




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# **About Islands Trust**



Islands Trust is a special-purpose government representing over 30,000 people living within the Islands Trust Area and 10,000 non-resident property owners.


The Islands Trust Area is located within Coast Salish territory and is the homeland to over 28,000 Coast Salish Peoples who have called this place home for many centuries.

The Islands Trust Area covers the islands and waters between the British Columbia mainland and southern Vancouver Island. It includes 13 major islands and more than 450 smaller islands, covering 5,200 square kilometres.





# About the Islands Trust Policy Statement



The Islands Trust Act requires Trust Council to adopt a Policy Statement, which is a collection of policies Trust Council uses to preserve and protect the Trust

The Policy Statement guides the development of more detailed and local official community plans and regulatory bylaws across the Trust Area. And takes the place of Regional Growth Strategies that are used outside of the Islands Trust Area.

When a local trust committee or island municipality makes a decision about how a particular parcel of land will be used, it's the Policy Statement that guides that decision.

The Policy Statement also guides the development of Trust Council's Strategic Plan and how governments work together.

An Official Community Plan (OCP) describes the long-term vision of communities. It guides decisions on municipal and regional planning and land use management. An OCP is developed at the local level, with opportunities for public input.

A Land Use Bylaw (LUB) is used by municipal and regional districts to implement land use planning visions from official community plans and regional growth strategies. Bylaws regulate how land, buildings and other structures may be used.


# About the Policy Statement Amendment Project

The Islands 2050 Policy Statement Amendment Project will help Trust Council plan for the challenges and opportunities that the Islands Trust Area will face over the next 30 years. The Policy Statement was first adopted in 1994 and has not been significantly updated in over 25 years. A lot has changed in that time.

The current Policy Statement does not meet Trust Council's recent commitments to reconciliation, climate change, and affordable housing, as reflected in Trust Council's 2018-2022 Strategic Plan, its Reconciliation Declaration (2019), and its Climate Emergency Declaration (2019).

Trust Council is leading the update process, with the support of its committees and staff. Trust Council must consider and balance feedback from the public, First Nations and Indigenous community members, referral agencies, subject matter specialists, and other interested and affected groups across the Islands Trust Area.

Because the Policy Statement has not been updated in so many years, many changes have been requested. All draft updates in the Draft New Policy Statement are within the existing mandate and scope of Islands Trust, as outlined in the Islands Trust Act.







# Project Timeline

The Islands 2050 Policy Statement Amendment Project began in 2019 and will go through many stages. Each stage of the project will build on, and be informed by, the stages that came before it.

# About the Islands 2050 Public Engagement Process

The purpose of conducting public engagement for this project is to inform the public about proposed draft updates to the Policy Statement and to gather community input for Trust Council to consider as they make decisions about the Policy Statement Amendment Project.

Public input is one of many streams of input informing the project.

# Public Engagement Phase 1 (Fall 2019)

In Phase 1, public input was gathered on community values, concerns related to climate change, and opportunities to preserve and protect the Trust Area. Approximately 1,600 people provided feedback through Phase 1 engagement opportunities. Twenty-four events took place across the Trust Area, including:

- open house events
- group discussions
- information booths
- collection of feedback in key community locations, information displays and feedback opportunities in key community locations and on ferries
- online comment and discussion forum

# Public Engagement Phase 2 (Jan-Mar 2021)

In Phase 2, public input was sought on draft policy directions. A Policy Directions Report was developed using input from Phase 1 public engagement, First Nations, Trust Council committees and working groups, and staff. Approximately 400 people provided feedback through the Phase 2 online survey, and 100 people attended the Open House. Opportunities for providing feedback on the Policy Directions Report included:

- An online survey
- A Virtual Open House

## Public Engagement Phase 3 (WE ARE HERE)

We are now in Phase 3. Your input through this discussion guide, and other engagement opportunities available February – April 2022, will help Trust Council to finalize amendments to the Draft New Policy Statement.
















The Draft New Policy Statement organizes policies into both *categories* and *types* of policies.

