relevant and reasonable concerns within 60 days. The commenting member of the public will then have 21 days to reply to the response. A summary of all comments received and our responses will then be submitted to ISED.

Rogers will host a digital public meeting via the Microsoft Teams application on **December 8<sup>th</sup>**, **2022** from **5:00-6:00 pm**. Please note that during the public meeting there will be two (2) presentations, including a presentation at 5:00 pm and another presentation at 5:30 pm. Each presentation will be followed by a question and answer period. For details regarding how to join the Microsoft Team meeting, please contact the Rogers contact listed below by no later than December 7<sup>th</sup>, 2022.

### Site Details


- 1. *Purpose* The purpose of the proposed tower is to expand Rogers' wireless coverage on Hornby Island. Currently, there are no suitable existing antenna support structures or other feasible structures that can be utilized and, as a result, a new tower is required. The tower, if constructed, will provide improved wireless connectivity in terms of reliability and speed for those in the vicinity of the facility.
- 2. Location and Land Use The proposed facility is to be located on Provincial Crown land on the west side of Central Road on a property that is zoned PU-Public Use. Adjacent land uses include the Hornby Island Fire Rescue property, the CHFR Hornby Community Radio Society property including an existing radiocommunication facility, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot, the Hornby Island Road Maintenance Yard, Joe King Ball Park and other mixed commercial and public service uses. If the subject tower is constructed, Rogers is willing to explore hosting emergency communications equipment from the volunteer fire department in support of public safety thereby enabling co-location and potentially mitigating the future need for another purpose-built tower structure in the area. The approximate coordinates of the proposed tower are 49.535055, -124.672134.
- 3. Safety Code 6 ISED requires all wireless carriers to operate in accordance with Health Canada's safety standards. Rogers confirms that the tower described in this notification package will be installed and operated on an ongoing basis so as to comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6 including combined effects with the local radio environment, as may be amended from time to time.
- 4. Site Access The site will be accessed via Central Road and via a small access driveway into the subject property. Construction will take approximately 60 days. Once complete the site will only be accessed for infrequent maintenance. Rogers' compound will be fully fenced and locked so as to limit public access.
- 5. *Environment* Rogers confirms that the installation is excluded from environmental assessment under the *Impact Assessment Act.*
- 6. Design This proposal is for a 60.0-meter tall self-support tower as well as a 3.0-meter tall lightning rod (63.0 meters of total height including the lightning rod). The tower will house numerous panel antennas and dishes in support of a variety of communication technologies. - 7. *Transport Canada* The tower will be marked in accordance with the Department of Transportation and NAV Canada requirements.
- 8. *Structural Considerations* Rogers confirms that the antenna structure described in this notification package will apply good engineering practices including structural adequacy during construction.
- 9. Land Use Authority Rogers will work closely with the Ministry of Forests, Lands, Natural Resource Operations and Rural Development (MFLNRO) and the Islands Trust to apply for land use concurrence and any applicable permits. The Islands Trust does not have an applicable Antenna Siting Protocol for Hornby Island and as such we are applying ISED's Default Public Consultation process in addition to the Crown Land Use Operational Policy - Communication Sites.
- 10. Co-location Rogers will consider all applications for tower sharing and co-location in accordance with ISED protocols.




### Federal (ISED) and Provincial Consultation Processes

- In order to proceed with this proposal, Rogers is undertaking this consultation process in alignment with the ISED Default Public Consultation Process with an expanded public meeting component.
- Via this expanded process, Rogers has posted multiple newspaper notices as well as online via social media, sent direct referrals to area property owners/occupants as well as engaged the Crown, Islands Trust and all relevant First Nations as identified in the *Provincial First Nation Consultation Areas Database*.
  - 1. Mail-out Notification Notification packages welcoming public input until January 13, 2023 (greater than the required 30 day comment period) were sent to all property owners/occupants within a radius of three times the proposed tower height. The package included an invitation to tonight's public meeting. The address list was reviewed by the Crown, Islands Trust and ISED.
  - 2. Newspaper Notification Rogers posted public notices in four (4) publications including: a) The Islands Grapevine on November 24<sup>th</sup> and December 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022; b) The Comox Valley Record on November 23<sup>rd</sup> and November 30<sup>th</sup>, 2022; c) the December issue of The First Edition; and d) the November 30<sup>th</sup> edition of the Hornby Tribune.
  - **3. Public information meeting** Rogers is hosting tonight's digital public information meeting as a courtesy in order to provide a broader opportunity for public engagement.
  - 4. Land Use Concurrence At the end of the public comment period, Rogers will summarize the results of the consultation and request a motion or letter of land use concurrence via the relevant land use authorities.
- Subsequent to the ISED Default Consultation Process, Rogers will adhere to the Provincial Crown referral and consultation process as stipulated in the *Crown Land Use Operational Policy Communication Sites*. This will entail additional referrals to First Nations, land tenure holders and additional public notices (duplicative processes since there are overlapping federal and provincial consultation requirements).
- At the end of the duplicative Crown consultation and referral process, the Crown via the Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (MFLNRO) will determine whether to grant Rogers a Licence of Occupation for the proposed communication site and ancillary access and utility uses.


### Why Does the Network Need To Be Improved?

- The objective of the proposed facility is to provide reliable wireless service to the Hornby Island community including both voice and data services.
- The proposed infrastructure will provide significant emergency service benefits to residents as nearly 80% of emergency 911 calls are made from wireless devices.
- As of Q2 2022, Canadian wireless phone subscribers numbered approximately 33.5 million (Canadian Wireless Telecommunications Association).
- 31.88 million Canadians have a smartphone as of 2021 (Statistics Canada).
- Smart phones use more than 10 times the bandwidth of an ordinary cell phone, while tablets and laptops can consume more than 1000





### Proposed Tower Location - Aerial Photo and Summary of Adjacent Land Uses





### Proposed Design – Site Plan and Tower Profile



### Site Plan

- Rogers has made an effort to keep its space needs to a minimum:
  - Approximately 15.0 m x 15.0 meter tower compound size;
  - Existing access roads can be used with an upgrade to approximately 120 meters of existing, old road off Central road into the site.
  - A 110 meter long power line running from existing power on the south side of Central Road will be required. The power feed will tie into an existing hydro distribution pole and will continue underground.



### **Tower Profile**

- Rogers is proposing a self-support lattice tower structure rather than a guyed tower. This significantly reduces Rogers' footprint on the land.
- The tower height is 63.0 meters tall the minimum height needed to service the area reliably and to clear the adjacent mature trees and topography.
- Rogers will co-operate with applications for co-location (tower sharing) as per ISED requirements.




View Looking West From Central Road

### Health and Safety

- Canada has a rigorous safety code for devices that emit radio frequency (RF) energy.
- Specifically, wireless carriers in Canada must comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6 a standard that is comparable to the European Union safety regulations.
- Safety Code 6 was developed and updated in March of 2015 by Health Canada as the exposure standard for the regulation of mobile phones, base stations, Wi-Fi and other radio communications emitting infrastructure.
- The exposure limits are the result of thorough and ongoing scientific review and are comparable to similar safety codes in Europe, the USA,
   Japan and Australia. Safety Code 6 is based on peer reviewed science.
- Rogers attests that its installation will comply with Safety Code 6.



### **Next Steps**

- Public Consultation The public comment period for the federal (ISED) portion of this consultation will close on January 13<sup>th</sup>, 2023.
- Consultation Summary and Request for Land Use Concurrence Rogers will summarize the results of tonight's digital public meeting and the broader public consultation process for the Islands Trust, Crown and ISED.
- Land Use Concurrence The Islands Trust will review the results of the public consultation and determine whether or not to grant Rogers land use concurrence.
- Service Delivery If land use concurrence is granted, Rogers will work with the Crown to finalize its Licence of Occupation to enable service delivery on Hornby Island in accordance with the application submitted.

Good Afternoon Alex and Grant:

Thanks very much for your feedback.

Grant, hopefully you have now received the voicemail that I left with you yesterday. Perhaps we can arrange some time to discuss. If you wish to contact Rogers directly I have cc'd Claudia however I am representing Rogers on this project.

Alex, although we discussed these issues in detail over the phone, please find below my written responses in green text to your email from two days ago.

#### Dear Brian,

First, I am quite dismayed that I and my fellow local government representative, Grant Scott, have only just heard of the Rogers Cell Tower proposal from community members in the last two days. This is completely unacceptable. As we discussed, I had previously been working with Heather Kauer and now Sonja Zupanec at the Islands Trust for many months. We have also engaged the province via the MFLNRO. Through your planning department staff, we have welcomed input and offered to attend any upcoming LTC meetings. I look forward to any future opportunities for engagement. We would like to have transparent and open discussions regarding this proposal.

And to read that Rogers is only advertising in the Denman Island centric Grapevine paper and the Comox Valley Record at the end of this week is so out of touch. We actually have two local publications, of which I am editor of one. Would it not make sense to put something pertaining to Hornby Island in a local Hornby Island paper? The Grapevine and Comox Valley Record publications are what we understood to be the applicable publications. For instance, these are the same publications that TELUS was previously required to post its public notices in during their prior proposal which I managed and learned a lot from. We also welcomed input from the Islands Trust planning staff on our current consultation process prior to proceeding. Had we known that additional publications would be desired by you, we would have done so proactively. Notwithstanding the foregoing, I think we can work with you to add to the current notification process. I will do my best to achieve this if feasible.

For your information, I have now reached out to the additional publications that you have mentioned in your separate email. I am not sure if we will be able to achieve ISED's prescribed consultation timelines and the deadlines of these additional publications however I think we can commit to working with you to get the word out more broadly to the extent possible. I am aware that there is also much discussion ongoing on Facebook about this proposal. I think the word is out and we'll work with you to make sure that's the case.

You may also take heart in knowing that this notification process is only the first part of the federally regulated process. Subsequently, the province will also complete additional newspaper notices and referrals since this proposal is on provincial crown land. Thus, there will be plenty of opportunity to top up with additional notifications via the provincial consultation process subsequently which has not yet formally

# started. Indeed, when we site towers on provincial land there are duplicative federal and provincial consultation processes that we must undertake so you can be assured that there will be plenty of opportunity for additional notification.

The timing is so wrong and way too fast tracked. So many people are now traveling off island in the next month. A virtual meeting in December and the deadline for comments January 13? That is, with all due respect, ridiculous. And the virtual information meeting is December 6 where Grant and I have a Zoom Trust Council for three days starting on that day. No communication let alone consultation with either of us.

I am asking you to delay this whole proposal process until at least March 2023.

I think the best course of action at this stage is to proceed with the meeting and process as it has been advertised publicly. I would like to honour the public notices as some people have already requested to attend our meeting as planned. I am hopeful that you and/or Grant can attend however there is no obligation. If need be, we can look to potentially schedule an additional meeting in the new year although this is not part of the federal process. In any case, we are doing what we can to provide broader opportunities for public input.

I do not think that this process is fast tracked as you may have initially perceived. As noted above we still need to navigate the provincial referral process as well. We are only starting the first part of the process which is the federal (ISED) notification process.

#### There is First Nations involved.

The first step I undertook via this proposal was to notify and welcome input from all pertinent First Nations as identified by the province's First Nation Consultation Areas database. I have shared these referrals and all responses provided with the Islands Trust planning staff as well as the MFLNRO. The province also has a duty to consult First Nations and will subsequently send additional referrals to the same First Nations however we wanted to be proactive hence our early referrals to the relevant nations.

#### Our Housing Society has been looking at that location for years.

Rogers selected the proposed tower location based on a thorough pre-consultation with Islands Trust planning staff and the province. It is my understanding that this particular lot is one of the only locations on Hornby Island that allows for the proposed use.

Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation). While our federal use is not subject to zoning, we have sought to identify compatible zoning.

I would also suggest that while I understand there may be varying perspectives on this matter there is no reason in our view as to why the property could not potentially accommodate both housing and a communication site. There is already a radio station communication site nearby for instance.

#### And why do we need this, when we are having fibre optics installed?

Fibre optics will provide internet connectivity on a fixed basis to one's home or place of business. The proposed cell tower will provide mobile service in the broader community and surrounding waterways. This is complementary to the fibre optic service that you reference. Fibre optic service does not replace a need for mobile connectivity and mobile connectivity does not generally replace a need for fibre optic service. These are distinct yet complementary services and most communities desire both robust wireless and wireline (fibre) services.

You may also find it pertinent that 80% of calls to emergency responders such as 911 are now placed via cell phones so there is a public safety component to this proposal. Having cell service in remote areas of the island and waterways may save lives.

Was this an initiative from a group or individual on this island? I don't understand. This proposal was initiated by Rogers as there is not currently reliable service in the area. I could write more words, but for the sake of brevity, I will not now.

Once again I ask that you defer all this until March of next year, where we will have community members back from travels, and more focused without the distraction of the holidays (in person for many for years) and more time to digest.

As the federal consultation process has commenced and the notices are already out it will be our intent to continue with that. However, please be assured that there will be plenty of opportunities for additional engagement via the provincial referral and notification process. Realistically, this process will carry on throughout much of 2023 and we look forward to discussing this with you and your constituents further.

I have personally done considerable diligence prior to moving forward with this proposal. Rogers was initially wanting to propose a tower closer to the co-op in a more visible location however based on my prior experiences on Hornby Island I worked with the Rogers team, Islands Trust and province to put together this revised proposal with the objective of putting our best foot forward. I realize that there will be varying perspectives on such a proposal and we look forward to continuing the discussion.

After hearing the short on-line presentation and comments on Dec 8, 2022 on the proposed Rogers tower on Hornby, I would like to express my adamant opposition to this tower for the following reasons:

 The proposed site is also considered as the site for affordable housing, and the area required for the tower could be needed for septic fields or water wells. We have been advised that the subject crown land property has no other formal applications for other uses at this time, to the best of our knowledge. The subject lot is a large several hundred acre parcel and there is no reason that it cannot accommodate a communication site and housing or other uses. Rogers' footprint on the land will be 15 m x 15 m for its compound -- less than many adjacent single family homes.

#### Rogers will use mostly existing access and run power largely underground from Central Rd.

2. The 1 hour digital information meeting does not constitute an extensive public consultation, which is a requirement for this project according to the Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems, which was adopted by our Local Trustees on Sept 9, 2022. Rogers pre-consulted Islands Trust, ISED and provincial staff before commencing the consultation process. Rogers has been required to follow the ISED Default Consultation Process which does not include any requirement for a public meeting. Nonetheless, a digital meeting was hosted.

Rogers will be meeting with Islands Trust and ISED staff next week to discuss next steps to ensure that due process is adhered to. We heard about the Model Strategy but are not clear on what steps would need to be added to the process if we incorporate aspects of that into the process.

Certainly we will be discussing this but as of this time we are following the ISED process.

3. Within the 189 meters of the tower there may not be any residences but there are areas where people congregate, such as the recycling depot with workers and volunteers and users. Also Joe King park is within its reach, a place where people including children gather, play, eat, exercise. These people need more time and opportunity to evaluate and comment on the Rogers proposal, as asking people for input over the holiday season is rather inconsiderate of Rogers. Not everyone has access to internet.

Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall and their existing communication site directly to the east on Crown Grant land, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) and their existing radio tower also to the east, public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

Please be assured that only the first portion of the consultation has commenced (the federal portion). The provincial consultation and referral process has not yet commenced and will provide another opportunity for engagement.

Rogers is exploring opportunities for potential additional engagement.

- 4. It seems that the proposed access road to the tower area will be through an area that is currently blocked off to vehicular traffic to prevent access to illegal tree cutting and to getting closer to the recycling depot in the off hours to steal stuff. Also there is a walking, biking trail that goes from Central road to the Recycling Depot and past it, that will be crossed or overrun by the tower access road. Rogers has made an effort to use existing access with minor improvements so as to minimize tree clearing and ecological impacts. Rogers routinely gates its access driveways so as to limit public access and if that is deemed to be necessary in this instance Rogers would have no issue considering this.
- 5. We were told the tower would not carry 5G frequency. At least not at the beginning, but since the aim of Rogers is to cover Canada with 5G, as stated on their webpage, we can expect 5G to be implemented in the future. Even those people who see no harm in 3G,4G frequencies will balk at having 5G in their neighbourhood. Safety code 6 is totally outdated and may not apply to 5G. All cell towers in Canada will host the latest technologies at some point regardless of service provider. All technologies must comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement.

- 6. The location of the tower is at the edge of all the hiking trails of Mt. Geoffrey provincial, regional parks and crown lands. People go in the forest, on the trails, to enjoy nature, the quiet, the solitude. I doubt that they want to hear the pings of cell phones or people chattering away on their cell phones, or see an unnatural edifice towering over the trees. This tower will not deliver service to most of Mount Geoffrey nor the eastern sections of Helliwell Park as noted in the coverage maps shared in our digital public meeting. Rogers has proposed the tower near Central Road where you claim housing is also desired rather than deep into the trails or park.
- 7. There is no guarantee that non-Rogers users will have any benefits from this tower. How many Rogers customers are there on Hornby? Rogers is welcoming applications for co-location including from local emergency responders and TELUS. TELUS has expressed preliminary interest however we still working on that aspect of the proposal. Rogers will be required to follow ISED's tower sharing protocols so if third parties apply to co-locate Rogers will cooperate in accordance with federal protocols.

I do not want that tower here at all, aesthetically or practically. I have a landline and a Telus cellphone which I might use for emergencies on the road, but it has no reception in my area. And that's OK.

Landlines are wonderful, however 80% of calls to emergency responders such as 911 are now placed via cell phones. Thus, having reliable wireless or mobile service is a matter of public safety for many people. Your landline will not be of much use out on a trail or waterways for instance.

We live in a rural area and many of us want to keep it that way. I did not come to Hornby for its technical advancements, but for the opposite.

Thanks for sharing your perspective. We will make note of your opinions. There are some people who align with your views and others who desire improved service.

Thanks for reaching out and for sharing your comments. You may find the attached consultation package to contain pertinent information. For example, it is noted on page 2 (section 10) that all applications for co-location will be considered in alignment with Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada protocols regarding tower sharing. For example, if another wireless service provider such as TELUS or SHAW were to apply to co-locate, Rogers would be required to cooperate and offer positions on the tower.

I appreciate your idea regarding a native species landscape buffer. I will be sure to pass this along to Rogers. Typically, the tower compounds are required to be fully fenced as per ISED protocols to limit public access. We have been installing in instances such as this attractive cedar or hardieboard fencing around the base of the tower. We will also explore the possibility of planting a native species landscape buffer. Perhaps we can discuss with the Islands Trust as the process unfolds.

Finally, please kindly note that as per ISED protocols I am required to advise you that you will have 21 days if you wish to submit any further comments.

Hi Grant,

Thanks for your time over the phone today. I understand that your primary questions and comments pertain to wanting to ensure that there is a proper communications plan in place.

Currently, the intended process is as follows. I certainly welcome your comments. Perhaps we can discuss again as well.

## Part 1 - Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada Default Consultation Process + Public Meeting

- This process entails three (3) general steps including: 1) a newspaper notice, 2) a mail-out to property owners/occupants within a radius of 3 x the proposed tower height, and 3) a request for land use concurrence via the relevant land use authority.

- Regarding the newspaper notice (step 1), I can confirm that we have ordered multiple notices in the Grapevine, Comox Valley Record, First Edition and the Hornby Tribune. This will cover 4 publications. People will be given until January 13, 2023 to comment (greater than the 30 day required comment period due to the holiday season).

- Regarding the mail-out (step 2), the radius will be 3 x tower height which is just over 189 meters as per below. We actually expanded upon this. Attached are copies of the envelopes that went out and the address list as vetted by the Islands Trust, MFLNRO and my team. We have tried to include all relevant stakeholders in the area while also expanding upon the baseline ISED requirements.

- Regarding the request for land use concurrence (step 3), we can discuss the timing of this into the new year at the end of the public comment period (i.e. after January 13, 2023).

- Although not required by ISED, we have agreed to host a digital public meeting on December 8th and have advertised this broadly in all the above noted newspaper notices.



#### Part 2 - Crown Consultation Process

- In addition to the above noted federally regulated process, since the tower is proposed to be sited on provincial crown land, Rogers will also have to follow the crown consultation process. Much of this will be duplicative relative to the federal process as it will include referrals to relevant stakeholders including First Nations, crown tenure holders, and will also entail newspaper notification.

- Please note, we have already sent referrals to all relevant First Nations proactively to ensure that we welcome their input early in the process.

During our call, I know we discussed that you may also desire an in person public meeting. While this can certainly be considered, I wonder if we may want to start with the digital public meeting on December 8th and then discuss any subsequent requirements after that time. While I certainly am open to such an additional in person meeting, my experiences with digital meetings has been quite positive and engaging. It also allows people from any community to attend such as those who may not live on Hornby. Further, I should note that while this may not be representative of the current proposal, my prior in person public meeting on Hornby Island for the TELUS proposal was quite problematic and resulted in people derailing the meeting by crossing out the content on our boards with permanent markers and people getting onto a megaphone and taking over the discussions. Certainly this could be managed better however I also think there is some merit to the current digital meeting. How would you feel about allowing the current process to unfold and then perhaps we can reconvene after the digital meeting to discuss whether any additional meeting is merited?

This is completely unacceptable. As we discussed, I had previously been working with Heather Kauer and now Sonja Zupanec at the Islands Trust for many months. We have also engaged the province via the MFLNRO. Through your planning department staff, we have welcomed input and offered to attend any upcoming LTC meetings. I look forward to any future opportunities for engagement. We would like to have transparent and open discussions regarding this proposal. And to read that Rogers is only advertising in the Denman Island centric Grapevine paper and the Comox Valley Record at the end of this week is so out of touch. We actually have two local publications, of which I am editor of one. Would it not make sense to put something pertaining to Hornby Island in a local Hornby Island paper? The Grapevine and Comox Valley Record publications are what we understood to be the applicable publications. For instance, these are the same publications that TELUS was

previously required to post its public notices in during their prior proposal which I managed and learned a lot from. We also welcomed input from the Islands Trust planning staff on our current consultation process prior to proceeding. Had we known that additional publications would be desired by you, we would have done so proactively. Notwithstanding the foregoing, I think we can work with you to add to the current notification process. I will do my best to achieve this if feasible.

