Personally, I know many folks once again looking for housing, with only "illegal", expensive, unhealthy options on the horizon. Nobody wants to live this way, "illegally", unhealthily, and at great expense to their freedom, why do you make them live judged as such? What makes you judge, jury, and executioner? What makes you think this helps, or does not? What are you trying to do to our future here?

The housing crisis on Salt Spring has been festering for decades but it is hitting a real breaking point today.

One year ago, housing advocates delivered a short report titled 8 tangible actions the Trust can take to address the housing crisis while protecting the environment. Each action was the result of consultations with many experts and community leaders, were deeply researched, and fell within existing regulations and the mandate of the Trust.

One year later, I am upset to hear that not one of these actions has been undertaken.

The new Housing Working Group project proposed for the Trust is one way to move forward on this issue.

This working group proposal should be approved and housing thus made one of the top 5 priorities of the Island, with Trust staff time allocated.

The housing crisis here affects everyone, and is quickly hollowing out the working and middle class, harming our island culture and quality of life. Housing solutions can be found that protect the environment and people, but first housing has to be seen as a priority.