#### *Types of policies* found in all categories include:


- **Commitments of Trust Council:** identify the guiding principles Trust Council should use when making decisions.
- Directive Policies to Local Trust Committees and Island Municipalities: require local trust committees and island municipalities to include certain types of policies in their local official community plans and land use bylaws. When Local Trust Committees and Island Municipalities implement the directive policies, they tailor them to meet the specific local needs of each island and include opportunities for public input.
- Coordination Policies: guide how Trust Council will work with other government agencies and interested and affected parties, and make recommendations for preserving and protecting the Trust Area.













# Proposed Updates to This Section

Proposed Updates to this section include:

- 1. Place priority on preserving and protecting the environment and Indigenous cultural heritage in all decision-making
- 2. Decision-making should be guided by best available science, local knowledge, Indigenous ways of knowing and the Precautionary Principle

\*The Precautionary Principle recognizes that delaying action until there is compelling evidence of harm will often mean that it is then too costly or impossible to avoid the threat. Use of this principle promotes action to avoid risks of serious or irreversible harm to the environment.

# Proposed Updates to This Section

#### **Environmental Integrity Policies:**

Feedback from Phase 1 and 2 engagement led to proposed updates in this section that require each local planning area to identify, monitor, and mitigate the impacts of climate change on ecosystems through:

- 1. Proposed commitment policies to conduct climate vulnerability assessments in each local area
- 2. Proposed directive policy to identify ways to reduce vulnerability support ways to adapt to climate change
- 3. Proposed directive policies to identify and prioritize, in each local area, the protection of:
  - a) sensitive ecosystems
  - b) contiguous, unfragmented forests
  - c) freshwater networks and groundwater recharge areas
  - d) eelgrass meadows, kelp forests, fish spawning
  - e) species at risk
  - f) Indigenous cultivation and harvesting areas

#### Freshwater Stewardship Policies:

During Phase 1 and 2 engagement, community members expressed a strong concern about the sustainability of freshwater supply on the islands and a desire for stronger protective policies. Some existing policies have been strengthened to use clear and measurable terms.

- 1. Strengthened directive policy language is proposed to more clearly identify and plan for freshwater constraints in a changing climate (changes noted in bold):
- a) "Neither the density nor intensity of land use is increased in **groundwater regions** where the

- quality or quantity of the supply of freshwater is likely to be inadequate or unsustainable;
- b) Existing, anticipated, and seasonal water demand and supply projections are considered and allowed for"
- 2. Proposed draft directive policy to prohibit new desalination plants.
- 3. Another proposed update in this section encourages rainwater harvesting as a supporting water source (though not as a primary water supply).

#### **Forest Stewardship Policies:**

In this section, there are no significant updates to directive policies.

However, draft commitments and coordination policy updates include a request for the provincial government to grant the Trust Council authority to regulate tree cutting in the Trust Area. If successful, this would provide local trust committees the authority to adopt tree protection bylaws. They also include a request to the Ministry of Forests to prohibit any clear-cutting of forests or logging of old-growth trees in the Trust Area.

If the Province were to grant Trust Council authority to regulate tree cutting, this is not expected to affect residents' abilities to remove danger trees, collect firewood, or perform regular land maintenance on their properties.

#### **Agricultural Stewardship Policies:**

In the Agricultural Stewardship section, no significant regulatory updates are proposed.

1. Some language that described agriculture as a "traditional and valuable activity" in the current











Policy Statement has been removed in the proposed updates. While agriculture is valued in the Trust Area, these words hold different meaning for First Nations and was seen to be out of alignment with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls for Action.

- 2. Proposed policy preference for agricultural harvesting practices that are:
  - a) small-scale, sustainable, regenerative
  - b) minimize downstream impacts
  - c) respectful of Indigenous food security, harvesting areas, and cultural heritage
  - d) protective of environmental integrity
- 3. Proposed coordination policy to advocate for the approaches above on Agricultural Land Reserve (ALR) lands
- 4. Proposed coordination policy to advocate for greater provincial supports to local farmers to adopt the highest standards of environmental protection and adapt to climate change

#### **Coastal and Marine Stewardship Policies:**

In previous phases of engagement, Islands Trust heard a strong call from the public and First Nations to better protect the coastal and marine environment.