For your information, I have now reached out to the additional publications that you have mentioned in your separate email. I am not sure if we will be able to achieve ISED's prescribed consultation timelines and the deadlines of these additional publications however I think we can commit to working with you to get the word out more broadly to the extent possible. I am aware that there is also much discussion ongoing on Facebook about this proposal. I think the word is out and we'll work with you to make sure that's the case.

You may also take heart in knowing that this notification process is only the first part of the federally regulated process. Subsequently, the province will also complete additional newspaper notices and referrals since this proposal is on provincial crown land. Thus, there will be plenty of opportunity to top up with additional notifications via the provincial consultation process subsequently which has not yet formally started. Indeed, when we site towers on provincial land there are duplicative federal and provincial consultation processes that we must undertake so you can be assured that there will be plenty of opportunity for additional notification.

The timing is so wrong and way too fast tracked. So many people are now traveling off island in the next month. A virtual meeting in December and the deadline for comments January 13? That is, with all due respect, ridiculous.

And the virtual information meeting is December 6 where Grant and I have a Zoom Trust Council for three days starting on that day. No communication let alone consultation with either of us. I am asking you to delay this whole proposal process until at least March 2023.

I think the best course of action at this stage is to proceed with the meeting and process as it has been advertised publicly. I would like to honour the public notices as some people have already requested to attend our meeting as planned. I am hopeful that you and/or Grant can attend however there is no obligation. If need be, we can look to potentially schedule an additional meeting in the new year although this is not part of the federal process. In any case, we are doing what we can to provide broader opportunities for public input.

I do not think that this process is fast tracked as you may have initially perceived. As noted above we still need to navigate the provincial referral process as well. We are only starting the first part of the process which is the federal (ISED) notification process.

#### There is First Nations involved.

The first step I undertook via this proposal was to notify and welcome input from all pertinent First Nations as identified by the province's First Nation Consultation Areas database. I have shared these referrals and all responses provided with the Islands Trust planning staff as well as the MFLNRO. The province also has a duty to consult First Nations and will subsequently send additional referrals to the same First Nations however we wanted to be proactive hence our early referrals to the relevant nations.

#### Our Housing Society has been looking at that location for years.

Rogers selected the proposed tower location based on a thorough pre-consultation with Islands Trust planning staff and the province. It is my understanding that this particular lot is one of the only locations on Hornby Island that allows for the proposed use.

Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell

towers fall under this legislation). While our federal use is not subject to zoning, we have sought to identify compatible zoning.

I would also suggest that while I understand there may be varying perspectives on this matter there is no reason in our view as to why the property could not potentially accommodate both housing and a communication site. There is already a radio station communication site nearby for instance.

And why do we need this, when we are having fibre optics installed?

Fibre optics will provide internet connectivity on a fixed basis to one's home or place of business. The proposed cell tower will provide mobile service in the broader community and surrounding waterways. This is complementary to the fibre optic service that you reference. Fibre optic service does not replace a need for mobile connectivity and mobile connectivity does not generally replace a need for fibre optic service. These are distinct yet complementary services and most communities desire both robust wireless and wireline (fibre) services.

You may also find it pertinent that 80% of calls to emergency responders such as 911 are now placed via cell phones so there is a public safety component to this proposal. Having cell service in remote areas of the island and waterways may save lives.

Was this an initiative from a group or individual on this island? I don't understand. This proposal was initiated by Rogers as there is not currently reliable service in the area.

I could write more words, but for the sake of brevity, I will not now.

Once again I ask that you defer all this until March of next year, where we will have community members back from travels, and more focused without the distraction of the holidays (in person for many for years) and more time to digest.

As the federal consultation process has commenced and the notices are already out it will be our intent to continue with that. However, please be assured that there will be plenty of opportunities for additional engagement via the provincial referral and notification process. Realistically, this process will carry on throughout much of 2023 and we look forward to discussing this with you and your constituents further.

I have personally done considerable diligence prior to moving forward with this proposal. Rogers was initially wanting to propose a tower closer to the co-op in a more visible location however based on my prior experiences on Hornby Island I worked with the Rogers team, Islands Trust and province to put together this revised proposal with the objective of putting our best foot forward. I realize that there will be varying perspectives on such a proposal and we look forward to continuing the discussion.

Dear Mr. Gregg,

I'm writing this letter of support for the proposed Rogers Telecommunications Facility tower installation proposed to be constructed at 49.535055, -124.672134 on Hornby Island, BC.

As a resident of the island since 2015, small business owner since 2018 and Air Ambulance Helicopter Captain I can see the importance of improving communications on our remote island from many perspectives. Most importantly connectivity for our remote community with little communications infrastructure for either residents or visitors.

With the islands last remaining pay phone (at the Hornby Island Co-op) removed people will be relying on their mobile phones or landlines for connectivity. An improved cellular signal would be essential in helping those with out a landline and our first responders.

We rely solely on our Hornby Island Fire Department to provide all first responder duties, with no paramedic station or full time police presence our volunteer fire fighters take the majority of calls on the island. I believe improved ability for people to reach 9-1-1 on their mobile devices and our first responders having a better mobile signal would make everyones job a lot easier.

Lastly, the frustration of operating a business on an island where our customers have no signal once they arrive at our business, they can't interact in the most basic ways with social media, points programs (BC Ale Trail) or any of the services on their phones they are actually paying for.

I know that from the "stories" I've heard, towers have been proposed before and received a large resistance due to a belief that the radiation is harmful. Some locals refuse to have cellular devices in their homes because of perceived headaches from the. technology. I think it's important that Rogers addresses these false/misleading health risks that will no doubt be the largest opposition.

From my family of first responders, air ambulance captain and volunteer fire fighter, as well as rural small business owners we are excited that there is a chance we will finally receive the service we pay for on Hornby Island.

We were 20 year+ Rogers mobility customers when we moved to Hornby Island and mistakenly switched to Telus believing they had the closest tower to our island and therefore would have a better signal, this was not the case. We would be happy to switch our family of 4 back to Rogers if this proposed tower is allowed to be constructed.

Thanks for sharing your comment sheet as attached. I will save your input on file for the Islands Trust, ISED, Rogers and the province (land management authority for the subject property).

The challenge with Mt. Geoffrey as per your suggestion, I believe, is that it may be designated as park land. Rogers will also typically need vehicle access (for construction/maintenance) and power and I believe the mountain does not have supporting infrastructure neary. Thus, we'd need to clear trees to build a longer road and power line which would potentially be more impactful. With that said, it is an interesting idea and I'll share it with Rogers' engineering team.

The idea of a "tree" design is feedback we hear from time to time. The challenge I've heard with those tree towers (aka "monopines") is that they tend to look very artificial as they are taller than natural trees and tend to draw more attention to themselves vs. typical utility poles or lattice towers. The tree designs are also challenging to maintain and complete service upgrades on. That said, I do appreciate the idea and will share it with the team at Rogers.

Other ideas that I think we can readily consider:

- Cedar or hardieboard fencing around the compound (rather than chainlink fencing with barbed wire which is typical);
- self-support tower (instead of a guyed-tower with wires and anchors) -- this will make the footprint on the ground around 15 m x 15 m instead of 200 m x 200 m for a guyed tower.
- landscape buffer we could look to plant some native species at the base of the tower
- Siting the tower amongst mature trees to screen it from view (as currently proposed);
- Underground power (currently proposed)
- Use of existing access roads (currently proposed)

There may be some other ideas as well and we look forward to dicsussing.

We are Hornby Island residents, and we are writing you concerning the virtual "Public Information Meeting" regarding the proposed Rogers telecommunications facility that's scheduled for Thursday Dec 8 th .

As per the Comox Valley Regional District Policy Number: P89 - Telecommunication Antenna System Application and Consultation Process Page 4 of 6:

4) The Proponent is to host a public information meeting in order to share relevant information with members of the public who may be affected by the proposed development.

The public information meeting:

a. Should be hosted in-person. The meeting may be hosted virtually during times at which Public Health Orders affect in-person events, but in-person events are still encouraged when strategies to mitigate public health risks can be implemented; Considering there is no public health order currently in effect, a virtual meeting would be considered inadequate to facilitate a proper public consultation to provide the information the residents would require to provide their input.

Considering ISED CPC-2-0-3 Page 7:

Proponents must follow the land-use consultation process for the siting of antenna systems, established by the land-use authority, where one exists. ...In all cases, telecommunications carriers, broadcasting undertakings and third party tower owners must notify and consult with the local public when proposing a new antenna tower, either by following ISED's default public consultation process or, where one exists, the land-use authority's public consultation process.

the CVRD Policy P89 Process would be the proper one to follow.

Virtual meetings discriminate against many members of our community who either don't use computers nor do they have the skills to set up a Microsoft Teams meeting or who are part of the population here who live with limited means and don't own computers.

In summary, it seems you are obligated by existing processes to have an in-person public meeting, which would need to be held in an appropriate facility on Hornby Island. Thank you for showing respect to our community needs.

It is our understanding, upon reviewing this proposal with Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada, Islands Trust and Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (MFLNRO) staff that the Islands Trust is the applicable land use authority on Hornby Island for most matters including this

proposal. However, as Rogers' proposal is on Provincial Crown Land, we will also be working closely with the crown via the MFLNRO. I have not been advised at this time that the CVRD is the applicable land use authority.

Nonetheless, I have shared your question with ISED to clarify however I can assure you that we pre-consulted ISED, the Island Trust and the MFLNRO extensively on this proposal prior to moving into public consultation and it is our understanding that the aformentioned comments are accurate re: the Islands Trust and MFLNRO having decision making capacity.

It is our intent to complete the digital public meeting on December 8th as advertised. From there, we will review whether additional engagement is merited in the new year. I have read the package that you have made available regarding the proposed 63.0 meter Rogers Communications Radiocommunications Tower, Rogers File: W6420 – Hornby Island.

With regard to carrying out the obligation to consult with the local community:

I attended the one-hour digital public information meeting which you hosted on Dec. 8, 2022.

As you know, our local Islands Trust Committee is our land use authority on Hornby Island.

# We have been working proactively with the Islands Trust for many months. We are reviewing expected next steps with ISED as well since the proposal is on crown land.

As you discovered at the Dec.8 digital meeting, our Local Islands Trust Committee adopted the "Model Strategy for Antenna Systems" at the Sept.9, 2022 local Islands Trust public meeting, making it the protocol of use to help our Local Trust Area elected representatives to assess any antenna system proposal withing their own unique context, rather than the ISED's Default Public Consultation process.

We are reviewing with ISED as the Islands Trust planning staff were unaware when we set out on the consultation process. We will have to confirm whether the protocol was properly adopted and whether it has any implications going forward. We are not yet clear

#### on this.

How unfortunate that you chose to speak only with Islands Trust planning staff who are not "local" and did not advise you correctly!

A simple check of the Minutes of the Sept.9, 2023 Local Trust Committee meeting **islandstrust.bc.ca/document/hornby-ltc-regular-meeting-minutes-5**/ shows:

"HO-LTC-2022-053 It was MOVED and SECONDED, that the Hornby Island Local Trust Committee adopt the Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems. CARRIED Regional Planning Manager Kauer noted that the Model Strategy federally compels companies to engage in extensive public consultation before installation of cell towers."

This except from the Islands Trust Minutes shows proper process. Also interesting to read the Is. Trust Planning Manager's note as to the implications going forward.

#### As noted we will discuss with ISED and the Islands Trust. We have an appointment to do so.

As I read the Islands Trust "Model Strategy for Antenna Systems", I see that it is designed to facilitate "*local land use consultation framework that ensures the LTA and members of the public contribute local knowledge that facilitates and influences the siting location, development and design of the Antenna system within LTA boundaries*" as well as "to provide LTAs with the information required to satisfy the requirements of ISED regarding *local* land use consultation, resulting in an *informed* statement of concurrence, concurrence with conditions, or non-concurrence from the LTA at the end of the process,"

Thanks for sharing this. Presumably you are aware that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands Trust own land use by-law. I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall directly to the east on Crown Grant land, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east (including an existing radiocommunication facility), public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

Page 36 of the Model Strategy for Antenna Systems, Article D lists 9 "Discouraged Locations", a number of which could be seen to apply to the currently proposed site.

We will discuss with ISED and the Islands Trust. Exentensive pre-consultatoin on the proposed location occurred with the Islands Trust staff, local emergency responders as well as via the current consultation. We do think it is noteworthy that the proposal is compliant with the preferences in the land use bylaw as stated above.

Despite the stated intention to establish a "**local** land use consultation framework, an oversight happened, and our local (Hornby Island) Islands Trust elected representatives, Alex Allen and Grant Scott, were not informed of this cell phone tower application until months after your consultation process had started. Clearly, consultation with Local Island Trust Authority and with this community has not yet taken the form advocated by the "Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems".

#### As noted we will discuss with ISED and also will be meeting with the Islands Trust planning staff again and have an appointment scheduled. We are not clear based on a preliminary review of the model protocol what we would need to do differently in any case but we will review and confirm with ISED and the Islands Trust.

As I read the Model Strategy for Antenna Systems, any proponent is tasked with attempting to resolve any outstanding issues prior to submitting its antenna system siting proposal and to undertake public consultation. A one-hour digital meeting could not and did not provide the time and the structure to take a list of resident's concerns and work through them one by one to find resolution. Rogers risks being seen as not being willing to act in good faith.

There had been much more engagement with the Islands Trust, Province, First Nations and emergency responders prior to commencing the consultation process. We wish to proceed in good faith via this consultation process.

There is significant public interest about the Rogers proposal, as evidenced in several ongoing discussion threads on Hornby Island Facebook pages, "Word of Mouth" and "Hornby Community Connections". We are an engaged community and a proper **local** land use consultation framework is appreciated and supported. The Islands Trust "Model Strategy for Antenna Systems" even suggests holding a community workshop and I would urge you to consider using this format. As the Model Strategy advises, local knowledge and our local Hornby Island Islands Trust Bylaws are to be considered in this process.

We already hosted a digital public meeting. My prior experience with an in person meeting on Hornby Island was very problematic. I faced a lot of aggression including people cursing at us on a megaphone, people crossing out with permanent ink markers the materials on our poster boards (someone even wrote curse words on top of our boards), people refusing to respect the format of the meeting and setting up chairs in the middle of the room to host their own event, etc. We have also been advised by certain leadership figures in your community that our security and safety cannot be ensured at such a meeting given some of the people potentially involved. Thus, we will need to carefully consider how to best welcome additional input. Certainly, we have tried to offer a digital public meeting that was well attended and have been responsive to all who have commented or called us for information. We will continue to explore creative ways to enable people to get their opinions heard.

I am sorry that a few people expressed themselves in such unpleasant ways during an inperson meeting about the proposed Telus tower a number of years ago. However, as a professional, I am sure you are aware that facilitation style and meeting format can be key in controlling unruly behaviour in meetings where people have strong feelings and concerns that they feel may not be taken seriously.

It seems very unprofessional to suggest that you cannot hold an in-person meeting on Hornby Island about the proposed tower because you would be in danger from people who might "potentially" be involved. Sounds like so much conjecture. And exactly who are these "certain leadership figures" that are giving you this "advice"?

Have you asked the advice of the Hornby Island Residents and Ratepayers Association Chairperson, Daniel Siegel for advice on how to conduct a productive meeting when some people attending are feeling emotional and concerned? He is a trained mediator and negotiator

#### and a rabbi and I am sure he would have some good suggestions for you.

I have spoken with Daniel and others. You are welcome to contact Daniel to discuss. While the discussions are ongoing and we will reconvene potentially next week, he has acknowledged similar concerns and we have not arrived at a solution as of this time.

#### Re: Proposed Rogers Cell Tower for Hornby Island

I write with strong concerns about the proposal by Rogers to site a 60m free standing cell tower on Hornby Island.

It is becoming increasingly evident, in looking at Facebook discussion, in attending locally arranged Town Hall meetings, in participating in local informal discussions, as well as noting the growing list of names on a local Petition against the tower, that many Hornby folks have reservations about a cell tower being sited on Hornby Island.

It is also evident that most Hornby folks understand, and are supportive of, the need for significantly improved internet access on Hornby. We look forward to the soon-to-arrive City West fibre optic project will facilitate educational, recreational and business opportunities for all and can even facilitate cell phone use through apps such as Facebook Messenger. This project will offer a huge improvement with safe, fast and reliable connection, which, in turn, can allow each home to determine if they wish to allow wireless access to their personal devices, or the faster, more secure alternative of hard-wiring their devices within their homes.

Hornby Island is a seen as a "refuge" for many, year-round residents, part-time residents and visitors, alike. The beauty and glory of the natural world on our beautiful island home is valued as a place of peace, healing and renewal. We are fortunate to have Islands Trust, with it's extra level of awareness and concerns for the protection of our island environments, as our land use authority. As is written on the Islands Trust website,

"The purpose of this trust is to preserve and protect the Trust area and its unique amenities and environment for the benefit of the residents of the Trust area and of British Columbia generally, in cooperation with municipalities, regional districts, improvement districts, other persons and organizations and the Government of British Columbia. In doing so, the provincial government made the commitment to protect the islands from excessive and inappropriate development. The Islands Trust remains our nation's only institution charged with the stewardship of a particular environment and the preservation of a special, rural quality of life."

I urge you, as our land use authority, to act on several different fronts, in preserving and protecting this very special place:

- Improve our local autonomy and heightened awareness of, and protection for, the well-used areas of our Community School, our PreSchool, our Community Hall, our Health Clinics, our Art Center, our Credit Union, the Ball Part and Kitchen, and our Recycling Depot, by increasing the notification package radius to 3X the height of the proposed tower as suggested under "Distance Considerations" in the Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems, adopted at the Sept.9, 2022 local Trust meeting.
- Require proof of liability insurance against harmful effects of radiofrequency radiation on health from all telecommunications companies deploying wireless technologies.

- Require any contract to include: assurances that the Proponent, e.g., the telecommunications company, will abide by any new federal government guidelines or regulations that may be established to limit emissions; will de-power antennas and remove antennas and supporting equipment when radiofrequency energy is determined to be a Group 2A or Group 1 carcinogenic hazard 9i.e., grandfathering would not be permitted).
- Ask for a postponement of the Roger's application until after the City West project is completed and Hornby folks have had an opportunity to adjust and incorporate all the new aspects and possibilities of much improved internet access.
- Pass a symbolic resolution calling on the Federal Government to revise Safety Code 6, implement the recommendations of the 2015 HESA Report, and in the interim, to stop 4G/5G rollout of small and macro antennas close to where people spend much time, and to put a hold on the auction of the spectrum. It is my understanding that around the world municipalities have been doing this. In Canada, the town of Sutton, Quebec was the first to do so. They adopted a resolution calling on the federal government to institute a moratorium on the deployment of 5G "until the various studies reach a consensus on the absence of risks and impacts of 5G cellular technology on health and the environment. <a href="https://www.pressreader.com/canada/sherbrooke-record/20191220/281560882693827">https://www.pressreader.com/canada/sherbrooke-record/20191220/281560882693827</a>
- Write a statement of non-concurrence regarding the proposed Roger's cell tower siting.

You have an opportunity to strengthen the protection for this special place and its unique and sensitive community and environment through Amendments to the Model Strategy for Antenna Systems and I respectfully suggest that you make full use of that opportunity now.

Dear Brian Gregg, I am a Denman Island resident, and I am writing you concerning the virtual "Public Information Meeting" regarding the proposed Rogers tower that's scheduled for Thursday Dec 8th.

According to the Comox Valley Regional District, they clearly state in the 'Telecommunication Antenna System Application and Consultation Process Policy' that all public consultation meetings with the community where cell towers are proposed and that you are required to host "should be hosted in- person". (Page 4, Policy Number: P89) It goes on to say that "the meetings may be hosted virtually during times at which Public Health Orders affect in-person events." (Italics mine)

As there are no public health restrictions in this time, I insist we have an in-person Public Consultation/public information meeting.

Virtual meetings discriminate against many members of our community who either don't use computers or have the skills to set up a TEAM meeting or who are part of the population here who live with limited means and don't own computers.

I have only seen one printed Notice of the proposed Rogers tower on Nov 24 in our local newsletter the Grapevine. Many people will not have seen this Notice. This is a busy time of year; a Dec 8 virtual meeting also discriminates against many on our island who are very busy and engaged with Xmas activities, fairs, family, their children and school events etc. Therefore an in-person meeting at a later date is called for.

It is our understanding, upon reviewing this proposal with Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada, Islands Trust and Ministry of Forests, Lands and Natural Resource Operations (MFLNRO) staff that the Islands Trust is the applicable land use authority on Hornby Island for most matters including this proposal. However, as Rogers' proposal is on Provincial Crown Land, we will also be working closely with the crown via the MFLNRO. I have not been advised at this time that the CVRD is the applicable land use authority.

Nonetheless, I have shared your question with ISED to clarify however I can assure you that we pre-consulted ISED, the Island Trust and the MFLNRO extensively on this proposal prior to moving into public consultation and it is our understanding that the aformentioned comments are accurate re: the Islands Trust and MFLNRO having decision making capacity.

It is our intent to complete the digital public meeting on December 8th as advertised. From there, we will review whether additional engagement is merited in the new year. Please be assured that there will be plenty of opportunity for additional engagement as we are currently only completing the required federal (ISED) portion of the consultation however since the proposal is on Provincial Crown land there will also be a provincial referral and consultation process including another round of public notices.

I can assure you that this proposal has been posted in four local publications including the Grapevine, Comox Valley Record, The First Edition and the Hornby Tribune as well as on social media. We also sent referrals to all relevant First Nations early on in the process before advising the Hornby Island community.

Please kindly note that as per ISED protocols I am required to advise you that you will have 21 days if you desire to submit further input. Please find attached a copy of Rogers' consultation package for additional context.

Hi Kent,

Thanks for sharing your feedback on this. I share your concern and think we need to very carefully manage this request for an in-person meeting.

As you may have heard, I hosted an extremely chaotic meeting years ago on Hornby Island (for TELUS) and would like to avoid repeating that. I am not exaggerating when I suggest that my prior in person meeting on Hornby was easily the most disrespectful meeting I've ever attended. For example, at that meeting, people arrived with megaphones, spoke over top of us and proceeded to cross all our content out on our poster boards with permanent ink. At the end of the meeting, we were shocked to find that our boards were covered with swear words and we did not have an opportunity to discuss the proposal in any meaningful way. It was effectively a protest and not a public meeting. There was no allowance for discussion of different viewpoints and very little discussion about the specifics of the proposal. We learned little if anything and we were taken aback with how poorly people were willing to treat us. That must be avoided and I have been clear with Daniel about that in our discussions. Do you think Daniel is able to ensure a safe and respectful meeting?

Also, as you know, we already did host a digital public meeting and to be sure public meetings are not "required" as part of a tower consultation process per federal guidelines. Any such meetings are hosted as a courtesy and in my view should only be completed if people are respectful and security is upheld. If the Islands Trust is insisting on having us come over for such a meeting then I think it is fair, in return, to ask the Islands Trust to help directly manage the meeting to ensure that it is safe and respectful. If they are not willing to assist with those basic asks of safety, respect and security then I would call into question the need for such a meeting. We should not have to tolerate a lack of safety, security and respect -- nobody should have to put up with that.

With that said, I think it will be quite a challenge for us to not complete a public meeting in person since the elected officials have now tried to insist on it. I am not sure how we establish trust and a working relationship with the Islands Trust if we do not agree to their request.

	Thanks for your comments. Please find below our respones in green text.
	Dear Mr. Gregg,
	Here we are again. You represented Telus few years ago with a similar proposal, which the local community rejected. (If at first you don't succeed?)

TELUS' prior proposal from several years ago has no relationship whatsoever to the current Rogers proposal. Specifically, TELUS' prior proposal was not a cell tower and would have only been a back up microwave link to the submarine cable system to limit the risk of another internet outage on Hornby if the cable were to break (which did previously happen). TELUS' proposed tower would not have provided cell service.

Rogers' current proposal is for a cell tower and is in a substantially different location in a zone or land use designation that appears to permit the proposed use. The location and purpose of the former TELUS proposal relative to the Rogers proposal are quite distinct. TELUS' proposed tower location was more visible. Rogers' proposal is across the street from an existing radio station tower and fire hall communication site.

I was signed up for the online meeting you offered recently. Having downloaded the Microsoft Team software and followed the instructions, it was a very frustrating experience to be unable to connect with the meeting! So, I am writing you now with my concerns and opinions and to say that I am opposed to the tower anywhere on the island.

Had you reached out to request the meeting login details as stipulated in our public notices, we would have provided you with a link to simply click to join the meeting. There was no need to download any software onto your device. We also provided a dial in option for landlines or phones so that if people did not have computers they could dial in from any phone. The meeting was very well attended by over 30 people and was quite engaging.

First, I feel it was inappropriate to propose an online medium (MT) that many people would find unfamiliar. (Zoom would have been a better choice.)

It is quite a straightforward and common software tool - Microsoft Teams. I am not sure that Zoom is a better choice nor more common to be honest with you. There are quite a few similar tools and I've used them all - Google Meets, Zoom, WebEx (Cisco), Microsoft Teams, etc. They are all similar and require no expertise and one simply needs to click a link to access the meetings.

More importantly, an online meeting of one hour is hardly a substitute for a public consultation process, meeting in physical space, face to face, for as long as it takes to air all concerns and answer all questions. I urge you to arrange such a public meeting

We are reviewing options for potential additional engagement in the new year. With that said, the prior meeting on Hornby Island for TELUS was not very friendly and we were subject to some very aggressive behaviors including people cursing at us, people crossing out our materials on our poster boards with permanent ink markers (including writing curse words over top of our content), people yelling at us on a megaphone, people not respecting the format of the meeting and taking over control of the meeting, etc. The former meeting was effectively a protest and not an information exchange or public meeting and we left feeling very trampled. Thus, we will need to carefully consider next steps as safety and respect will be critical for any additional engagement.

Many people here have diverse concerns about a cell tower on our island. I will not recapitulate them, but stick to my own main objections. We pride ourselves on being a unique place, an alternative to the

rest of the mainstream culture. Many visitors come here with exactly that expectation. Despite the convenience of added cell coverage, a cell tower is inconsistent with the ambiance we (and they) hold dear. Literally and symbolically it would render Hornby too much like everywhere else.

Rogers should certainly respect the prevailing local sentiment and the judgment of Islands Trustees. It would be an outrage to impose a cell tower despite public will, which you can best assess with a formal poll in conjunction with public meetings.

As is typical, we are hearing wide ranging views during this consultation process. Some people align with your perspective and to the contrary there are people who want the service and who are supportive.

Even if it turns out—through such thorough consultation—that the community finds the cell tower acceptable in principle, the proposed location may conflict with other uses being considered by the community for that site. I would personally hope that the location be one from which the tower would not normally be visible (from the roadways or frequented venues, for example).

Thanks for this idea. While this can be explored, the current proposal is over 100 meters deep into the subject crown land property. It offers the benefit of reasonably close proximity to existing access and power. If Rogers were to push the tower further into the lot or into another area away from roads, please note that the trade-off would be that we would need to build a longer road and power line to service the tower for construction and maintenance. In other words, the trade-off would be clearing more trees for a road and powerline if we were to be further from roadways and existing supporting infrastructure like power lines and utilities.

You are acting as intermediary for Rogers and ISED. I believe it should be possible for the public to communicate directly with these parties in this matter. Would you please provide relevant contact information for them? Thanks so much.

I am the designated Rogers contact for this consultation. Any comments you provide will be discussed with Rogers management including this email. You are welcome to submit any questions or comments and I can get answers for you. I think you will find that I am responsive, thorough and likely the most knowledgeable about this specific proposal. Perhaps try to work with me as the designated point of contact and if you then feel that I have not been able to get you the information you need we can refer you along to Rogers' management directly.



This is important since over 80% of calls to emergency responders are now placed via cell phones.

CityWest has begun construction for fibre-to-the-home project as part of the Connected Coast initiative. The fibre optics will be underground, a less intrusive solution than a Rogers cell tower.

That is a great project. It will be good to have the last mile fibre connectivity. It has been my understanding that having fibre optic service will provide a needed service for internet connectivity on a fixed basis (wireline service); whereas Rogers' proposal is for mobile connectivity (wireline) service. Having a fibre connection to one's home will not preclude or replace a need for mobile connectivity just as mobile connectivity will not replace a need for fibre service. In most communities, there is a desire for robust wireless and wireline services as they tend to be quite complementary, albeit distinct service offerings. Mobile connectivity is important for public safety since the majority of calls to emergency responders (911 calls) are placed via cell phones. Having fibre to one's home or business will not allow for emergency phone calls out on the waterways, roads and trails in the community, for instance.

The site location appears to be across the road from an Agreements in Principle Treaty Land for K'omoks First Nation. I find this ironically distasteful when 30 years of treaty negotiations with respect to land were described in a press release as "done with care":

"The K'ómoks Nation has been the steward of these lands since time immemorial, and together with its government partners, will continue to ensure development happens in a respectful and responsible way." Please be advised that the first step Rogers undertook prior to commencing the broader public consultation process was to specifically send referrals to and welcome comments from a number of relevant First Nations, including the K'ómoks Nation and several other

nations as identified via the Provincial First Nation Consultation Areas Database. Rogers as well as the Province will continue to work collaboratively with the relevant nations via this proposal as the crown will also subsequently send additional referrals to the same nations that we already engaged.

Did any "relevant First Nations" provide you with comments and if so, what were the comments? We are still in the engagement process, however we have received some responses from the K'ómoks Nation, We Wai Kai Nation and Homalco Nation. While the engagement is still ongoing and the province will also engage the First Nations subsequently, thusfar the nations have submitted "no comment" responses. I note that this is preliminary and there will be further engagement opportunities with First Nations the broader community via the provincial referral process.

I'm not sure what you mean by referrals being sent by Rogers and the Provincial Crown. This means that in addition to the current ongoing federally mandated consultation process for the proposed cell tower, since the proposal is on provincial crown land there will subsequently be a duplicative referral or consultation process managed by the Crown via the MFNLRO.

As I understand it, the proposal seems quite firm on the build, so I'm not sure what collaboration is required from K'omoks First Nation. I am responding to your specific question above regarding First Nation engagement. The province has a duty to consult First Nations and since this proposal is on provincial crown land the relevant First Nations must be consulted.

My concern is this cell tower is not a respectful nor responsible development for anyone living on Hornby Island. The last thing I want to see in the distance is a cell tower. To me, this footprint does not fit in with a small island's community desire to retain its natural beauty. Thanks for sharing your perspective. It is valuable to welcome all viewpoints. We can learn much from local people when such proposals are put forward. While your perspective is sincerely valued, as you can imagine we must balance your input with the input of other stakeholders. We often hear broadly varying perspectives on these proposals including from people who may be opposed and who wish to live off the grind, all the way up to people who feel that improved connectivity is critical for public safety and connectivity since 80% of calls to 911 are now placed via cell phones. We can certainly understand the aesthetic concern. Hornby Island is one of the most beautiful places in BC. Typically, during this early stage of a proposal, we only have conceptual designs and do not yet have all the site loading specifications (i.e. specific frequencies, antenna models, backhaul, etc. typically is added into our design later). I have nonetheless asked for this data and will share it with you if I am provided it. I wish to register my opposition to the Roger's Tower on Crown Land on Hornby Island. It is to near the schools, medical clinic, Firehall, Recycling Depot, and many other areas where people work and spend many hours of their day.

Please be assured that we have saved your prior submissions as attached.

Brian Gregg has described it in such a way to make one believe it will carry untested 5G frequencies. Untested for health .Many do not accept Safety Code 6 as a standard of safety, including the IAFF and their hundreds of *independent* research papers.

Unless we know more about the Tower, and the antennae it will carry, I must oppose it at this time. How can one decide with many submitted questions still unanswered. No answer to my Backhaul question, for example, has been received.

We provided you with the information available as attached. As noted, this proposal is in the early stages so we do not have detailed construction drawings at this time with some of the specifications you are seeking.

Rogers attests that its proposed installation will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement. The proposed facility will only house licensed radiofrequency spectrum. If you have questions or concerns about the applicable safety code, you may wish to contact the policy makers at Health Canada directly. Rogers has no choice but to comply with the safety protocols.

I also would like to express my shock, also, at the lack of a democratic process. If it is so safe, why the short time period, especially at Christmas when many are knowingly away?

The public consultation process has garnered input from many people. Although not required via the federal process, a digital public meeting was hosted. The public comment period was extended due to the holiday season. Notices were posted in four (4) local publications and a mail out was completed.

Rogers will continue to seek ways to ensure meaningful engagement. Indeed, thusfar, only the federal portion of the consultation process has commenced and there will be a provincial referral process as well since this proposal is on provincial crown land.

This involves a Zoning issue which should involve our 2 Island Trustees.

To be sure this is *not* a zoning issue. As communication sites fall under federal jurisdiction, zoning bylaws--a creature of the Local Government Act--do not apply to the proposed federally regulated use.

Notwithstanding the foregoing, you may find it noteworthy that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands

Trust own land use by-law. I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall directly to the east on Crown Grant land, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east (including an existing radiocommunication facility), public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

Duly noted is the timing, right after an election. We won't be able to make this an election issue for 2 more years. The election has had no substantive bearing over Rogers' proposal timing. Indeed, we reached out to the Islands Trust to discuss this proposal many months prior to the election and had sought to move the proposal forward well in advance of the election. Unfortunately, the proposal was delayed due to the election as the Islands Trust planning department staff was not able to get us onto an LTC meeting agenda prior to the elections despite our attempts to move forward in advance of that time period. After delaying the consultation for many months a decision was made to notify the public to enable us to welcome public comments. The elections were not a deciding factor in terms of the timing of this proposal other than to the extent that the elections resulted in some unexpected delays for the proposal as summarized above. To be honest, we had wanted the consultation to start several months prior but that was not feasible.

Hornby Island relies heavily on tourism. People come here for many reasons, but in particular as a rural, pristine, natural contrast to their busy city life. A cell tower, centrally located, covered in antennae does not fit in with the character of the Island.

Tourism and any other influx of population puts demand on infrastructure (not only telecom infrastructure but likely water, electrical, sewage, ferry service, housing, roads, and other such systems). Indeed, when people are traveling they often rely on wireless infrastructure to make phone calls, transactions, reservations, send emails, make emergency calls, etc.

There are many beautiful island communities that have similar infrastructure including, but not limited to, Sonora Island (directly adjacent to the eco resort), Saltspring Island, Gabriola Island, Saturna Island, Mayne Island, Quadra Island, Tofino, etc. There are many additional examples of successful and beautiful tourist destinations that are home to telecommunications infrastructure. Certainly your opinion is valuable and it will be documented however it has not been our experience that tourism and telecommunications infrastructure are incompatible. One might even suggest that tourism adds to the demand for such infrastructure. Of course, it is critical that the needed infrastructure is appropriately sited in such cases.

Many are becoming more aware of the hazards of living and working near a 4th or 5th generation cell tower (see the stats on real estate prices of houses nearby).

The subject of property values is outside the scope of our authority to debate via this process. Please refer to the ISED CPC section 4.2 which notes:

Concerns that are not relevant include:

- disputes with members of the public relating to the proponent's service, but unrelated to antenna installations
- potential effects that a proposed antenna system will have on property values or municipal taxes
- questions whether the Radiocommunication Act, this document, Safety Code 6, locally established bylaws, other legislation, procedures or processes are valid or should be reformed in some manner

Notices were posted in four (4) local publications (though only one notice is required) and a mail out was completed to area property owners, tenure holders on crown land, residences, etc.

Rogers will continue to seek ways to ensure meaningful engagement. Indeed, thusfar, only the federal portion of the consultation process has commenced and there will be a provincial referral process as well since this proposal is on provincial crown land.

Microsoft Teams does not require any software to be downloaded and people were able to simply click a link to attend. We also provided dial in numbers for landlines. The meeting was well attended as it was quite accessible.

I ponder in amazement the suicidal ways of the powers that be in our terribly endangered world. The obsession with technological connectivity in this generations-long war on Nature, is a travesty of the natural connectivity we share as human beings. **Rogers attests that its proposed installation will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement and the same safety protocol that the local radio station and fire hall towers must also comply with.**

This proposal is not for wifi and is rather for cell service. This is important for emergency response and public safety reasons since greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders such as 911 are now placed via cell phones.

# Most of Hornby Island does not have reliable cell phone service. You may wish to speak to your local emergency responders about this.

No doubt you have already received many messages about the need for community housing (the site for the proposed tower being on land earmarked for housing); the dangers to human and environmental health; the question of liability for damage to apiaries and farm animals etc. etc. etc. The reasons to call a halt to this cell tower proposal are multiple; no need for me to reiterate what my fellow islanders have already communicated.

I will simply leave you with a Hornby Island story, followed by an imagined scenario of what could happen on our fragile and delicately balanced island.

During one of my first summers on Hornby, circa 1990, a fire started in Helliwell Park's arbutus grove. It was early August, a dry summer with all the grass flattened to golden tinder. Word spread across the island as fast as the fire spread. Local people bordering the park ran with buckets of water sloshing over their sneakers. There was panic, grief, everyone running in shock and disbelief. The island was saved from incineration only by the water bombers from Port Alberni. We have never forgotten that day, the memory of it revived on every walk past the burned arbutus grove, as we monitored a long slow recovery over many years. It was thought that the fire was sparked by a cigarette butt. Remember how acceptable smoking used to be? We were told it was safe. We believed it and continued to inhale, until cancer patients started suing tobacco companies.

California has, over the years, had 4 cell towers catch fire due to burning tower transmitters. California is a huge land mass. Hornby is a tiny island anchored in the Georgia Strait. We have been experiencing more and more severe drought with each summer. If a cell tower went on fire here during the summer months it would spread fast. The ferries, with typical 4 ferry lineups throughout the day in summer, would be unable to save more than a handful of us. Anyone without a canoe, a kayak, a fishing vessel, would be dead along with the vast majority of their neighbors as the fire spread rapidly across an island billowing with smoke from forests of candling trees.

Who would then be liable for such a human and environmental disaster? Who would our surviving families sue as they grieved and thanked their lucky stars that they'd been off island on that fateful day? You may wish to discuss matters of fire safety with your local fire experts. To the best of our knowledge, other uses including residential, commercial uses, campgrounds and other such uses are more common sources of fires. Fires from utility structures like cell sites are extremely rare.

I began with a question, and I have ended with one.

We need honest answers.

We need an honest reappraisal of a redundant and ill-considered proposal.

We need an honest and graceful stepping back from this madness.

Your views have been saved for the decision makers. You may wish to consider that while there are people who align with your perspective, there are also many people and stakeholders who desire service improvements. Thus, it has been Rogers' objective as a service provider to work towards a responsible proposal that takes into account local land use objectives and desires.

1. The islanders expressed, very clearly, back 7 years ago when Telus made a proposal for a tower, that a tower was not wanted. However, citizens were very clear about welcoming a fibre optic installation which would greatly enhance internet service. And regarding discussions put forth recently, it is readily apparent that this remains the popular choice...**yes to fibre optic installation** which we know is coming to Hornby via CityWest shortly, **No to a tower**.

This proposal is for mobile service which is important for public safety since greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders such as 911 are now placed via cell phones.

Fibre optics will be wonderful but only provide service on a fixed basis at one's home or place of business.

Most communities thus desire both robust wireless and wireline service.

Further, not everyone on Hornby may have the luxury of a fixed address with a fibre connection.

It is obvious Rogers is not interested in just improving land-line phone service, but providing 5g via the coming fibre optic cable.

Interesting thought. I am not aware of the projects being related whatsoever to be honest with you. We do not yet have a transport plan specified to the best of my knowledge.

As has been widely published 5G cannot operate without a Tower along with significant numbers of small cell towers installed on telephone poles with receivers at households.

This is more so in urban areas. At this time we are planning the tower only. Certainly if there are coverage gaps and people complain about service there are "small cell" solutions that can be explored like other service providers have already done on Hornby however that is not currently our proposal or plan at this time.

Without going into any detail and what has been well covered and well known, 5g has been proven to be harmful, not only to humans, especially children, but also to native species, e.g, bees, birds, etc. Canada's law regarding the safety of 5G is dreadfully lacking in up to date research and overlooked compared to other more learned, progressive countries, e.g. Belgium, Grance, and growing sectors in the U.S.

Rogers attests that its proposed facility will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement. This is the same safety code that the adjacent towers from the radio station and fire hall must follow as well.

2. The use of Crown Land for a tower, thereby removing a significant area on Hornby from harm, is a desecration of the word "Crown" land - land that is available for public use and enjoyment. Hornby is not blessed with a large acreage of Crown land and what we have is heavily used. Hornby is widely known for its mountain biking trails and

hiking.To remove perhaps a significant part of it for a Tower, is not in the best interests of the community and the thousands of visitors that come to the island each year.

Rogers' proposed footprint on the land is nominal at around 15 m x 15 m with use of existing access and largely underground power. This is proposed on a lot that I understand is several hundred acres in size, while Rogers' proposed footprint is less than most single family homes.

3. There are plans in the works, we have learned, for some crown land parcels that are being looked at as possible sites for low income housing which is desperately needed for younger full-time residents. Aslo, apparently there is discussion re the building of some outdoor sports sites. To have a tower replacing community needs and uses makes a mockery of the term Crown land. Surely sane thinking will prevail over thinking that a tower should take precedence.

Upon review of the proposed tower location with the province (land management authority for the property), we were advised that there have been no applications made for other uses that would conflict with this proposal. Multiple locations were reviewed and this is one that appeared potentially feasible.

Additionally, the subject property is very large so there is plenty of space for housing or other uses. Rogers' proposed footprint is nominal and less than a single family house. There are many instances wherein communication sites are in proximity to other uses such as housing.

The other aspect to consider is land use. Are you aware that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands Trust own land use by-law? I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall directly to the east on Crown Grant land (including an existing communication site), the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east (including an existing radiocommunication facility), public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

Afterall. this is a small island where most residents will be happy with and appreciative of having a good internet service through a fibre optic cable system with **No Tower and No 5g**. **Thanks for your perspective. It will be shared with the decision makers along with the input of all stakeholders.**

I am a Hornby Island resident home-owner writing you again to request Rogers provide a Public Consultation Meeting with Hornby Island Residents regarding the Rogers Cell Tower application.

We are considering hosting another meeting in the new year however that is still to be determined.

In our last correspondence you commented on pre-consulting extensively with Islands Trust, are you referring to consultation with Island Trust staff? Correct - we preconsulted staff at the Islands Trust, province and numerous First Nations.

As you know Alex Allen and Grant Scott are our newly re-elected representatives and we expect them to be pre-consulted in matters like this. Please explain why this didn't happen? Generally speaking, we work through staff and avoid engaging elected officials unless instructed by staff to do so as sometimes this can be perceived as lobbying. Typically, local government staff will share information with the elected officials on our behalf.