Proposed updates in this section aim to minimize changes caused by the combined impact of past, present and future human activities on Indigenous cultural heritage and harvesting sites, and on sensitive nearshore ecosystems that are critical to the health of the Salish Sea.

Draft updates propose preferred approaches that align with the preserve and protect mandate:

1. Proposed draft directive policies prohibiting new private docks (except where properties are boat access only)

- » Community/shared docks are preferred to minimize the cumulative effects of a large number of private docks on sensitive nearshore ecosystems, and Indigenous cultural heritage sites and harvesting areas. Private docks can also impede access to the foreshore and detract from the natural beauty of the coastline.
- 2. Proposed draft directive policies prohibiting new seawalls or other hard shoreline armouring
  - » Soft shoreline protections are preferred over hard shoreline armouring that can adversely impact Indigenous cultural heritage sites and harvesting areas, sensitive nearshore ecosystems, and the natural beauty of the coastline.
- 3. Proposed draft coordination and advocacy policies to strengthen protection of the coastal and marine environment by other levels of government

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# Proposed Updates to This Section

#### **Rural Island Planning Policies:**

This section includes draft directive policies requiring local trust committees and island municipalities to reduce the climate vulnerability of their communities by:

- protecting natural area carbon sinks
- fostering low-carbon housing, buildings, transportation, and agriculture
- » safeguarding freshwater sustainability
- encouraging soft shoreline protections, and
- » mitigating wildfire risk.

#### **Housing Policies:**

The Draft New Policy Statement proposes a new section about fostering low-impact and affordable housing in the Trust Area.

- 1. Proposed new section devoted to fostering lowimpact, affordable housing, while safeguarding:
  - a) protected area networks
  - b) freshwater sustainability
  - c) healthy marine environment
  - d) Indigenous cultural heritage
- 2. Proposed draft directive policies to:
  - a) identify appropriate locations for housing density to support safe, secure, and affordable housing
  - b) assess impacts of short-term rentals on affordable housing, and regulate where necessary
  - c) establish locally-specific floor area and lot coverage limitations for residential development

#### **Transportation Policies:**

This section includes draft updates to support active transportation networks and support electric vehicles and electric bicycles, which help to reduce greenhouse gas emissions and promote community health and well-being.

Proposed updates to this section support creating public and active transportation networks, and refinements to existing directive policies to ensure that road systems do not negatively impact protected area networks, forested areas, watershed ecosystems, freshwater networks, groundwater recharge areas, agricultural lands, coastal and marine areas, or Indigenous cultural heritage.

A proposed update identifies Trust Council's interest in approaching the provincial government to support electric ferries in the Trust Area.

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The Draft New Policy Statement includes a long overdue acknowledgment of First Nations' treaty and territorial rights and relationships to these lands and waters, from time immemorial.

There are also draft updates stating that land and marine uses in the Trust Area should not impact the inherent rights of First Nations to access their treaty and territorial lands and waters for cultural, spiritual, or stewardship purposes.

There are proposed updates for Trust Council, local trust committees and island municipalities to seek meaningful engagement with First Nations, guided by reconciliation principles and recommendations that fall within their jurisdiction from:

- United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples (UNDRIP)
- Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples Act (DRIPA)
- Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) Calls to Action
- Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) Calls for Justice

Draft updates are also proposed for local trust committees and island municipalities to include certain types of reconciliation policies in their official community plans and regulatory bylaws.

These include policies that preserve and protect Indigenous cultural heritage, harvesting sites, and culturally significant species, and stronger protection of the coastal and marine environment. There are also draft updates that prohibit the removal or excavation of soil from areas that have been identified as culturally significant by First Nations or Indigenous Knowledge Holders.