It appears Island Trust did adopt a Model Strategy Tower System Protocol in their September 9th meeting. This needs to be acknowledged by you. How could that have been missed and how does this apply to your application? This is not something that anyone at the Islands Trust had advised us of despite numerous inquiries. We'll discuss with the Islands Trust and ISED.

You said in the online meeting this Tower would improve cell coverage on the whole island.

What data is Rogers basing this assertion on?

At the meeting we provided coverage maps and said that the majority of the island would received coverage with some exceptions at Mt. Geoffrey and Helliwell Park.

Is this a 5G installation and will there need to be other boosters or smaller antennas

installed on hydro poles to provide this coverage? All towers host the latest technologies. I am not involved in plans for any other proposals such as those you reference at this time. I am not aware of such plans at this juncture.

Please find our responses below in green text.

Brian Gregg,

Are there any signed legal agreements between Rogers and Islands Trust with regards to this proposal? **No - not to my knowledge.** 

Is there proof of health liability insurance against harmful effects of radio-frequencies to cover injuries? As noted, Rogers attests that its proposed facility will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement.

I have no authority to discuss quasi legal matters so if you wish to discuss those types of questions you may wish to contact ISED or Rogers' regulatory team directly.

Please give details about the cell antennas and components to be placed on the tower, eg, what frequencies will be used and what is the power output radio-frequency radiation anything else?

Currently, Commscope FFV4S4-65C-R7 is the antenna that will be used, you can see the spec by clicking on the link.

Rogers provides voice and data services on the following bands: 600/700/850/1900/2100/2600/3500MHz.

How was the need for cell tower determined? Please make data available and how it was collected? Rogers wants to improve its service. We do not share private customer data however service is lacking.

#### Are you considering an alternative site?

This is already an alternative site as we initially wanted a tower next to the co-op similar to the other service provider but were advised to look elsewhere.

The other aspect to consider is land use. Are you aware that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands Trust own land use by-law? I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall directly to the east on Crown Grant land (including an existing communication site), the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the

Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east (including an existing radiocommunication facility), public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

What steps did Rogers take to ensure compliance with the requirements of the Radio communication Act, Canadian Environmental Assessment and Safety Code 6.

This consultation brings us into compliance and our discussions with ISED and the Islands Trust will ensure that all such protocols are followed.

Can you say with assurity this Cell Tower won't cause harm to human, animal, bird, insects and plant life? **Please see our comments above re: Health Canada's Safety Code 6.** 

I am not feeling comfortable our safety is covered with Safety Code 6. When was it last updated, were there human triles using 5G frequencies?

This is the applicable safety protocol and it was updated in 2015. If you have concerns about the code please contact the policy makers at Health Canada directly. We have no influence over the safety standard. We are also not authorized to debate the code via this process as per ISED protocols.

Where are we in the 120 day window for public consultation?

120 days is supposed to be a maximum timeframe not a minimum timeframe. I am not the one who decides -- it's ISED.

That said, we are still sorting out details with the Islands Trust and are discussing aspects of the model protocol and alignment with that where possible. We also still need to go through the provincial referral process for use of crown land so there will be plenty of time.

Please be transparent on the First Nations Consultations. With whom, and what process was followed? Referrals were sent to every First Nation identified in the province's First Nation Consultation Areas Database. This data has been shared with the province as they have a duty to consult First Nations. As that process is not complete, it would be premature for us to share publicly the status of that process. It will be reviewed by the crown and perhaps Islands Trust.

#### Hello Mr. Gregg:

As a Hornby Island resident, I and more and more others within our Community are becoming aware you are helping to spear-head the construction of a ROGERS Tower - with intentions of carrying a G5 strength Internet service.

Your website: **sitepathconsulting.com** clearly indicates your employment as an "experienced land manager and planner" as well as an

impressive lead land use and former **TELUS Senior Real Estate & Government Affairs Manage**r for the TELUS wireless team in BC!

Mr. Gregg, you are clearly aware (and to remind you) - that based on **the known and proven physical harms of its rays -** a former, and official Community applied request for a G5 Tower by **TELUS**, was vehemently **voted DOWN by our community**!

As such we question your actions at this time, to think we, as a community, would feel any different about the construction of a **ROGERS** run G5 Tower!

With all due respect to your talents, Mr. Gregg, please desist from applying your experienced site acquisition talents towards seeing the ROGERS' tower become a Hornby Island reality. It is NOT an innovative project, and WE - AS A COMMUNITY, - DO NOT WANT IT ON OUR ISLAND!

This proposal is quite distinct relative to prior proposals on Hornby Island.

#### JS: We would much appreciate your detailing the above.

1) In what way is it "distinct?"

2) Other than the TELUS G5 TOWER proposal what were any others?

The location and land use context is different. The prior proposal was on a TELUS owned property in a more visible location. The subject Rogers proposal is on provincial crown land adjacent to a local fire hall, radio station (including an existing radiocommunication tower), works yard, recycling depot, Joe King Ball Park, vacant crown land and other mixed commercial and public uses.

The TELUS tower was proposed, at the time, to enable backup connectivity to the island in the event of a damaged submarine cable. The former TELUS proposal was not for wireless service or cell service. The current Rogers proposal is for cell service (voice and data service) which is important for both general connectivity and public safety since greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders are placed via wireless devices. There are many parts of Hornby Island where people cannot reliably place a cell phone call if they need to call for help, for instance.

In sum, the land use context and technology/infrastructure proposed is distinct. Of course, we understand that people will have varying perspectives on this proposal nonetheless.

The prior TELUS proposal, for example, was in a more visible location

#### JS: - to do harm to our children by being closer to the school!

and was also for a microwave back-up as <u>redundancy</u> to the submarine fibre cable that connected the island at that time.

#### JS: 'Redundant': No longer needed or useful; i.e. 'SUPERFLUOUS!'

(I admit not knowing enough about the dis-use of the "fibre cable.") Redundant meaning it would have provided a back-up connection or additional layer of connectivity to the island in the event that the submarine cable were to be severed. Having a back up system or "redundancy" can be critical during emergency scenarios. Most island communities have cable and wireless connectivity in case one system goes down. Nonetheless, the current proposal has no relationship whatsoever to the former proposal. My only reason for mentioning that prior proposal is to advise that I learned much from that prior process.

The community did not support that prior proposed tower location and we learned a lot from that process.

JS: We would much appreciate sharing your gained knowledge about the discontinued TELUS application. I learned that substantial due diligence would need to be undertaken to identify a suitable location for a communication site if I were to be engaged in such work in the future.

The current proposal is for a cell tower that will provide mobile voice and data services. This is important not only for general connectivity but also for public safety since greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders (e.g. 911) are now placed via cell phones.

JS: Having given you a glimpse about the electro-magnetic physical and mental harm these rays will have on ALL life, the calls you mention will likely sky-rocket!

Rogers attests that the proposed tower will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6.

Each person is welcome to comment. We have heard from many of these people. We will save your letter on file for the decision makers. Please note that you will have 21 days if you wish to respond further via this portion of the consultation process, as per ISED protocols.

The suggestion that the process has been rushed is not accurate. Rogers has been discussing this proposal with the Islands Trust, province and First Nations for over 6 months. We only recently commenced the broader consultation process (in the winter of 2022) and have only started the first portion of the process as required per federal protocols via ISED.

We will be sharing details of the proposal with the LTC as per the Islands Trust model protocol and subsequently will be going through a provincially managed referral process. There is plenty of time to discuss and there should not be a false impression that this is rushed or that any decisions will occur immediately. That is not feasible on crown land.

### Urgent call for action regarding cell tower proposal on Hornby

Community members of Hornby Island have many questions regarding the Public Consultation Process underway - regarding the installation of a telecommunications tower by Rogers on our island. The purpose of a consultation process is to ensure that the public has the opportunity to gain clarity into the exact terms of any proposal; Rogers's is no exception.

There are many concerns regarding the location (crown land near highly populated areas and earmarked for low-income housing) of the tower, its present and future purposes, the need for a tower, health and safety issues, the risk of forest fires, the sensory impact of a 200 ft antenna running live for 24 hours, depreciation of land values and many others. This is a very complex issue and the rushed process – forced to take place over the busy Christmas season, has not given the community time to absorb and understand the complexities in a reasoned and convincing manner.

Our local Trustees appear to be in the dark as well, apparently due to a lack of clarity regarding the sharing of information by the Trust office; information the Trust has had for many months. We can't help but wonder if our Trustees are being unduly pressured to make a snap decision, without allowing both themselves and the Hornby community they have been elected to represent, the time to fully understand the implications of this proposal. As our elected representatives, we count on them to speak and act on our behalf according to the best interests of the community. They should not be hampered in this duty.

The Islands Trust Head Office needs to be held to account when not complying with their mandate to "preserve and protect" the fragile islands it is responsible for. Is it possible that they, too, are being influenced by the corporate/government partnership model that communities all over the world are fighting against? Mounting evidence about substantial damage wreaked by similar tower installations on all organic systems (bees, birds, humans, entire forests), is rapidly being revealed worldwide. Is this the primary motivation for rushing this process, regardless of the consequences?

Expressions of concern are being raised throughout the community, including members of the fire department, the depot staff, the elementary school, the social housing committee, the Spark and a large number of residents. Why orchestrate a process that, willingly or not, obscures the facts, potentially leading the public to accept a type of industrial installation that is yet to be proven necessary or safe and is potentially dangerous? What is the hurry? Shouldn't protection of our pristine environment and the health of our community-our elders, and small children, all proven vulnerable to a greater or lesser degree-be paramount?

We are in the process of deciding whether or not to seek legal advice. Technical advice we have already received has alarmed us and we will continue to inform ourselves and others. We need to understand what is actually happening. We need to know if our community can legally be forced to follow a process controlled by a large corporation based in Toronto. We need answers as to why our community is being pressured into feeling that we no longer have any say over our own destiny. This is not what we moved here for. This is not why we chose to raise our children here. Corporate bullying and government overreach that seek to cut the public out of decisions heavily impacting our lives, must not be tolerated. It is not a stretch to say that this proposal and the process by which Rogers and its partners are attempting to implement it has possibly crossed a number of legal boundaries.

We implore our Trustees to support the community they were elected to represent and either vote NO to the proposal in the upcoming Trust Meeting, due to a lack of proper consultation, or put forth a motion to POSTPONE a decision to give the community the time it needs to understand the proposal and its implications properly. A vote that truly and dutifully represents the will and interest of the community needs to be one based on informed consent.

As a 23-year resident of Hornby Island, I am writing once again to strongly object to your current client's plan to impose of a forest-topping RF/microwave/millimeter transmission tower on an island community who rejected a similar proposal put forward by your lobbying firm five years ago. What's changed since then is the buried fibre optic network we voted for instead. That project will break ground here shortly.

Fibre optic service will be excellent; however, fibre will only deliver fixed internet to one's home or place of business. Rogers' proposal is for mobile service.

Having a fibre connection at one's house will not be of much help out on the waterways or if people are not at home when they need to call for help, for example. Over 80% of calls to emergency responders are placed via cell phones so this is a matter of public safety.

In disturbing contrast, the nearly 300-foot-high industrial structure proposed by Rogers would permanently blight the rural values that brought us to settle here, and which continue to delight and refresh countless wild and human lives.

In the Islands Trust "MODEL STRATEGY FOR ANTENNA SYSTEMS" (passed on May 3, 2018), Section C: "Discouraged Locations" stipulates that cell tower sites which "adversely impact view corridors" or "affect the scenic qualities of a corridor" are forbidden. These scenic views encompass our entire island, which is largely dependent on revenues from tourists seeking Hornby's natural attractions.

Thanks for sharing this. You may find it noteworthy that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands Trust own land use by-law. I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are

permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall directly to the east on Crown Grant land (including an existing radiocommunication facility), the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east (including an existing radiocommunication facility), public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

Unfortunately, corporate predators are also drawn here. Though for more cynically venal motives. Yesterday's resistance meeting took particular offence at Rogers' attempts to usurp a site intended for desperately needed affordable housing. Kindly explain to those awaiting accommodation why Rogers wants to deny them a place to live.

Upon review of the proposed tower location with the province (land management authority for the property), we were advised that there have been no applications made for other uses that would conflict with this proposal. Multiple locations were reviewed and this is one that appeared potentially feasible.

Additionally, the subject property is very large so there is plenty of space for housing or other uses. Rogers' proposed footprint is nominal and less than a single family house. There are many instances wherein communication sites are in proximity to other uses such as housing.

We do not appreciate any corporation seeking to cash in on our community at our lingering expense. Our future will *not* be decided in distant boardrooms by profit-blinded executives dismissive of the harm inflicted by their policies and technologies on those they will never meet.

Hornby Island is not a city. We refuse to be treated like a concrete metropolis by technocrats totally detached from our daily experience, which does *not* revolve around handheld screens. Current cell coverage from Texada and Qualicum towers is more than adequate. And our emergency services have been coordinated via a fire department radio mast for years.

\* \* \*

Our Model Strategy further stipulates that for a tower exceeding 15 meters in height, a "public information meeting" is required.

Instead, ongoing efforts by Rogers and SitePath to undermine our community process confirm that neither entity can be trusted. Continue insulting this community by ignoring our regulations and refusing to meet with us, and even residents in favour of that Trojan tower will turn hard against Rogers.

We already hosted a digital public meeting. Our prior experience with an in person meeting on Hornby Island was very problematic.

#### We are discussing with the Islands Trust.

I suggest that attempting to circumvent our community's priorities and protocols is ill-advised. As Trust Regional Planning Manager, Kauer noted for the record on September 9, 2022: "The Model Strategy federally compels companies to engage in extensive public consultation before installation of cell towers."

Underline, federal.

On an island with streaming-internet challenges and lack of personal computers, Rogers' "gift" of a single Zoom linkup so exclusionary our own local trust representative was unable to log on — and whiney emails casting yourself as the shocked victim of comments your strategy incited here last time around — hardly qualify as "extensive public consultation." Or bizarrely hyped fears for your life. Your trust representative advised that they were not able to attend in advance of the meeting. There was no issue logging on for the 30+ people who joined. Anyone who has had questions has received swift responses and we intend to be forthcoming with information.

If another digital session is hosted, we understand that there are community organizations that can offer secure internet access for anyone who may not have it.

Hi Brian

Thank you for your thoughtful and honest presentation and with your good humour. Thank you for your kind words. I do try to be straightforward with people and allow room for some humor as I know there are varying perspectives and it can help to try to relate to everyone as much as possible.

I was the one who asked about disseminating the feedback page. As the president of the Hornby Island Residents and Ratepayers Association, our plan is to allow for brief discussion and then an informal poll of the attendees offering only for and against. We will also send a copy of the feedback sheet to our members to fill out individually.

That is an interesting idea. I imagine as with any poll the results may depend on how the questions are worded, who is engaged, etc. It has been my experience, through many similar processes, that oftentimes people who have concerns are more motivated than those who may be ambivalent or even supportive. So, that is something to keep in mind as you may find that such a poll may attract people who are against such a proposal vs. those who are supportive. It might be interesting to know of your sample size, how your poll is distributed, who received it, where they are located (will they be required to provide an address?), etc. In any event, I am sure you have done this before and know what's best. Thanks for sharing your idea.

One technical thing: I found it unfair that people who turned their video on to speak remained visible, in one case all the way to the end of the meeting. I think that's inconsiderate to keep people on camera when they are unaware. I posted that in the chat but nothing changed.

That is helpful feedback. I am not an expert on Microsoft Teams and I am not clear on whether there is a way for our moderator to turn off peoples' cameras after they speak. However, I do know that people have control on their end of the system to turn off and on their camera themselves at anytime as well as to mute or unmute their microphone. Thus, at a minimum, that would have been an option for people if they were aware of how to turn off and on their video and microphone.

I'll ask Rogers about the video feature going forward and whether there are other ways to set up the video discussions. I'm relatively new to the software. I have found it to be generally quite effective but there are always ways to improve.



My responses are below in green text.

Hello Brian,

Thank you. I was amongst many who couldn't get on this call, which was disappointing, b/c we have questions to ask and opinions to share.

There is a large body of Hornby residents who are opposed to the installation of a Cell Tower here. This call was for some reason far more complicated than Zoom and didn't function properly. This process of 'asking questions' needs to be immediately rectified so this process can be effective.

The call was very well attended with over 30 people on the videoconference. There were both dial in (phone/audio) options as well as video. In our public notices, we advised people to reach out by no later than December 7 (24 hours before the meeting) if they wanted to receive the access code. Microsoft Teams is quite a straightforward tool as people don't even need to download the software and can simply click a link or dial in from their phone if they don't have a computer. We provided people with all such options. I think the vast majority of people had no issues joining the call and we have received a number of people complementing us on the quality of the meeting. Of course, as always, there will be all perspectives and not everyone may be satisfied but over all I left with a surprisingly positive feeling that the meeting was well attended and generally engaging.

Nobody, Rogers included, can run the risk of hurrying this process, and it is being hurried. It needs to be effective in the process of either providing or gathering community consent, or it will be one nightmare after another across the board. We live on a very small island that carries high impact with projects such as this. We deserve and will request due process in working with you.

I do not think the process has been rushed at all. For instance, I spent numerous months prior to getting to this public consultation stage pre-consulting First Nations, the Islands Trust planning staff, the province, local emergency responders at the fire hall, amongst others. We are required as per ISED guidelines to stick to certain timelines once the process commences however as noted during the meeting yesterday the ISED (federal) process is only part 1. Part 2 of the process will be the province's referral process which will include another round of public notices.

I have reiterated to a number of people including at yesterday's meetings that we will review all the comments received and consider additional opportunities for engagement. I can tell you, for example, that the public meeting was hosted voluntarily and is not a requirement so I trust that we have already taken some steps to demonstrate good faith and will continue to do so where possible.

I have questions:

- how are you 'making note' of our (Hornby residents) comments? I always keep a log of every comment. I respond to all reasonable and relevant concerns as per ISED protocols. I save all comments and my responses. I then share the comments with the relevant land use authority and ISED.

- are you gathering questions or comments? There is a difference. I am gathering both questions and comments as well as our responses in each case.

- how are they (notes) delivered to the 'decision makers'? I will deliver a report at the end of the comment period to the land use authority(s). All public comments received and my responses provided will be shared, with personal contact information redacted.

- who are the 'decision makers'? The decision makers typically are the relevant land use authority as per ISED protocols, which within Islands Trust territory has typically been the Islands Trust. I know that some people have been trying to suggest it could be the CVRD or others, however that has never really been the case within the Islands Trust -- usually it has been my understanding that the Islands Trust is the land use authority for cell tower proposals on all such islands (not the CVRD, CRD or surrounding regional districts). I've asked ISED to confirm however I did review all our consultation materials with ISED and the Islands Trust prior to commencing this process and at that time everyone approved the materials wherein we provided contact details for the Islands Trust, ISED and Rogers as the applicable contacts. Nobody advised otherwise and the review was thorough so I believe my above comments are accurate. If I am advised otherwise by ISED I will let you know.

To be clear, I am not a decision maker nor is Rogers other than to the extent that we can make a proposal and facilitate the required process.

In sum, at this time, I am of the understanding that the Islands Trust is the land use authority and have asked ISED to verify that. However, ISED does have jurisdiction over such matters so they can, in theory, also be a decision maker where pertinent however it has been our practice to make an effort to work cooperatively with local governments. ISED at this time is monitoring the process as always.

- how transparent is your process to all involved, inclusive of Hornby residents and Roger officials? I share all comments received and responses provided with the land use authority, ISED and Rogers.

- why was Islands Trust not informed as far back as Roger's proposal was put forward **This is not accurate. The Islands Trust planning staff were engaged many months ago, earlier this year.** 

- why does Rogers want to install a cell tower on Hornby Island? There is not reliable service on most of the island, regardless of service provider. As a service provider, Rogers desires to provide reliable connectivity to its customers. This is for both general connectivity reasons and also for public safety since the majority of calls to emergency responders are placed via wireless devices.

- why do you want to put a Cell Tower on Hornby Island in a densely populated/trafficed area? Is this densely populated? The subject property is vacant crown land and the lots in the area are large in size for the most part. There are no immediately adjacent homes. The adjacent uses include a fire hall, radio station, recycling depot, road works yard, vacant crown land, Joe King Ball park and then further away other mixed commercial and public uses. With that said, the answer would be that yes we do want to service the population and areas where people reside. Service upgrades are made in response to demand and generally occur where people live and work, similar to other infrastructure.

Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

Certainly people are welcome to share their ideas.





#### Good Morning Larry:

Thank you for sharing your comments. Below are the requested coverage maps. Please note that Rogers generally does not share coverage maps publicly before a tower is built because such maps are preliminary and there is a margin of error as they are a software-based projection or estimate only. For example, we of course do not know the height of every tree or other such obstacle that may or may not impact the signal. With that said, the below maps generally show that the majority of the island will be covered if this tower proceeds. The exceptions appear to be the higher portions of Mt. Geoffrey and the eastern portions of Helliwell Park. In any event, these maps are not always 100% accurate and it does not necessarily mean there will not be spillover coverage and some service in additional areas including for instance the surrounding waterways. The green areas below show the highest signal strength, grey is where the signal strength will be available but potentially less reliable, and white are areas that may be little to no reliable service.

I hope this helps. I know that some people have asked about why we do not propose to put the tower on Mt. Geoffrey to cover the maximum area possible. While that is an interesting idea I think the challenge would be that it appears to be a protected area (park land) and there is no existing access roads or power lines (required supporting infrastructure) nearby so we'd have to proposed to clear more area to bring in an access road and power line up the mountain. I'm not sure if the community would support that (seems like a substantial added challenge). The location that we are currently proposing on the other hand has supportive zoning from the Islands Trust (albeit, zoning does not apply to our federally regulated) and allows us to tie into existing nearby access and power. The vast majority of the island will be covered from this location, though there will be some potential exceptions.

With that said, there are ways to explore providing additional infill coverage with "small cells" (additional smaller installations on utility poles) if there are still coverage gaps in the future. Often we start with a single tower then re-evaluate if there are coverage gaps and can then look for additional ways to fill in any coverage exceptions.

Please kindly note that I am required to advise you per ISED protocols for the federal portion of the consultation process that you will have 21 days if you wish to comment further. Thanks for your comments. We align with you on many of your concerns and comments with the exception of your suggestion that we should withdraw the application. We do not intend to withdraw the application but there will be plenty of time for public comments via both the current process and additional provincial referral process since the proposal is on crown land. There will be substantial time for the community to provide input.

As an update, we had a good meeting with Islands Trust staff today and intend to formally share the proposal at the upcoming LTC meeting. I hope you had a good holiday with family time and a chance to rest.

I have been thinking about the possibility of another information session, either in person or on Zoom and I wanted to share the tentative conclusions of that thinking with you as promised.

Your descriptions of previous and unpleasant sessions makes me and other

members of the HIRRA Executive wary of inviting you here, only to experience that unpleasantness again. We assume that attendance could be heavily slanted toward those opposed to the tower, partially because there are many community members who are still cautious about attending indoor events with people who are likely not vaccinated, others who are away for parts of the winter, and no indication that I could see that part time residents were actively solicited to participate.

There have been too many places where correct protocol has not produced the desired results. This includes the fact that our trustees had not been informed of the application when you went to the Islands Trust staff. There is also the "Model Strategy for Antenna Systems" which was passed by the Hornby LTC on September 29 of last year (https://islandstrust.bc.ca/document/model-strategy-for-antenna-systems-with-northern-ltc-adoption-dates/) which didn't seem to be part of what you knew in advance.

The glitches in the process which led to its being presented to Hornby residents close to the winter holidays made this an inopportune time for our community to deal with yet another major change being proposed for our island. Many year-round residents are away at this time of year. Further, our community is dealing with many profound changes already (including a housing shortage, the pending arrival of fibre optics, and significant proposed changes to our OCP).

It therefore seems that this is not the right time or approach and I suggest that Rogers withdraw the application for now and allow our community to work on the issues we are already facing.

Thanks for sharing your comments. I will save your input on file for the Islands Trust, ISED and Rogers to consider.

Since you referenced the TELUS tower, I feel I should clarify why this proposal is quite different not only in terms of location but also technology. The TELUS tower was proposed to be a microwave tower which would have provided a back-up link to Vancouver Island in the event that a submarine cable were ever damaged (which indeed happened). The TELUS tower was not a cell tower and would not have delivered voice or data services.

Rogers' proposal is for a cell tower. Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

Notwithstanding the foregoing, we sincerely appreciate your comments and will save them on file for the decision makers.

Dear Brian,

I am writing to tell you that I do not want a ROGERS tower on Hornby Island. I know you are busy, and so am I. I will lay out my reasons in point form for the sake of brevity. Your opposition is noted on file for the decision makers.

-There are many people living and working within the 400 meter safe zone. The Recycling Depot, The Spark, The Joe King Recreation Facility, The families living on the Department of Highways property, The Fire Hall, and 3 homes on Carmichael Road. Below is a slide from our recent public meeting showing the adjacent land uses which include the Hornby Island Fire Rescue property; local radio station including their existing radiocommunication tower; recycling depot; road maintenance yard; Joe King Ball Park, vacant provincial crown land other mixed commercial and public service uses. All adjacent uses are substantially setback from the proposed tower including the homes you reference on Carmichael Road.

Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the Radio Communication Act (cell towers fall under this legislation).

There is no formal requirement for a "400 meter safe zone". Rather, all such proposed installations much comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6 and Rogers attests that its installation will achieve the safety code requirements.

My husband is the manager of this facility and spends 35 hours a week up there. It's too darn close to be safe. Rogers attests that its installation will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. - A cell tower will ruin the rural character of our island. We moved here because we did not want to live among towers and other things that to our eyes, are UGLY. We can certainly appreciate the beauty of Hornby Island. I have spent considerable time on the island visiting with friends, many of whom routinely advise me of the lack of cell service. It can be sincerely challenging to find a suitable location for the needed infrastructure that everyone can support. This is why we have sought to propose the facility near the existing fire hall, radio station and other such public service uses on vacant crown land. The mature trees in the area will screen the lower portion of the tower from view from many vantage points.

-Many business owners profit from Hornby being remote, quiet and beautiful. Healing Centres and Meditation Retreats do not profit from big ugly towers. We profit from quiet bird song and lovely vistas. People come to Hornby to LEAVE ugliness and connectivity and noise behind. Thanks for your perspective. As you can imagine, we hear varying perspectives during these consultation processes including those similar to your views and on the other end

of the spectrum we hear from people who are complaining about the lack of service and who find it to be problematic for numerous reasons including public safety and emergency response needs.

- We are connected enough. We have websites and connectivity. We don't need cell connection every darn place on this island. Believe it or not, many guests are charmed when they are told "sorry, you can't make a cell call from here, use the land-line" They LOVE the big old dial phone on the wall. They call it "old-school". And for us, a dial phone works in power outages too. I understand this view yet it must be balanced with the views of all stakeholders. While some people align with your thought process; I can confirm that there are others who want improved cell service as it is lacking on much of Hornby.

-Our community has slated this exact area for a housing development. Infrastructure is challenging on our small rock of an island. We will require lots more land than you can imagine to create this project. Viable septic fields, wells, roads. It will be extensive in it's scope, and not compatible with your tower proposal. The subject property is quite large in size and should be able to accommodate all the uses you noted. As of the time of our application, we have not been advised of any other formal applications including for housing (i.e. while such ideas have been discussed, there are no formal applications underway at the time of our tower proposal). Nonetheless, Rogers' footprint is very minimal at around 15 m x 15 m for the tower compound as well as use of existing access and largely underground power. Rogers has been in touch with the workforce housing proponents and has expressed a willingness to explore ways to co-exist and find potentially mutually acceptable solutions.

- I do not believe Komoks First Nation has been correctly consulted on this matter. We on Hornby Island respect Komoks First Nation, and their guidance regarding the environment and correct stewardship.

I can confirm that all relevant First Nations as identified in the Province's First Nation Consultation Areas Database received a referral before the broader public consultation process commenced. The First Natoins will also receive another round of referrals from the crown in the future. I can assure you that the Komoks Nation received a referral per your input.

- Hornby Island is NOT the place for your tower. We are a tiny rural island. We are about 6 km wide, and we have NO place for your Rogers tower anywhere. Thanks for sharing this view. As noted above, your thoughts are valued however we must take into account the input of all stakeholders.

- Please leave us in peace to be who we are and do not ruin the character of our small rural community that we love so much. There are plenty of cities and towns for people who are addicted to towers and such.

There are many rural communities that have reasonable connectivity. Indeed, Hornby Island is receiving fibre optic connectivity and already has cell service near the co-op and in limited areas via another service provider. However, there are many portions of the island that do not have reliable service. This can be a challenge for numerous reasons including for emergency response purposes since over 80% of calls to 911 are now placed via cell phones. For example, one may not be located near a landline when they need to call for help. This includes people on the adjacent waterways, roads, trails, etc. I understand that this may not align with your personal objectives however it is important to understand all perspectives.

- We are happy the way we are and do not want our views obstructed or our property values dropping. The subject of property values is outside the scope of my authority to debate via this process as per ISED protocols.

One possibility for someone with your perspective might be to consider not subscribing to a wireless service provider. There is no obligation to do so as the service offerings are optional to subscribe to. It is often possible to carry on with the status quo even if there are options for cell service.

- Please know there is a large, dedicated and strong group of people who do not want to see this Rogers tower project proceed on Hornby Island.

It is my understanding that there are varying perspectives on this proposal, as is often the case. It is truly a challenge to satisfy everyone's objectives. For instance, if we do not proceed with any tower there will be people who continue to be disappointed or deeply concerned with the lack of mobile connectivity. In contrast, there will be people who advise that they will not support any tower anywhere. Therein lies the challenge for service providers like Rogers. How can we satisfy both of those objectives simultaneously? It's effectively impossible. Typically, the most responsible way forward for a company like Rogers is to try to find a responsible location for the proposed infrastructure that considers local land use planning objectives.

We have been told that Rogers gave incomplete and inaccurate information to the Saltspring local trust committee (LTC) regarding the public consultation they undertook in advance of the tower approval. We also have been told that Rogers has pretty much ignored First Nations archeological features in the area, and an Islands Trust Channel Ridge master plan covenent on the land. Please do better than this regarding the process for Hornby Island. We want correct process, and correct public consultation. I have not been involved in the other project you reference. However, I can assure you that for the Hornby Island proposal I am doing my best to ensure that all required consultation processes are adhered to.

To Whom it May Concern,

I am writing regarding the proposed Rogers cell tower slated to be built on Hornby Island. I strongly oppose the construction of this tower for health reasons. Having had personal health challenges, I am against having anymore radiation transmitted from such a tower in our local environment.

Rogers attests that its installation will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6.

Hornby already has sufficient cell coverage if you are willing to seek it out.

The vast majority of the island does not have reliable service. This is not only inconvenient but also a public safety concern especially for emergency responders since greater than 80% of calls to 911 are placed via cell phones. People may not be located near a landline or within one of the limited service areas when they need to call for help.

Most residents live here to avoid the EMF smog of more populated areas and I should hope it will remain like this. There are varying perspectives on this proposal, as is always the case.

With fibre optic high speed internet nearing completion on the island, our tech needs will be more than met. Hornby does not need this tower.

This proposal is for mobile voice and data services. The fibre project is an amazing undertaking but it will only provide fixed service to one's home or place of business. Thus, having fibre optic internet service does not replace a need for mobile connectivity, just as mobile connectivity generally does not replace a need for fibre optic service. Most communities desire robust wireless and wireline service.

As noted above, this is also a matter of public safety. People may not be located at home next to their landline or fibre cable when they need to call for help. Often, people are on the waterways, roads, trails or out in the community when they need to call emergency responders. Also, not everyone may have a permanent home with a fibre optic connection.

It seems that the below has been copied and pasted as someone else also sent this exact language to us. In any case, please find below some comments.

Regarding the cell tower proposal for Hornby Island by Rogers from a 42 yr resident of Hornby:

"- September 9, 2022 - The Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems was adopted at our Local Islands Trust Committee meeting. The Minutes of that meeting record the adoption of that document along with a comment from Regional Planning Manager Kauer that "the Model Strategy federally compels companies to engage in extensive public consultation before installation of cell towers."

- Nov.14, 2022 - A notice is sent to Hornby residents/landowners that Rogers is "proposing to build a 63.0 meter tall selfsupport tower on Provincial Crown land....." this notice incorrectly lists ISED'S Default Public Consultation process as the process to be used. No correction has been issued, to my knowledge, by Brian Gregg, to acknowledge that the Islands Trust Model Strategy for Antenna Systems is the process that must be used.

Rogers has discussed with the Islands Trust. Upon reviewing the model protocol with Islands Trust planning staff it would seem that the only item that we may need to add to the process is a notification to the LTC which we have now set in motion. Rogers is working to fulfil all relevant consultation requirements.

- Dec.8, 2022 - Brian Gregg, Roger's consultant held a one hour public digital zoom meeting for public input and information. He appears, since that meeting, through numerous written communications, to be very reluctant to hold an in-person on-island public information session for Hornby Island residents.

\* Of note regarding digital meetings; many Hornby Is. residents and ratepayers do not have sufficient internet access to attend a zoom meeting. There are some local organizations who have suggested that they might be open to sharing internet access at their venue(s) if we were to host another meeting, however no additional meeting has been confirmed at this time.

The process for community information and discussion around the proposed tower has been woefully inadequate and flawed. Rogers has not even given a clear picture of where, and by how much, cell phone reception would be increased by having a cell tower on Hornby Island. This is vital information to cell phone users who want more coverage. This is not true. We have shared coverage maps including at the public meeting we hosted. Most of the island would be served with the exception of Mt. Geoffrey and eastern portions of Helliwell Park, we believe. This is an estimate only of course.

Cell phone coverage is already available in many areas throughout Hornby Island, via off-island already installed towers. It is not clear, at this time, what improvement to existing cell phone access would be achieved by this proposal. See comments above.

In addition, City West is in the process of bringing vastly improved internet coverage, via fiber optic cable, to every Hornby Island residence that wants it. This very much improved internet connection will facilitate educational, recreational and business opportunities for all, and can even facilitate cell phone use through apps such as Facebook Messenger.

The fibre optic project will be excellent however it will not offer mobile service. Rogers proposal is for mobile service which is critical for public safety and emergency responders.

Concerns expressed about the need for increased cell phone coverage for safely reasons could benefit from a public presentation by the Fire Department and First Responders as to what "workarounds" they are currently using, and how

improved cell coverage would assist them. Given Hornby Island topography and the number of trees on the island, promises, or assumptions, of wide improvement in cell coverage are vague and unsubstantiated. You are certainly welcome to discuss with the emergency responders. The fact is that most calls to emergency responders are placed via wireless devices.

Will the existing Hornby Island Radio station, in quite close proximity to the proposed Rogers cell tower site, be adversely affected by the cell tower output?

Rogers uses licensed radiofrequency spectrum that only Rogers is authorized to use so there should be no interference.

Given the above points, I would like to request that the Rogers cell tower proposal be postponed until after the City West fiber optic installation is up and running on Hornby Island. 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**On the evening of Thursday, December 8, 2022, OneWeb** launched 40 satellites from Cape Canaveral, Florida, bringing the total number of active satellites in orbit around the Earth to more than 7,000. These cell towers in space are altering the electromagnetic environment of the entire planet and are debilitating and exterminating all life on it.

Even the first fleet of 28 military satellites launched by the United States caused a worldwide pandemic of influenza when they became operational on June 13, 1968. The Hong Kong flu began in June 1968, lasted through April 1970, and killed up to four million people worldwide. To understand why requires a proper understanding of our connection to the universe and what it is that really gives us life and health, and makes our bodies move. In a sense, we are all puppets on invisible strings that connect us to heaven and earth, strings that resonate at the age-old frequencies of the biosphere in which we live, the space between Earth and Sky, whose dimensions never change. And when we modulate and pulsate those strings at random from thousands of locations in space, we change the beautiful music of the earthly orchestra into a discordant chaos that scatters bodies all over the world, helpless before it.

### **European IRIS Satellites**

The European Union just got into the act with its own program to provide highspeed broadband from space to all of Europe and Africa. On December 5, 2022, the Council of the EU and the European Parliament reached a provisional agreement to launch 170 new satellites called Infrastructure for Resilience, Interconnection and Security (IRIS). "This new component of the EU Space Programme will put an end to dead zones in Europe as well as the whole of Africa using the constellation's North-South orbits through a resilient and ultra-secure space and ground-based system," says the EU's Space Program (EUSPA) website.

# AST SpaceMobile

On September 10, 2022, AST SpaceMobile launched the largest, and probably the most powerful, commercial communications array ever put into space. It is the first

of a planned fleet of 243 Bluebird satellites designed to connect directly with people's existing mobile phones, no matter where on Earth they may be located. The size of its solar array -- 64 square meters -- is causing alarm among astronomers because it is as bright as the brightest stars during the hours after sunset and before sunrise.

So far AST SpaceMobile is working with Rakuten Mobile, AT&T, Bell Canada, Telecom Argentina, Africell, Liberty Latin America and Orange, for a potential customer base of 1.8 billion mobile phone subscribers.

The immensely powerful signals from the Bluebird satellites are also worrying radio astronomers, as well as human beings who are concerned for their well-being. The effective radiated power of each satellite, according to AST's filings with the FCC, will be up to 83 million watts, and the exposure level at the surface of the earth from such beams, according to my calculations, will be up to 3 nanowatts per square centimeter, which is 100 times more radiation than what I am exposed to in my house in Santa Fe from the nearest cell towers.



I am concerned with the health issues around cell towers and do not want to be exposed when I am required to be at the Fire Hall.



I am writing in response to the "Public Notice" advertisement concerning the proposed Rogers tower on Hornby Island.

1. **The "public consultation" has been very insufficient.** A few notices in small print, with a location drawing 6 x 7 cm, and a "digital public meeting"—this does not amount to full disclosure to the affected residents. I strongly urge you to arrange one or more in-person public meetings on Hornby Island. Residents need to be fully informed, and be allowed to ask questions and receive answers, before they can properly make comments about the proposal.

Rogers has consulted the public on the basis of the Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada Default Process as is required in such instances. Many months of pre-consultation occurred with Islands Trust planning staff, the province (since the proposal is on crown land), relevant First Nations and now most recently with residents on Hornby Island via newspaper notices in four (4) publications as requested by the Hornby Trustees, a mail-out welcoming public comments, as well as a digital public meeting. The comment period was extended and there will be additional opportunities for engagement this year.

2. Has there been meaningful consultation with the local land-use authority, the Islands Trust? The primary duty of Islands Trust is to "preserve and protect" these islands. Where can I see a statement from the Islands Trust Council, or our Local Trust Committee, about this proposal?

In our view, the Islands Trust planning staff and recently the Trustees have been consulted and we continue to welcome their engagement. You are welcome to ask the Islands Trust for their comments directly if you wish to do so.

Regarding land use, the proposed tower is to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

Below is an image showing the adjacent land uses including the fire hall and local radio station, both of which have existing radio communications infrastructure in place. Other adjacent uses include a recycling depot, road maintenance yard, Joe King Ball Park, vacant crown land and other mixed commercial and public service uses. There are no immediately adjacent residences.

3. Has there been an environmental assessment by a neutral body? Where can I read the report? Before setting out on any public consultation, Rogers always shares all the required consultation materials with Innovation, Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada (cc'd) for each proposal. Typically, ISED advises us that such tower proposals will not cause significant adverse effects, so there is no additional investigation or determination that would be required by ISED and the Impact Assessment Agency. There are two general reasons as summarized below however we welcome input from ISED if they wish to top up.

- Our proposed cell tower uses are not usually considered a "Designated Project" under the Impact Assessment Act (IAA). In most cases, cell towers do not meet the definition of a "designated project" under the IAA as cell towers are generally not considered major projects and the impacts are quite minimal (e.g. we need minimal ground space for a cell tower -- often less than a single family home). I was advised that typical examples of designated projects are larger projects such as oil and gas pipelines, mines or other major developments that have larger impacts on the land.
- Land Ownership we were advised that since our tower is not on federal land, there is no need for an environmental assessment. I was advised that if we were on federal land we would need to go through a public notice for a 30 day period on the IAA registry as we have done elsewhere.

#### 4. Have applicable First Nations been consulted? Where can I see their response?

Yes. Referrals were sent to all First Nations identified in the province's First Nation Consultation Areas Database. The province will also send referrals to the relevant First Nations however we have proactively done so already.

We will plan to share a report with all public comments with the province and Islands Trust at the end of the comment period.

5. Without having received full disclosure and answers to whatever other questions I might have, I give you some preliminary comments:

a) I am generally opposed to further sources of electro-magnetic radiation, on the grounds that they have multiple known deleterious effects on plants, animals, and other forms of life, including human beings.
Rogers attests that its proposed installation will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6.
b) I am concerned about the possibility of fire caused by malfunction of the tower's electronics. If an electrical fire spreads to the surrounding forest on our very vulnerable summer-dry island, it will immediately be a severe island-wide emergency. We are not aware that cell towers are a significant or common source of fires. You may want to check in with your local fire department and/or subject matter experts, however it is our understanding that in most communities other uses such as residential uses, commercial uses, smoking cigarettes, camp fires, etc. are more common sources of fire than

utility structures. Indeed, emergency responders including the local fire hall often express a desire for improved cell service since greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders are placed via cell phones.

c) I am concerned about the proximity of the proposed tower to the Hornby Island Fire / Rescue's Fire-Hall. In a 2004 resolution, the International Association of Firefighters opposed cell towers on or near Fire-Halls. As noted above, Rogers must comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is the applicable requirement.

Rogers pre-consulted the Island Trust planning staff, ISED, province (land management authority since the proposal is on crown land) for many months before starting this process and has made all best efforts to meet and exceed the federally mandated consultation requirements. For instance, a public meeting is not part of the required process however we hosted one to enable broader engagement opportunities. Another example of us expanding the process is the fact that we expanded the public comment period and posted public notices in four (4) local publications and on social media despite the fact that posting in only one publication is required. This is not to suggest that there are not ways to still improve, however it is not accurate to suggest that we have done the bare minimum or not made reasonable efforts to welcome input.

Further, there will be additional referral and public engagement opportunities via the upcoming provincial referral process. As of this time, we have only commenced the federal portion of the process.

A couple notes in response to your input:

- Please note that Rogers attests that its proposal will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6;

We were told the tower would not carry 5G frequency. At least not immediately. Since the aim of Rogers is to cover Canada with 5G, as stated on their webpage, it is probably that you plan to implement 5G the future.

## Safety code 6 is totally outdated.

The area around the tower at the moment has no residences but it is well used by the islanders and our visitors who can increase our population to 5000 during the summer months. Many are concerned about the electrical radio magnetic frequency that this tower will omit.



Below is the reply received from Rogers' engineering team.

The highest Power density at ground level is ~0.2W/m^2. That means that anywhere on the island at ground level will be less than 0.2W/m^2

The screenshots below show the power density and power percentages surrounding the tower at ground level. The grid shows how the power changes with 50m step increments.

Note that ISED allows up to 50% power percentage for public areas. The maximum percentage at ground level you see in the screenshot is 3.13% which is below the limit.

Thanks for sharing your comment sheet. Your input will be saved on file for the Islands Trust, ISED and Rogers.


Based on your enclosed comments, please note the following:

- Rogers attests that its proposed installation will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement and is the same safety standard that the adjacent radiocommunication sites the fire hall and local radio station must adhere to.

- We are not clear what you mean by "high intensity frequencies". Rogers is proposing the same type of infrastructure that is in many similar communities such as Saltspring Island, Sonora Island, Quadra Island, Gabriola Island, etc. The tower will be tied into a 200 amp service and will primarily service the local Hornby area. This is not a particularly high powered broadcasting station.

- The proposed tower appears to be approximately 300 meters (just under 1000 ft) and separated by dense forest from your closest building at the recycling depot property. This appears to be a reasonably large setback from a public utility type use. Below is a measurement map.

#### **Distance to Recycling Depot Buildings**



- Presumably, since your lot has similar or the same type of zoning and also on crown land, you are aware that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands Trust own land use by-law. I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

- Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

- As context, and as you know better than we do as a local, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall *(including an existing radiocommunication facility)* directly to the east on Crown Grant land, the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to

the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east *(including an existing radiocommunication facility)*, public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting. - Rogers' proposed 15 m x 15 m compound is a small footprint -- less than most adjacent single family homes for instance.

We are sharing the above land use as context only.

Another consideration that you may find to be of interest is that this proposed infrastructure will be important for public safety since over 80% of calls to emergency responders are now placed via cell phones. You may wish to inquire with your local emergency responders such as the fire hall staff across the street, for instance.







As a neighbour, the Hornby Community Radio Society Board received a consultation package regarding a proposal by Rogers to install a cell tower near the CHFR Radio Studio located at 3875-B Central Road, Hornby Island.

After research and discussion, we are notifying you of our concern about the potential for interference and degradation of the community radio's CHFR 96.5FM signal from the proximity of a cell tower to the radio transmission tower.

We understand that the cell signal itself is on a different wavelength than the FM radio signal and would not likely cause any interference. However, it is possible that the size and proximity of a large metal cell tower could negatively impact the radio transmission.

We request your assurance that should the Rogers cell tower project proceed and we discover that it negatively impacts our transmission of CHFR 96.5FM, Rogers will take responsibility for resolving and mitigating all these impacts to our satisfaction to ensure that Hornby's community radio transmission remains at its current quality.

I am writing to you in regards to the proposed 63.0 meter Rogers Communications Radio communications Tower for Hornby Island.

You are asking to build this tower on Crown Land on Hornby. It has come to my attention that this land has been in discussions for year round housing for the community which is one of the most critical needs for residents on the island. Have you looked at other locations on Hornby? Possibly one that isn't also so close to where many of the community gather?

Upon review of the proposed tower location with the province (land management authority for the property), we were advised that there have been no applications made for other uses that would conflict with this proposal. Multiple locations were reviewed and this is one that appeared potentially feasible.

Additionally, the subject property is very large so there is plenty of space for housing or other uses. Rogers' proposed footprint is nominal and less than a single family house. There are many instances wherein communication sites are in proximity to other uses such as housing.

The other aspect to consider is land use. Are you aware that the proposed facility is a permitted use in the Islands Trust own land use by-law? I am not clear as to any other such location that offers this land use designation where Rogers would be prepared to propose such a facility from a technical perspective. Are you aware of such a location?

Specifically, the proposed tower is proposed to be sited on land that is zoned PU-Public Use. The PU zone specifically permits Public Use facilities (utilities) as well as radio stations. Further, Public Service Uses are permitted in all zones and are defined to include telephone or emergency services as well as uses regulated under the *Radio Communication Act* (cell towers fall under this legislation).

As context, the surrounding land uses include a fire hall directly to the east on Crown Grant land (including an existing communication site), the Hornby Island Recycling Depot to the West on a Crown Lease, the Hornby Island Radio Station (CHFR) also to the east (including an existing radiocommunication facility), public trails to the south that enter Mt Geoffrey Regional Nature Park and crown land to the north also with trails. There are also a number of recreational facilities (Hornby Island Disc Golf course) and commercial establishments including the Hornby Island Farmer's Market along Central Road. There do not appear to be any residences in the immediate vicinity which we hope represents respectful tower siting.

I would like to request that you come to Hornby for an in person meeting to present to us what Rogers is proposing. Having one online meeting is just not conducive to most residents on the island. December 8th at 5pm was just not a convenient time. If given enough notice at a better time of year, I feel like the community would have a chance to meet you in person and find out what this proposal is all about. If the community consultation process is 120 days and it started on November 14th, 2022 then you should have another 60 days to come up with a way to meet with the community in person.

We already hosted a digital public meeting. Our prior experience with an in person meeting on Hornby Island was very problematic. It was a protest and not an information sharing session. I faced a lot of aggression including people cursing at us on a megaphone, people crossing out with permanent ink markers the materials on our poster boards (someone even wrote curse words on top of our boards), people refusing to respect the format of the meeting and setting up chairs in the middle of the room to host their own event, etc. We have also been advised by certain leadership figures in your community that our security and safety cannot be ensured at such a meeting given some of the people potentially involved. Thus, we will need to carefully consider how to best welcome additional input. Certainly, we have tried to offer a digital public meeting that was well attended and have been responsive to all who have commented or called us for information. We will continue to explore creative ways to enable people to get their opinions heard.

We are discussing with the Islands Trust and their staff shared similar experiences.

I have taken a quick look at the Model Strategy for Antenna Systems. It mentions the consultation process should inform, incorporate local knowledge, harmonize with ISED regulations and guidelines, be transparent, be consistent, be predictable and be expeditious. I do not feel that providing only an online meeting with the community is following those guidelines.

First of all, the ISED process has no requirement for a public meeting. Second, we have discussed the model protocol with Islands Trust planning staff and are working

cooperatively to harmonize. One item we will be doing is sharing the proposal with the LTC, though they are already aware of it. We are not aware of other substantive requirements in the model protocol that we have not already commenced.

Rogers remains open to working with the Islands Trust.

Regarding public consultation, you are required to notify all property owners and residents within a notification distance of 10 metre for every one metre of height of the tower. From what I understand the proposed tower location is within the list of discouraged locations. The tower will not share land with, but is within the vicinity of, the school, day care, playground, recycle depot/free store, library, community health centre, medical clinic, bank, farmer's market, community hall, Joe King Ball Park, radio station, fire hall and Spark. These are all places where residents in the community gather or work for numerous hours per week. Was this something that Rogers took into consideration when choosing the location?

We will discuss with the Islands Trust and province. Refer to our comments above re: land use. We are of the understanding that this is a reasonable location for the facility to be proposed relative to other options in the community.

The last revised update of Safety Code 6 that I could find online was in 2015. It is currently 2023. It states that the radio frequency EMF exposure to the residents of Hornby is safe. With the rapid change of technology and this clearly outdated exposures guidelines, does Roger's feel confident that they are willing to take any risk of liability for the community in case it turns out to be wrong? Government once stated that cigarette and asbestos were safe for its citizens, and with time those proved to be incorrect. What benefits other that better cell service does this cell tower provide Hornby residents where we should take any risk of it affecting our health?

Rogers attests that its proposed facility will comply with Health Canada's Safety Code 6. This is a regulatory requirement.

It is outside the scope of my role to comment on any legal matters. You are welcome to inquire with ISED or Rogers' regulatory team directly if you wish to have those types of discussions.

I think the community should be aware of how many year round Rogers cell phone customers are on Hornby Island. In the peak summer months of tourism what does that amount of daily users go up to that would require use of a Rogers cell tower? Would the tower be able to service that many new customers at one time? I am a Telus cellular customer. Will I benefit from having the tower at that location on Hornby Island? Will Telus or other cell service providers be leasing space on the tower as well, so that I and others in the community will benefit from better cellular reception? Has Rogers done any research on smaller communities, specifically islands to see whether or not insurance on our properties would be impacted if there is the potential risk of a fire from the tower? These are things a small community like us, needs to know.

TELUS has been made aware of the tower and has preliminarily expressed interest in co-locating. We are awaiting their formal input however Rogers will share the tower in accordance with ISED protocols for tower sharing and co-location.

I still own property on the mainland but I also now co-own property here on Hornby Island near my family. My brother, his wife and young family live, work, go to school and play most of the year on Hornby. My sister-in law who just went through a battle with cancer works up at the Depot. She will be working very close to where the potential tower is, so I have concerns for her health. The family is not a member of the Spark Maker-space but they do spend time there and I am sure that as my little nephews grow older they will be spending more time there. My brother is on the board of Joe King Ball Park and the entire family spends many hours there spring, summer and fall. I, myself, have spent more time on Hornby in the last year. I am sensitive to EMF and find my body functions a lot better when I am away from the city where it is all around me. I have enjoyed not having cell service at my property on Hornby. If I need to use my cell phone I can walk to the local beach where there is a booster.

Thanks for your perspective. Having wireless service is a matter of public safety since greater than 80% of calls to emergency responders are placed via cell phones.

We are not medical experts so cannot comment on your stated medical concerns. Rogers' duty is to comply with Health Canada's safety protocols.

As I was unable to attend the December 8th session, was it recorded and can I please have access to it so I can feel more informed? We do not record people or sessions without their permission.

With all of the feed back and questions you have received from the community, what is the next step and how will the Hornby residents be apprised of it?

# We will be discussing at the January 20 LTC meeting, I believe, though I am still awaiting my formal invite from the planner.

Today is the last day to send you concerns, so what happens now? We will submit a consultation summary report at some point but we intend to discuss at the Jan 20 meeting first. There are some details we would like to confirm and ensure alignment on process expectations. There is plenty of time to discuss as we still need to go through the provincial referral process for crown land. No decisions

will be made or sought for some time.

I am a cellular phone or wireless device user with Telus. Once my contract is over, I plan to not have cell phone and will use only my land line.

I do not feel it is an appropriate location for the proposed facility as it is way too close to numerous community gathering locations and where a large majority of residents earn their income.

Thanks Erin. Truthfully, there is a desire to have the supporting infrastructure in reasonable proximity to the end users that the tower will service. If the tower is located where nobody lives or work then there will be service limitations.

You might consider that there are two existing radiocommunication facilities in the same area already, for instance. Nonetheless, we appreciate your comments and concerns and will save them in the consultation file.

I thank you for your time listening to my concerns and in advance for answering my questions.

## **1** INTRODUCTION

Local Trust Committees (LTC) have recently been grappling with how best to consult with the public and to address local concerns around proposed cellular and radio communication towers. At the same time Innovation Science and Economic Development Canada (ISED) notes that there is a growing demand for denser wireless connectivity by citizens generally, as well as students, public service providers including 911 services, and small business. While people enjoy the relatively remote Gulf Island life, it also means they need to have adequate wireless access, including emergency services. This is especially true for the aging population on the islands who require access to health care more often and may avail of e-health services in communities with limited specialized medical staff.

The model *protocol* within this document has been prepared to help Local Trust Areas (LTA) effectively and efficiently assess antenna system proposals within their own unique contexts. The document provides a description of ISED's default public consultation process, a model public consultation *protocol*, model siting criteria, model Official Community Plan policies, and definitions. The model *protocol* may be adopted in its current form as a stand-alone document; or it may be customized for local considerations. The model siting criteria and the Official Community Plan policies may be incorporated into the *protocol* or included within an Official Community Plan. Existing processes and by-laws for each separate Local Trust Area should be reviewed in light of adopting the model *protocol* and be revised or rescinded.

The *protocol* has been developed with input and insight from Islands Trust planning staff, Local Trust Area Trustees, ISED, other land use authorities and representatives from the telecommunications industry. It should be noted, however, that input from the industry does not necessarily constitute support.

Note that words in *italics*, and not otherwise a document, legislative act or agency, are words defined in Section 7 Definitions.

## 2.1 Introduction

The model consultation *protocol* is informed by the department of Innovation Science and Economic Development (ISED) Canada's foundational guides, the Federation of Canadian Municipalities *protocol* template<sup>1</sup>, and Health Canada's Safety Code 6 (2009) regarding limits to human exposure to radiofrequency electromagnetic fields. A discussion on the respective roles of federal government and local land use authorities sets the foundation for a defensible and effective *protocol*. Documents and telephone interviews with staff and a trustee served as an overview of the Islands Trust experience in reviewing antenna system proposals. This information provides a practical and experiential foundation of the local context. Rounding out the review, interviews were conducted with IEDC, other local government jurisdictions, and representatives of the telecommunications industry.

## 2.2 Local Trust Committee Jurisdiction and ISED's Requirements and Recommendations

The ISED's *Radiocommunication and Broadcasting Antenna Systems Client Protocol Circular CPC 2-0-03* (CPC) (hereinafter referred to as the CPC) is the foundation for understanding public consultation requirements and the appropriate role of the land use authority. It identifies the *mandate*, established in Section 5 of the *Radiocommunications Act* states that the Minister (of ISED) may, taking into account all matters considered relevant for ensuring the *orderly development* and *efficient* operation of radiocommunication in Canada, issue radio authorization, and approve each site on which radio apparatus, including *antenna systems*, may be located. A certain measure of flexibility is required in siting *antenna systems* in order to achieve adequate coverage for service areas.

The CPC emphasizes the importance of considering *local surroundings* in deploying *antenna systems*. Accordingly, the default public consultation process requires *proponents* of certain *antenna systems* to engage land-use authorities with regard to *site options, local public engagement and review processes, addressing reasonable and relevant concerns*, and ultimately obtain *land-use authority concurrence* in writing. Land-use authorities are encouraged to establish *reasonable, relevant, and predictable* consultation processes specific to *antenna systems* and consider matters such as designation of suitable contacts or responsible officials, proposal submission requirements, public consultation, documentation of concurrence process, and the establishment of milestones to ensure consultation process completion within 120 days. To that end, the ISED publishes the *Guide to Assist Land-use*

*Authorities in Developing Antenna System Siting Protocols* which was referred to in developing this model strategy.

Certain types of proposals (listed below) are excluded from land-use authority and public consultation requirements; however, all *proponents* must consider whether or not it is prudent to undertake consultation for an excluded proposal on the basis of:

- the proposal's physical dimensions, including the antenna, mast, and tower, compared to the local surroundings;
- the location and proximity to neighbouring residents;
- the likelihood of an area being a community sensitive location; and
- Transport Canada's marking and lighting requirements for the proposed structure.

Exclusions include the following:

- new antenna systems where height is less than 15 metres, but does not apply to antenna systems proposed by telecommunications carriers, broadcasting undertakings or third-party tower owners;
- existing *antenna systems* where modifications are made, antenna added or the tower replaced, including to facilitate sharing, provided that the total cumulative height increase is no greater than 25% of the height of the initial *antenna system* installation;
- non-tower structure antenna on buildings, water towers, lamp posts, etc. may be excluded provided the height of the ground of the site of the non-tower structure, exclusive of appurtenances, is not increased by more than 25%; and
- temporary antenna systems used for special events or emergency operations.

The CPC provides examples of relevant concerns that may be raised during public consultation, including, for example, why use of existing *antenna systems* may not be used, alternative sites, and what is being done to integrate antenna into local surroundings. Concerns that are **not** relevant include disputes with members of the public relating to *proponent*'s service, potential effects that proposed *antenna system* will have on property values or municipal taxes, and questions whether or not *Safety Code 6*, locally established by-laws, other legislation, procedures or processes are valid or should be reformed in some manner.

## 2.3 Islands Trust Experience

Information about Islands Trust experience was gleaned from special studies, staff reports and *protocol* documents from the following Local Trust Areas: Galiano Island, Gabriola Island, Hornby Island, and Salt Spring Island. Documents reviewed included:

Interviews for gaining insights and information were conducted with current and former Islands Trust planning staff with experience managing *antenna system* proposals. These included Marnie Eggen, Justine Starke, Aleksandra Brzozowski, and Robert Kojima. Tony Law, a trustee for Hornby Island LTA was also interviewed for his perspective on dealing with a particularly controversial application.

Additionally, to round out the perspective from other stakeholders, representatives from the telecommunication industry (Doug Anastos, TELUS) and their process consultant, Brian Gregg (SitePath), were interviewed. Industry input, however, does not necessarily mean support for the draft *protocol* as presented.

ISED representative, Jeff Stanhope, was interviewed and he also provided comments on a draft of the public consultation *protocol*. No red flags were raised regarding consistency with the CPC, the foundational guiding document of ISED.

Following an initial review of this protocol by the Local Planning Committee further input from the telecommunication Industry was received via a roundtable discussion in January of 2018. Representatives included Doug Anastos (TELUS), Kiersten Enemark (Shaw), and Samuel Sugita (Rogers Communications).

## 3 MODEL CONSULTATION PROGRAM

## 3.1 Information Science & Economic Development Canada (ISED) Application & Default Public Consultation Process

## A. Description of ISED's Application and Default Public Consultation Process

ISED provides on its website a user-friendly text summary and infographic about how decisions are made regarding cell towers. The five-step process applies to all *telecommunication antenna systems* that are not expressly excluded from public consultation.

#### 1. Share

Is a new tower necessary? Rules require companies to share towers, whenever possible, instead of building new ones.

#### 2. Propose

Companies must submit a plan to the local municipality.

#### 3. Notify

Once a company has a plan, it must notify local residents of the upcoming consultation. Rules require notifications be clearly marked – no confusion with junk mail. All residents within an area three times the height of the tower must be notified.

#### 4. Consult

The company must consider the community's views.

Impasses are rare. <0.1% of cases require Industry Canada's decision.

### 5. Build

Following the consultation, and once the company and local municipality agree, the tower must be built within three years.

*Proponents* of siting and constructing an *antenna system* are required to present their plans and consult with the local land use authority; they are not required to make a formal application to ISED for siting an antenna facility. They are required, however, to provide information and notify ISED at the following points in the process in order to proceed:

- *public notification*: provide notification package;
- *responding to the public*: copy of all public reply comments; and
- **concluding consultation**: if applicable--for example, in cases where a land use authority does not provide a clear form of land-use concurrence, --the *proponent* may request ISED to confirm its concurrence that the public consultation process requirements have been met.

The ISED Default Public Consultation Process applies to *proponents* if the land-use authority does not have its own established and documented consultation process for antenna siting. ISED's default process has three steps for consultation with the public and land-use authority whereby the *proponent*:

- provides *written public notification* of the proposed *antenna system* installation or modification;
- engages and *responds to the public* to address relevant questions, comments and concerns; and
- provides an opportunity for *public reply* in writing to the *proponent* regarding measures taken to address reasonable and relevant concerns.

Details on timing, content, communication channels, and style of communication for each step are summarized below.

- 1. Public Notification
  - a) *Proponent* must provide a *notification package* to the following within a *radius of three times the tower height*:
    - the local public (including residences, community gathering areas, public institutions, schools, etc.);
    - neighbouring land-use authorities, and
    - businesses, and property owners.
  - b) The notice of an upcoming consultation must be clearly marked, making reference to the proposed *antenna system*.
  - c) Must provide at least *30 days* for written public comment.
  - d) In areas of *seasonal residence*, the *proponent* must work with the land-use authority to determine the best manner to notify such residents to ensure their engagement.

- e) In addition, for *antenna system* of 30 metres or greater in height, notice must be placed in a local community newspaper circulating in the proposed area. Timing must be synchronized with the distribution of the public notification package, must be legible and placed in the public notice section of the newspaper. Further, it must include:
  - description of proposed installation;
  - location and street address;
  - proponent contact information and mailing address; and
  - invitation to provide public comments to *proponent* within 30 days of the notice.
- f) In areas without a local newspaper, other effective means of public notification must be implemented.

2. Responding to the Public

*Proponents* must address all reasonable and relevant concerns, make all reasonable efforts to resolve them in a mutually acceptable manner and must keep a record of all associated communications. When a question comment or concern is raised the *proponent* is required to:

- respond to the party in writing within **14** days acknowledging receipt;
- address in writing all reasonable and relevant concerns within **60 days** of receipt or explain why concerns are not reasonable or relevant; and
- in written communication referred to above clearly note that the party has **21** days from date of correspondence to reply to *proponent*'s response.

The *proponent* may respond to a party via telephone, engaging in a community meeting or having an informal personal discussion.

### 3. Public Reply Comments

Examples of relevant concerns to address may include:

- Why is the use of an existing *antenna system* or structure not possible?
- How is the *proponent* trying to integrate the antenna into the local surroundings?
- What is the *proponent* doing to ensure that the *antenna system* is not accessible to the general public?
- What options are available to satisfy aeronautical obstruction making requirements at this site?
- What are the steps the *proponent* is taking to ensure compliance with the general requirements of the *Innovation Science Economic Development Canada's Client Procedures*

*CPC 2-0-03*, the *Canadian environmental Assessment* Act (CEAA), and *Safety Code 6* of the *Health Act*?

Concerns that are *not relevant* include:

- Disputes with members of the public relating to the *proponent*'s service, but unrelated to antenna installations;
- Potential effects that a proposed *antenna system* will have on property values or municipal taxes;
- Questions whether the *Radiocommunication Act*, this document, *Safety Code 6*, locally established bylaws, other legislation, procedures or processes are valid or should be reformed in some manner.

## 4. Concluding Consultation

Installation or modification of an *antenna system* may only be commenced after the consultation process has been completed by the land-use authority, or ISED confirms concurrence of the consultation portion of the default process, and after all other process requirements have been met by the *proponent*.

## B. Analysis and Observations of ISED's Default Public Consultation Process

## 1. ISED Limits of Public Consultation

The limits of ISED's CPC include the following matters on which it is either silent or does not have a requirement:

- application requirements to the land use authority;
- cost recovery;
- pre-consultation; and
- a means for community based dialogue beyond providing public information.

Further, the time restrictions on notice, responses, as well as the overall consultation time frame could be restrictive in addressing controversial proposals and the efforts needed to mitigate and search for alternatives. In practice, however, some consultation takes longer than the timeframes set out in the Default process. Carriers appreciate a predictable process, but understand that certain sites may require more time.

2. Analysis

The CPC clearly notes that its default consultation process is a *minimum* process and anticipates through direct reference that local land-use authorities may *augment* the process by developing its own *protocol* which can address, for example, notification of additional entities, expanded

minimum prescribed notification distances, pre-consultation meetings, and community information sessions.

The CPC also contains an important clause suggesting that even though a proposal may otherwise be exempt from public consultation, there are cases where "it may be prudent for the *proponent* to consult even though the proposal meets an exclusion." Considerations for this decision include:

- the *antenna system*'s physical dimensions, including the antenna, mast, and tower, compared to the local surroundings;
- the location of the proposed *antenna system* on the property and its proximity to neighbouring residents;
- the likelihood of an area being a community-sensitive location; and
- NAV Canada and Transport Canada's marking and lighting requirements for the proposed structure.

The companion *Guide to Assist Land-Use Authorities in Developing Antenna Siting Protocols* complements the CPC and addresses the role *land use authorities* (LUA)s can play in effectively participating and influencing decisions with respect to the proposed *antenna system* within the ISED's siting procedures and sets out elements that LUAs might wish to include in establishing their own local *protocol*. These elements are incorporated in the model *protocol* described in this document.

*Local knowledge* is valued, particularly with regard to amenities, cultural or environmental sensitivities, Local Trust Area planning priorities such as those related to telecommunication connectivity, and other relevant characteristics of the area.

Although recognizing that the LUA or public's preferred locations for siting may not always be feasible for strategic and technical reasons, the guide notes:

LUAs are encouraged to develop protocols that are clear and within their area of responsibility. Protocols can include promoting the placement of antennas in optimal locations from a landuse point of view, or excluding certain types of installations from protocol requirements. Through protocols, an LUA can highlight its local knowledge and expertise related to area sensitivities, including environmental or cultural concerns, and land-use compatibility.<sup>2</sup>

It is appropriate, therefore, for a local government to establish by way of policy in its Official Community Plan or Land Use Bylaw, and a *protocol* document, land use preferences, land use

sensitivities, and *design guidelines*. for siting of an *antenna system*. This conclusion has been confirmed in a conversation with an ISED representative.<sup>3</sup>

The guide suggests LUAs may consider preliminary consultation which will serve to inform, advise, guide, and indicate preferences to *proponents*. Communities such as the Regional District of Nanaimo have established a preliminary consultation step in the form of a site investigation meeting.

Further, the guide acknowledges that a LUA can set the format for public consultation in its *protocol*. These formats may take the form of a community open house, town hall style meeting, or another format preferred by the LUA. Ideally, the LUA and *proponent* will arrive at a mutually agreeable format.

In its outline template, the guide provides a set of considerations and suggested principles for a community in developing its own local *protocol*. The Regional District of Nanaimo, for example, has used this template effectively for establishing a *protocol* for all its Electoral Areas.

## C. Addressing the Limitations of the ISED's Default Process

A model *protocol* for the Local Trust Areas can effectively compliment and address the inherent limitations of ISED's default process in the following manner:

- specify application requirements in detail;
- require pre-consultation;
- require information to the Local Trust Area, even if public consultation is not required;
- address cost recovery separately through an application fee;
- establish the desired format for public consultation beyond information packages;
- increase written notification area;
- identify specific groups to notify;
- establish siting criteria via OCP policy or via incorporation within a separate *protocol* document; and
- establish its own time frames, provided they do not exceed limitations of the CPC; however, the CPC provides for an opportunity to extend time frames under certain circumstances, particularly if there is an opportunity to mitigate and review options.

## 3.2 Model Public Consultation Protocol for Local Trust Areas

## A. Introduction

Telecommunications systems that provide full coverage and service are essential to for a healthy and well-connected community. This protocol serves as a foundation to ensure that communities benefit from high quality, dependable telecommunication services that effectively support daily life activities, emergency services, citizen engagement, tourism, and local business all of which are important to the Islands Trust.

## B. Objectives

The objectives of this *protocol* are:

- 1. to acknowledge that ISED has exclusive jurisdiction over the approval of the siting and installation of telecommunication infrastructure in Canada;
- to establish a siting and consultation process for use by all Local Trust Areas (LTA)s that is harmonized with ISED's Radiocommunication and Broadcasting Antenna Systems Client Procedures Circular (CPC-2-0-03) and Guide to Assist Land-use Authorities in Developing Antenna Siting Protocols for reviewing land use issues associated with antenna system siting proposals;
- 3. to set out an objective process, criteria and guidelines that are transparent, consistent and predictable for the evaluation of *antenna system* siting proposals that:
  - minimize the number of new antenna sites by encouraging co-location;
  - encourage designs that integrate with the surrounding land use and public realm;
  - establish when local public consultation is required; and
  - allow ISED and *proponents* to identify and resolve any potential land use, siting or design concerns with the LTA at an early stage in the process.
- 4. to provide an expeditious review process for antenna system siting proposals;
- 5. to establish a local land use consultation framework that ensures the LTA and members of the public contribute local knowledge that facilitates and influences the siting--location, development and design (including aesthetics) –-of Antenna system within LTA boundaries;
- 6. to contribute to the orderly development and efficient operation of a reliable, strong radiocommunication network within all LTAs;
- 7. to provide LTAs with the information required to satisfy the requirements of ISED regarding local land use consultation, resulting in an informed statement of concurrence, concurrence with conditions, or non-concurrence from the LTA at the end of the process; and

8. to establish administrative fees to be paid by telecommunication *proponents* with consideration given to the costs to Islands Trust to evaluate and process proposals.

## C. Jurisdiction

## 1. Role of Innovation, Science and Economic Development Canada

Under the *Radiocommunication Act*, the Minister of ISED has sole jurisdiction over interprovincial and international communication facilities. The final decision to approve and license the location of *telecommunication antenna system* is made only by ISED. All technical aspects and siting of telecommunication and broadcasting services are regulated by the Federal government under the *Radiocommunication Act*. ISED has an established procedure, the *CPC*), which prescribes the process and review of proposed telecommunication structures. As part of the process, *proponents* are required to notify the local land-use authority and nearby residents. Moreover, the *proponent* is required to address the public's questions, concerns and comments through ISED's prescribed public consultation process.

## 2. Other Federal Legislation

## **Public Health**

With regard to public health, ISED refers to the standards set by Health Canada for determining acceptable levels of radiofrequency electromagnetic energy produced by telecommunication infrastructure. All telecommunication *proponents* are required to follow the guidelines outlined in Health Canada's *Safety Limits of Human Exposure to Radiofrequency Electromagnetic Fields in the Frequency Range from* 3 *kHz* to 300 GHz – *Safety Code* 6 (2009).<sup>4</sup> This code is accompanied by the *Technical Guide for Interpretation and Compliance Assessment of Health Canada's Radiofrequency Exposure Guidelines*, to assist users in understanding and assessing the safety of electromagnetic exposures in working and living environments. This code is also accompanied by a fact sheet, *What is Safety Code* 6? (available online at <u>https://www.canada.ca/en/health-canada/services/environmental-workplace-health/reports-publications/radiation/fact-sheet-what-safety-code-6.html</u>). The document is self described as 'busting myths' with a summary of facts. The introduction to this document, cited in the following paragraphs, provides a clear summary.

The Government of Canada is committed to protecting the health and safety of Canadians from environmental risks, including those posed by exposure to radiofrequency (RF)

electromagnetic energy - the kind of energy given off by various electronic devices such as cell phones and Wi-Fi, as well as broadcasting and cell phone towers.

Health Canada has a guideline, known as Safety Code 6, which recommends limits for safe human exposure to RF electromagnetic energy. The limits established in Safety Code 6 incorporate large safety margins to provide a significant level of protection for all Canadians, including those working near RF sources.

Health Canada scientists monitor the scientific literature on this issue on an ongoing basis. Safety Code 6 is reviewed on a regular basis to verify that the guideline provides protection against all known potentially harmful health effects.

While Health Canada recommends limits for safe human exposure, Health Canada does not regulate the general public's exposure to electromagnetic RF energy. However, many provinces and territories apply the exposure limits in Safety Code 6 for general public exposure. Wireless devices and their associated infrastructure (such as cell towers) are regulated by Industry Canada, and are required to comply with Safety Code 6.

Canada's limits are consistent with the science-based standards used in other parts of the world (e.g., the United States, the European Union, Japan, Australia and New Zealand) and provide protection against all known adverse health effects from RF energy.

### **Environmental and Aeronautical Legislation**

In addition to Health Canada's requirements, *proponents* must comply with the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act and any painting and lighting requirements for aeronautical safety prescribed by NAV Canada and Transport Canada.

### 3. Role of Local Government

Local governments are referred applications for proposed towers and are given the opportunity to comment on the proposal. Ultimately, the role of the Local Trust Committee (LTC) is to issue a statement of concurrence or non-concurrence to the *proponent* and ISED.<sup>5</sup> The statement considers the land-use compatibility of the antenna structure, the responses of the impacted residents and the *proponent*'s adherence to this *protocol*. In addition, local government can communicate and provide guidance to the *proponent* on the particular sensitivities, planning priorities, and characteristics of an area, and establish siting guidelines. Local government may adopt the default public consultation process as defined in ISED's CPC or augment the process with its own consultation process, subject to the time limitations established in the CPC.

## D. Antenna Structures for which Public Consultation is Required

- New antenna systems: where the height is greater than 15 metres
- *New antenna systems:* where the height is less than 15 metres proposed by telecommunication carriers, broadcasting undertakings or third-party owners
- *Existing antenna systems*: where modifications exceed a cumulative height increase of greater than 25%
- **Non-Tower Structures:** where the height above ground of the non-tower structure, exclusive of appurtenances, is increased by more than 25%

## E. Excluded Antenna Structures & Information Requirements

This section outlines the criteria for identifying *Antenna system* excluded from the consultation process by ISED, the need to consider local circumstances for all exempt structures, and the process for *proponents* to notify and discuss proposed exempt structures with the LTA.

1. Exemptions from Antenna System Siting Proposal Review and Public Consultation

For the following types of installations, *proponents* are generally excluded by ISED from the requirement to consult with the LTA and the public, *but must still fulfill the General Requirements outlined in Section 7 of the CPC.* 

- New antenna system: where the height is less than 15 metres above ground level proposed by business, government, Crown agencies, general public; this exclusion does not apply to *antenna system* proposed by telecommunications carriers, broadcasting undertakings or third-party tower owners;
- **Existing** *antenna system*: where modifications are made, antennas added or the tower replaced<sup>6</sup>, including to facilitate sharing, provided that the total cumulative height increase is no greater than 25% of the height of the initial *antenna system* installation <sup>7</sup>. No increase in height may occur within one year of completion of the initial construction. This exclusion does not apply to *antenna system* using purpose built antenna supporting structures with a height of less than 15 metres above ground level operated by telecommunications carriers, broadcasting undertakings or third-party tower owners;
- **Non-tower structure**: antennas on buildings, water towers, lamp posts, and similar structures, **are excluded** from consultation provided that the height above ground of the non-tower structure, exclusive of appurtenances, is not increased by more than 25% and have been reviewed by Islands Trust staff who will provide comment in accordance with LTA *design guidelines*; and
- **Temporary antenna systems**: used for special events or emergency operations and must be removed within three months after the start of the emergency or special event.

No consultation is required prior to performing maintenance on an existing antenna system

## 2. Design Guidelines for Antenna Systems

The appendix in Chapter 8 of this protocol document is a matrix of telecommunication design illustrating typical tower designs, rooftop antennas, utility poles and light standards. An LTA may choose to further exempt from public consultation any of the specific antenna systems illustrated in the matrix. Note that antennas affixed to buildings, utility poles and light standard are already exempt from public consultation, unless they exceed a 25% increase in height.

## 3. Voluntary Public Consultation

The CPC states that:

Individual circumstances vary with each antenna system installation and modification, and the exclusion criteria above should be applied in consideration of local circumstances. Consequently, it may be prudent for the proponents to consult the LTA and the public even though the proposal meets an exclusion noted above.

Therefore, when applying the criteria for exclusion, *proponents* are encouraged to consult the LTA when it is *prudent* to do so in consideration of any of the following:

- The *antenna system*'s physical dimensions, including the antenna, mast, and tower, is significant compared to the local surroundings,
- The relative location of the proposed *antenna system* on the property and its proximity to neighbouring residents;
- The likelihood of an area being in a community-sensitive location; and
- The nature of Transport Canada's marking and lighting requirements for the proposed structure.

## F. Notification and LTA Review of Exempt Antenna system

Notwithstanding ISED's exemption criteria for certain *Antenna system*, LTAs should be informed of all new *antenna system* installations within their boundaries so they can:

- be prepared to respond to public inquiries once construction/installation has begun;
- be aware of site *co-location* within the LTA;
- maintain records to refer to in the event of future modifications and additions; and
- engage in meaningful dialogue with the *proponent* with respect to the appearance of the *antenna system* and structure prior to the *proponent* confirming a final design.

Therefore, *proponents* are required to undertake the following steps for **all exempt** *antenna system* installations before commencing construction.

1. Building/Structure-Mounted Antenna System:

The *proponent* will in all cases provide the following **information** for all new *antenna system* or modifications<sup>8</sup> to existing *antenna system* that are mounted to an existing structure, including (but not limited to) a building/rooftop, water tower, utility pole or light standard, and which are exempted from public consultation in sub-section 3.2 D. 1.:

- a) the location of the antenna system (address, name of building, rooftop or wall mounted);
- b) description of proposed *design* with respect to the measures used by existing systems on that site;
- c) the height of the *antenna system*;
- d) the height of any modifications to existing systems.

The Islands Trust staff may notify the *proponent* of any inconsistency with the preferences and sensitivities expressed in the siting criteria and /or design preferences and the parties (proponent and Islands Trust staff) will work towards a solution that minimizes visibility.

2. Additions that Increase the Height of Freestanding Antenna system:

The *proponent* will confirm to the LTA that an addition that extends the height of an existing *freestanding antenna system* meets the exclusion criteria in subsections 3.2 D. 1 by providing the following:

- a) the location, including its address and location on the lot or structure;
- b) a short summary of the proposed addition including a preliminary set of drawings or visual rendering of the proposed system; and
- c) a description of how the proposal meets one or more of the Article 3.2 D. 1 exclusion criteria.

The Islands Trust staff will review the documentation and will contact the *proponent* where there is a site-specific basis for modifying the exemption criteria based on the siting criteria preferences and discouragements expressed of the *protocol*. In such cases, the Islands Trust staff and the *proponent* will work toward a mutually agreeable solution, which may include the Islands Trust staff requesting the proposal be subject to all or part of the pre-consultation, proposal submission and public consultation process defined in Subsections F. 2. a) b) and F. 2. of this *protocol*, as applicable, concluding with a letter of concurrence or non-concurrence.

3. Additional Exemptions

Local Trust Areas may exclude from all or part of the consultation process any *antenna system* installation in addition to ISED's basic exemptions listed in articles 3.2 B. 1. & 3.

- a) A new *antenna system* proposed to be located outside the LTA's preferred distance from the nearest lot line;
- b) Notwithstanding Subsection E. 1. Building/ Structure Mounted Antenna System, the Islands Trust staff may additionally, on a case-by-case basis, exempt a *proponent* from all or part of the consultation requirements under Section F of this *protocol*.<sup>9</sup> For example, exemptions may be granted where the proposed location is separated from a *residential area* or heritage area or structure by an arterial roadway, and/or is buffered by substantial tree cover, topography, or buildings.
- c) Antenna system greater than 15 metres in height proposed by government agencies such as police, fire protection, ambulance, other emergency services, BC ferries, and BC Hydro who maintain their own two-way telecommunication networks, except, however, such systems are not exempt if they are proposed in partnership with a commercial telecommunication service provider.

## G. Consultation Process

1. Consultation Objectives

The *protocol* for public consultation is designed to:

- inform;
- incorporate local knowledge;
- harmonize with ISED regulations and guidelines;
- be transparent;
- be consistent;
- be predictable; and
- be expeditious.
- 2. Process Steps, Requirements and Time lines
  - a) Pre-Consultation with the LTA

### Commentary

For free-standing towers, pre-consultation is one of the most important elements in the antenna siting process as it generally occurs at a point before the proponent is committed to a site or design.

As a result, it represents the best opportunity to influence the siting decision since the proponent will more likely become committed to a site once the detailed engineering has been completed. While a discussion of submission requirements is appropriate, the proposal will benefit most from early direction on matters of siting and design. Proponents are strongly encouraged to initiate preconsultation as early as possible in the antenna siting process for exempt and non-exempt structures. The process of building a good working relationship with telecommunication providers may begin even before a proposal is considered: Local Trust Areas are encouraged to invite potential proponents for a conversation about telecommunication at any time, the earlier the better.

Prior to submitting an *antenna system* proposal that does not meet any of the exemptions listed in Subsection D. 1. 3. the *proponent* will undertake the following preliminary consultations with the LTA:

## Step 1: Pre-Consultation

i. Pre-Consultation

The purpose of the pre-consultation phase is for the proponent to share with the LTA representative the network objectives, provide possible site options and receive preliminary feedback. The pre-consultation steps include:

- the *proponent* notifies the LTA representative that locations in the community are being assessed for potential *antenna system* siting;
- the proponent provides the LTA representative potential locations and invites feedback on preferred locations and/or designs; and
- the proponent may offer to host a community workshop to provide options and invite feedback on possible solutions, although not necessary.

### ii. Site Investigation Meeting

Based on comments from the pre-consultation step, the proponent will provide a summary of a site-specific location, including:

- **Site Location**: location, type and height of the proposed *telecommunication antenna system*;
- Alternative Locations: summary of what other alternative locations were considered, including options to co-locate on existing structures;
- **Site Design**: preliminary drawings and/or visual renderings of the proposed *telecommunication antenna system*;
- **Co-location**: summary of efforts proponent has made to allow other companies to co-locate on the tower, as well as indication from other companies regarding interest in co-locating on new telecommunications structure.

The purpose of the site investigation meeting is to:

- identify preliminary issues of concern;
- give opportunity for the *proponent* to outline the proposal to the LTA;
- give opportunity for the LTA to provide initial feedback to the proponent;
- identify any potential sensitive community locations as defined by this policy;
- identify any potential *neighbouring land-use jurisdictions, school districts, emergency service providers and community associations* that may be required to provide comment on the proposal as outlined in this policy;
- guide the proponent on creating *localized content* for public notification and distribution; and
- Inform the *proponent* of the LTA's preference of taller towers over shorter towers and supporting future *Co-location* opportunities.

## iii. LTA Preferences and Requirements

Following the Site Investigation Meeting, planning staff will provide the proponent with an information package within a timeframe determined by the Islands Trust that includes:

- *Public consultation: c*onfirmation if, (a) public consultation is required, and if so, the process the proponent needs to follow, including a list of any other agencies, jurisdictions, and First Nations to be consulted, and if a Public Information Meeting is required or, (b) public consultation is not required;
- Site design: comments on proposed location and design; and
- **Studies and permits**: a list of plans, studies and/or permits that may be required (i.e. environmental impact statements) as well as any fees that need to be paid to the LTA for processing application.

## Step 2: Application

## b) Application Submission to the LTA: Initial Application Proposal

Except for specific waivers granted for amateur operators (see Subsection 3) the *proponent* must include the following information when submitting a *telecommunication antenna system* siting proposal to the LTA that does not meet the exemption criteria for the proposal review and public consultation requirement:

i. **Site Rationale**: a letter or report from the *proponent* indicating the need for the proposed site, the rationale for site selection, and a summary of opportunities for *colocation* potentials on existing or proposed *antenna system* within the LTA;

- ii. **Co-location: (a)** a summary of effort proponent has made to encourage others to co-locate on the proposed new infrastructure, as well as a list of parties who have expressed an interest in co-locating, and (b) a written and signed attestation that there are no *co-location* opportunities within the LTA;
- Site Design: Preliminary engineering plans of the proposed structure which includes information outlining the number of antennas proposed on the structure, and the structure's ability to accommodate future antennas (including *co-location*).
   Proponents are encouraged to provide site design options;
- iv. **Visual Renderings**: visual rendering(s) of the proposed *antenna system* with best effort to superimpose to scale;
- v. Site Plan: a site plan showing the proposed development situated on the site;
- vi. **Site Distance to Surrounding Areas**: a map showing the horizontal distance between the proposed antenna system and the nearest residential, commercial and institutional uses;
- vii. **Letter of Authorization**: confirmation of legal ownership of the lands subject to the proposal, or a signed letter of authorization from the registered property owner of the land, their agent or other person(s) having legal or equitable interest in the land;
- viii. **Title Search**: a copy of a title search (dated within the past 30 days of proposal submission) and any restrictions, restrictive covenants, easements or rights-of-way registered against the lands the *telecommunication antenna system* is proposed on;
- ix. **Safety Code 6**: a written and signed attestation that the *telecommunication antenna system* will respect Health Canada's *Safety Code 6* which sets safe radiofrequency emission levels for these devices including the cumulative effects of multiple *telecommunication antenna system* at the location and in the immediate area;
- x. **Supplemental Documentation:** any other documentation as reasonably identified by the LTC following the site investigation meeting; and
- xi. Fee: the application fee as required by Local Trust Area Bylaw No. \_\_\_\_\_.
- xii. Draft Notification: Based on required consultation process as directed by LTA, the proponent is to provide, (a) a draft of all public notices to be delivered by mail to the public, School Districts, community associations and neighbouring land-use jurisdictions, which is to be approved by LTA staff prior to mail out; (b) an address list and map indicating all properties and residents which are to be notified by mail of the proposal, (c) a draft of newspaper advertisements indicating the time and date of any public information meeting, which is to be reviewed by LTA staff prior to publication (if a public information meeting is required); and
- xiii. **Comments from Emergency Services**: a copy of written correspondence indicating that the *proponent* has referred the proposal to local fire, police and ambulance

services, and if given, any comments received emergency services should be submitted to LTA staff prior to mail out.

- 3. Waivers to Application Submissions
  - a) The LTA may waive any of the Initial Application or Public Notification requirements for amateur radio operators on a case by case basis.

## Step 3: Public Consultation

In addition to ISED's public consultation requirements as prescribed in *Radiocommunication and Broadcasting Antenna Systems Client Procedures Circular* (CPC-2-0-03), the LTA has incorporated into the requirements a number of *augmentations* to the public consultation process. Itemization of the augmented elements may be found in Table A: "Consultation and Information –Process Steps and Requirements: ISECD & Augmentation."

- a) Notification Requirements for Non-exempt Antenna Systems
  - i. The *proponent* will provide written notice, sent by regular mail or hand delivered, to all property owners and residents with a *notification distance* of 10 metres for every one metre in height from the base of the structure for a *freestanding antenna system*
  - ii. The *proponent* will provide written notice, sent by regular mail or hand delivered, to all *neighbouring land-use jurisdictions, emergency service providers* and *school districts* with a *notification distance* of 1000 metres from the base of the structure.
  - iii. The *proponent* will provide notice to ISED's regional office.
  - iv. The *proponent* will provide written notification to Community Associations identified at the site investigation meeting.
  - v. The proponent will place notice of the *telecommunication antenna system* proposal in at least two editions of a local newspaper.
  - vi. Where a public information meeting is to be held for a proposed *telecommunication antenna system*, a notice of the meeting shall be placed in at least two editions of a local newspaper and the proponent will provide written notice of the meeting sent by regular mail or hand delivered, to all property owners, *land-use jurisdictions, emergency service providers* and *school districts* with a *notification distance* of 10 metres for every one metre in height for a *freestanding antenna system* and for a *building/structure-mounted antenna system*.
- b) Notice Content Requirements<sup>10</sup>

The *proponent* shall include at a minimum the following information in any mailed or otherwise delivered public notice:

- i. The proposed antenna system's purpose, the reasons why existing antenna systems or other infrastructure cannot be used, a list of other structures that were considered unsuitable and future sharing possibilities for the proposal;
- ii. Information on the location within the community, the geographic coordinates and the specific property or rooftop, height, type, design and colour of the proposed telecommunication antenna system, including a copy of the site plan submitted with the application;
- iii. Description of the antenna that may be mounted on the supporting structure and simulated images of the proposal;
- iv. Identification of areas accessible to the general public and the access/demarcation measures to control public access;
- v. An attestation that the general public will be protected in compliance with Health Canada's Safety Code 6 including combined effects within the local radio environment at all times;
- vi. An attestation that the installation will respect good engineering practices including structural adequacy;
- vii. Transport Canada's aeronautical obstruction marking requirements (whether painting, lighting or both) if available; if not available, the proponent's expectation of Transport Canada's requirements together with an undertaking to provide Transport Canada's requirements once they become available;
- viii. Information on the environmental status of the project, including any requirements under the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012;
- ix. Clear information on the role of ISED as the sole approving authority for the siting of telecommunication Antenna system and that the LTA only provides a statement of siting concurrence/non-concurrence at the request of the proponent;
- Notice that general information relating to antenna systems is available on ISED Canada's Spectrum Management and Telecommunications website (<u>http://www.ic.gc.ca/towers</u>);
- xi. Reference to any applicable local land-use requirements such as local processes, protocols, etc.;
- xii. Information that comments and responses should be directed to the proponent and that all submissions received by the proponent will be forwarded to the LTA for their records;
- xiii. Information that citizens may request their name and contact information be kept confidential within the published records;

- xiv. The name and contact information of a contact person for the *proponent*;
- xv. The name and contact information of ISED;
- xvi. The name and contact information of the LTAs planner;
- xvii. An attestation that the *telecommunication antenna system* will respect Health Canada's *Safety Code 6* which sets safe radiofrequency emission levels for these devices; and
- xviii. The date, time and location of the public information meeting where required.
- xix. closing date for submission of written public comments (not less than 30 days from receipt of notification).
- xx. The notification shall be sent in an envelope addressed to the "Occupant" and/or "Tenants" and shall clearly show in bold type on the face of the envelope the statement: "NOTICE FOR RESIDENTS: NEW PROPOSED CELL TOWER - INFORMATION IS ENCLOSED."

#### 5. Public Information Session

The LTA requests the *proponent* chair a public information meeting for all proposed *telecommunication Antenna system* exceeding 15 metres in height *or where there is significant public interest in the new free standing proposed telecommunication antenna system*. The type of public meeting to be conducted is up to the discretion of the proponent, however:

- an appropriate date, time and location for the public information meeting will be determined in consultation with the LTA's Island Planner;
- the *proponent* will make available at the public information meeting an appropriate visual display of the proposal, including a copy of the site plan submitted with the application and an aerial photograph of the proposed site;
- all information and materials presented should consist of *localized content*;
- the *proponent* shall not schedule a public information meeting less than seven day prior to the close of the public consultation period; and
- the *proponent* may request LTA staff attendance and participation in the meeting.
- 6. Online Community Engagement
  - A proponent may augment the public information session with an online forum to allow information sharing and feedback from people who may not be able to attend a public forum

#### 7. Step 4: Request for Concurrence

#### a) Submission to the LTA: Request for Concurrence

Prior to submitting a formal request for siting concurrence, the proponent must include the following information to the LTA:

- A summary of and a copy of all public submissions and responses, as well as the proponent's response to public submissions as outlined in ISED's *Radiocommunication and Broadcasting Antenna Systems Client Procedures Circular* (CPC-2-0-03);
- ii. A letter outlining any NAV Canada and Transport Canada requirements for lighting and painting on the proposed *telecommunication antenna system*;
- iii. A copy of all plans and studies (i.e. Environmental Review) required for the construction of the proposed *telecommunication antenna system*;
- iv. A package summarizing the results of the public information meeting containing at a minimum, the following:
  - The time, date, location and number of people in attendance of any public information meeting held;
  - A List of attendees, including names, addresses and phone numbers (where provided voluntarily);
  - Copies of all letters and other written communications received; and
  - A letter outlining how all the concerns and issues raised by the public were addressed.
- b) Statement of Concurrence or Non-concurrence

#### Commentary

The purpose of this protocol is to provide the LTC with consistent procedures and information with which to evaluate the siting of a telecommunication antenna system. Following the commencement of the consultation period, the proponent may request a statement of concurrence from the LTC. Once a request is received, Islands Trust staff will prepare a report with a recommendation to the LTC. The staff report will include information on the proposed telecommunication antenna system, a site plan, the location of the proposal, an overview of the application and all public consultation materials submitted by the proponent for the Committee's review. It is the discretion of the LTC to provide a statement of siting concurrence or non-concurrence or- The proponent can ask for a decision from the LTC. If nothing is forthcoming, after a certain amount of time, they can ask ISED what to do next. Should a proposal ever go to impasse (rare), ISED will look at the default process as a minimum and also consider the LTC's protocol. In reaching a decision

the ISED will consider such questions as 'Did the proponent address all requirements?', 'Did the proponent adequately address all reasonable and relevant concerns? and 'Can the proponent argue that the LTC's process was overly onerous and unrealistic?'

The statement of concurrence or non-concurrence shall occur within 120 days of acceptance of a complete application, unless otherwise agreed to by the proponent and ISED.

- c) Duration of Concurrence
  - i. Concurrence remains in effect for a maximum period of 3 years from the date it was issued by the LTC. If construction has not commenced within this time period, the concurrence expires and a new submission and review process, including public consultation as applicable, is necessary prior to any construction activity.
  - ii. Request notification of intent to construct 60 days prior commencement of construction activity (OR, building permit).
  - iii. Once concurrence has been issued, it may be transferred from the original proponent to another proponent without the need for further consultation provided that:
    - All information gathered by the original *proponent* is transferred to the new *proponent*;
    - The structure and *antenna system* for which the concurrence was issued to the original *proponent* is what the new *proponent* builds, and
    - Construction of the structure is begun within the duration of the concurrence period.
- d) Letter of Undertaking

The Proponent may be required by the LTC to provide a Letter of Undertaking which may include the following requirements:

- i. posting of a security for the construction of any proposed fencing, screening or landscaping or
- ii. building permit requirements determined by the regulations of the \_\_\_\_\_\_Regional District.

### H. Terms of Use of This Policy

The LTA is not in any way bound by this policy and is free to apply, or not apply, any evaluation criterion it deems appropriate in its consideration of applications.

# 4 LAND USE SITING CRITERIA

# 4.1 Introduction

Antenna systems should be sited and designed to respect local sensitivities and preferences as identified by the LTA, including making efforts to being unobtrusive and inconspicuous, minimizing visual impact, avoiding disturbance to natural features and reduce the need for future facilities in the same area, where appropriate.

#### Commentary

An outright ban on any type of antenna system is not defensible and may ultimately not be in the LTA's best interest as the ISED has the ultimate approval authority; better to have a progressive policy that recognizes telecommunication antenna systems need to go "somewhere" and use siting criteria to help proponents find the "least worst" spot. Siting criteria puts the LTA in a position of having some control, rather than being ultimately powerless.

These criteria address co-location, re-use, use of existing infrastructure, and new antenna systems.

Consideration is requested in the following order of priority:

- 1. Co-location on an existing Antenna System
- 2. Re-use of an existing telecommunication facility
- 3. Use of *existing infrastructur*e such as a building rooftop or utility pole
- 4. Stealth design of a new antenna system
- 5. New antenna system structure

The proponent should review the guidelines identified below as early as possible and should attempt to resolve any outstanding issues prior to submitting its *antenna system* siting proposal and undertaking the public consultation, where required by the LTC. Because expressed preferences may be location or site specific, the proponent is encouraged to discuss the guidelines fully with Islands Trust planning staff during a preliminary meeting.

Proponents are also required to obtain all applicable building permits for additions and/or modifications to existing buildings. `

# 4.2 Criteria

Before submitting a proposal for an *antenna system* on a new site, the *proponent* must explore the following options:

- consider *co-location* by sharing an existing *antenna* system;
- explore modifying or replacing a structure if necessary; and

- locate, analyze and attempt to use any feasible *existing infrastructure*, including (but not limited to) rooftops, water towers, utility poles or light standards; and
- explore the feasibility of designing a new antenna system where the visibility of the equipment is minimized from street level, including shrouding or stealth design.

Where *co-location*, re-use, modification, use of existing infrastructure, or a *stealth design* of a new structure is not feasible, a new *antenna system* should be designed with *co-location* capacity, including in *residential areas* when identified as the LTA's preference.

The LTA recognizes that the objective of promoting *co-location* and the objective of making *antenna systems* less noticeable may sometimes come into conflict. Nevertheless, the LTA intends to review each submission on its merits with a view to promoting both objectives and, where necessary, will determine the appropriate balance between them. The *proponent* should, in all cases, verify the LTA's site-specific criteria preferences during the pre-submission consultation process before investing in a final design or site.

# A. Preferred locations

When new *Antenna systems* must be constructed, *where technically feasible*, the following locations are preferred:

- 1. Buildings & Infrastructure
  - Existing buildings and/or structure mounted antenna systems
  - Areas that can access fiber optic networks to allow for backhauling into the fiber optic network

### 2. Land Use Preferences

- Industrial use land
- Agricultural use land
- Highway or service commercial use land (excluding mixed residential use)
- Land owned by the Islands Trust or another government entity
- Utility institutional use land were appropriate, but not limited to those institutions that require telecommunications technology, emergency services, hospitals, colleges
- BC Hydro utility corridor rights of way
- Low density residential areas as defined by the Local Trust Area

### B. Distance Considerations

- Distance of new free-standing towers from existingSafety shall be at least one (1) times the height of the proposed tower.
- Notwithstanding the distance of one (1) times the height of a proposed tower from property lines, the distance may be increased by the Local Trust Committee to a maximum of (3) times the height of the proposed tower. The LTC should consider a guideline of increasing the setback by up to 25% if it is reasonably anticipated that the tower may be *increased* in height by up to 25% in the future and otherwise be exempt from any public consultation process.
- Notwithstanding the distance of one (1) times the height of a proposed tower from property lines, the distance may be *decreased* if the location is consistent with the land use preferences of Article 4.2 A. 2 Preferred Locations and avoids discouraged locations of Article 4.2 C Discouraged Locations.
- Se backs from property lines adjacent non-residential uses may invite special consideration in the Land Use Bylaw. The setbacks should serve to separate *Antenna systems* from adjacent development without unduly affecting the development potential of the lot over the lease period.

#### C. Discouraged Locations

#### All Antenna Systems

- Locations directly in front of doors, windows, balconies or residential frontages
- Land zoned for nature protection
- Environmentally sensitive ecosystems as defined in the Official Community Plan

Free-standing Antenna Systems

- Medium and high density *residential areas* as defined by the Local Trust Area
- Schools, daycare facilities, playgrounds and similar facilities
- Areas that adversely impact view corridors
- Heritage areas (unless visibly unobtrusive) or on heritage structures unless it forms an integrated part of the structure's overall design (i.e. through the use of stealth structures).
- Sites of topographical and geographic prominence
- Sites that detrimentally affect the scenic quality of a corridor.
- Sites that detrimentally affect the foreground views of residents;

#### D. Incentives

All or part of the public consultation requirements may be waived for *antenna systems* proposed on sites that are consistent with OCP policy, preferred siting locations, that exceed setback considerations, feature innovative design to a high standard and embrace infrastructure as art, included shrouded or internal antennae, and avoid discouraged locations.

In all cases, however, the *proponent* is required to provide *information* regarding the proposed antenna system in accordance with Section 3.2 E. Notification and Municipal Review of Exempt Antenna system.

### E. Criteria not to address

As described in the CPC, *proponents* have specific obligations subject to federal requirements. Additional obligations may not be imposed; however, it is appropriate to ask questions and seek clarification concerning their steps and alternatives available to satisfy these requirements.

Proponents must comply with the following:

- Health Canada's public radio frequency exposure guidelines <u>Safety Code 6</u> (*Limits of Human Exposure to Radio Frequency Electromagnetic Energy in the Frequency Range from* 3 *kHz to* 300 *GHz Safety Code* (2009);
- Radio Frequency Interference and Immunity <u>– EMCAB-2—Criteria for Resolution of Immunity</u> <u>Complaints Involving Fundamental Emissions of Radiocommunications Transmitters;</u>
- <u>Canadian Environmental Assessment Act, 2012</u> CEAA 2012; and
- Aeronautical Safety Transport Canada and <u>NAV CANA</u>DA requirements for aeronautical safety.

# 5 MODEL OFFICIAL COMMUNITY PLAN POLICIES

## 5.1 Advocacy Policies

- 1. Health Canada should continue to evaluate health impacts of electromagnetic radiofrequencies from telecommunication facilities, including towers, to ensure that detrimental effects on human health do not occur.
- 2. Support efforts to expand electronic communications and infrastructure within the community provided it can be demonstrated that such is in compliance with the Canadian Environmental Assessment Act (CEAA), and the Safety Code 6 of the Health Act.
- Support multi-Island public organizations such the Southern Gulf Islands Economic Sustainability Commission in its objective of improving the telecommunications services in the Gulf Islands.
- 4. Endorse the Canadian Radio and Television Commission policy statement on high speed broadband, especially by cable, as a basic service.
- 5. Encourage telecommunication providers to retain and increase the number of pay telephones in areas with poor cell coverage as an emergency back-up.
- 6. Encourage telecommunication providers to re-assess its fibre optic cable within the Local Trust Area (LTA) for public and institutional access and to allow third party access.
- 7. Promote the role of public and private wireless "hot spot" providers in improving connectivity.
- 9. Establish a fee schedule to recover reasonable staff and process expenditures to recover costs from telecommunication *proponen*ts with consideration given to the costs to Islands Trust to evaluate and process proposals.

# 5.2 Land Use Policy

#### A. Siting Objectives

- Antenna Systems should be sited and designed to respect local sensitivities and preferences as identified by the LTA, including being unobtrusive and inconspicuous, minimizing visual impact, avoiding disturbance to natural features and reduce the need for future facilities in the same area, where appropriate.
- 2. Where *antenna systems* are proposed consideration is requested in the following order of priority:
  - a) co-location on an existing antenna system;
  - b) re-use of an existing telecommunication facility;

- c) use of *existing infrastructur*e such as a building rooftop or utility pole;
- d) stealth design of a new antenna system; and
- e) *new* antenna system structure.
- 3. Where *co-location*, re-use, modification, or use of existing infrastructure is not feasible, a new *antenna sys*tem should be designed with *co-loc*ation capacity, including in *residential areas* when identified as the LTA's preference.
- 4. The LTA recognizes that the objective of promoting *co-location* and the objective of making *Antenna systems* less noticeable may sometimes come into conflict. Nevertheless, the LTA intends to review each submission on its merits with a view to promoting both objectives and, where necessary, will determine the appropriate balance between them.

#### B. Land Use Preferences

- 1. When new *antenna systems* must be constructed; *where technically feasible*, and such systems are not of *stealth design* or otherwise exempt from public consultation, they should be sited in the following land use categories:
  - industrial use land;
  - highway or service commercial use land (excluding mixed residential use);
  - utility institutional use land is appropriate, but not limited to those institutions that require telecommunications technology, emergency services, hospitals, colleges;
  - BC Hydro utility corridor rights of way;
  - low density residential areas; and
  - agricultural use land.
- 2. In all land use designations, the following building and infrastructure considerations are preferred:
  - use of existing buildings and/or structure mounted antenna systems; and
  - siting in areas that can access fiber optic networks to allow for backhauling into the fiber optic network.

#### C. Setback Considerations

- Preferred setbacks between antenna systems and lot lines should be at least 1 (one) times the height of the free-standing tower; the Local Trust Area may choose to adjust this preferred setback to reflect local conditions and preferences.
- 2. Notwithstanding a preferred *setback* distance of a proposed tower from residential uses, the setback distance may be *decreased* if the location is consistent with the land use

preferences of Article 5.2 B. 2 Land Use Preferences and avoids *discouraged locations of Article 5.2 D Discouraged Locations.* 

3. Setbacks from non-residential uses may be determined on a case by case basis and should serve to separate *antenna systems* from adjacent development without unduly affecting the development potential of the lot over the lease period.

#### D. Discouraged Locations

- 1. Land use
  - Medium and high density residential areas
  - Schools, daycare facilities, playgrounds and similar facilities
  - Areas that adversely impact view corridors
  - Heritage areas (unless visibly unobtrusive) or on heritage structures unless it forms an integrated part of the structure's overall design (i.e. through the use of stealth structures).
  - Nature protection areas
  - Environmentally sensitive ecosystems
- 2. Other considerations, irrespective of land use designation
  - Locations directly in front of doors, windows, balconies or residential frontages
  - Community gathering places such as community halls, churches, commercial eating & drinking establishments
  - Sites of topographical and geographic prominence

# 7 **DEFINITIONS**

Antenna system (also telecommunication antenna system) means an exterior transmitting device – or group of devices – used to receive and/or transmit radio-frequency (RF) signals, microwave signals, or other federally-licensed communications energy transmitted from, or to be received by, other antennas. *antenna system* includes the antenna, and may include a supporting tower, mast or other supporting structure, and an equipment shelter. This *protocol* refers to the following three types of *telecommunication antenna system*, defined below;

**Building/structure-mounted antenna system** means a *telecommunication antenna system* mounted on an existing structure or building and for the purposes of height calculations, height shall be measured from the base of any building or structure to the most elevated portion of any antenna system.

**Freestanding antenna system** means a structure built from the ground for the expressed purpose of hosting transmitting devices; and

Tree-mounted antenna system: means an antenna system mounted on a tree.

**Co-location** means the placement of antennas and equipment operated by one or more *proponents* on a *telecommunication antenna system* owned by a different party, thereby creating a shared facility;

**Community association** means an active area or neighbourhood specific group or association within a LTA;

**Distance** the horizontal distance measured from the lot line to the base of a proposed freestanding antenna system or the base of any building or structure to which an antenna system is mounted to a structure, building, or facility.

**Emergency service providers** means any police, fire, ambulance or search and rescue organization with a typical response area within the *notification distance* of a proposed *telecommunication antenna system*;

**Localized content** means any public consultation materials, supporting documentation and/or other relevant promotional material provided by a *proponent* for a proposed *telecommunication antenna system* which has been tailored specifically to the context of the LTA;

**Neighbouring land-use jurisdiction** means any land-use authority or First Nations within a *Prescribed Notification Distance* of any proposed *telecommunication antenna system*;

**Prescribed notification distance:** measured horizontally from the outside perimeter of the supporting structure of the proposed *freestanding* or *building/structure-mounted antenna system*. The outside perimeter begins at the furthest point of the supporting mechanism, be it the outermost guy line, building edge, face of the self-supporting tower;

**Proponent:** means a company or organization, including contractors or agents undertaking work for telecommunication carriers, for the purpose of providing commercial telecommunication services;

**Protocol**: means any written local guideline, policy or process that addresses the issue of antenna placement;

**Residential area:** means lands used or zoned to permit residential uses, including mixed uses (i.e. where commercial use is permitted with residential use on the same lot).

School District: means an area created or constituted as a school district under the School Act;

**Sensitive community locations:** means institutions and services, such as schools, daycares, recreation facilities, public parks, or other sensitive locations;


**Stealth design:** means a design of an antenna system that camouflages the antenna and supporting structure as something else such as a tree, water tower, flag pole, component of a building, or similar means.

Telecommunications antenna system: see antenna system definition.



### Monopole Tower Designs






